

Pontiac to match his jersey number 34; class officers were Don Webb, Bob Jones, and Dolores Warden; Janie Dutton and Bob Jones were queen and king of EHS (Edith Cox and Don Roff were runners up); the coronation had an "Over the Rainbow" theme; the senior play was "June Graduate" and was considered "very sophisticated" (the reviewer from the Eastland Telegram said he could say unqualifiedly it was the best he had ever seen, and then stated it was the first he had ever seen); Patsy Simpson was band sweetheart and Mable

Grimes was football sweetheart; the Co-Ed club invited every girl in the incoming freshman class to belong to the club; Jana Weaver was chosen as class beauty; DAR awards went to Don Webb and Dolores Warden; four members who did not graduate with the class but were claimed as our own were Sissy Ellis, Judy Haines, Lonnie Young and Gay Poe; the Kendricks made the large ring for the ring presentation; the Hobo Party on Seaman Street; Teacher Johnson's 4A English Class at 7th period was all girls (cleven of them); Bettie Robin-

son's parents, the Guy Robinsons gave more parites and attended more class events than any parents: Edith Cox's father could get the greatest number of teenagers in his small car and would drive them anywhere; formal dresses were strapless. full, and had lots of net; casual dresses were just above the ankle; our short, short, short kid-day dresses were knee length; the boys' suits had gigantic shoulder pads and the pants were baggy; favored boys were the four Dons-Martin, Webb, Roff and Chrisman; honor graduates were Jana Weaver and Dolores Warden; members of the class worried about choosing a college, finding a job or getting a mate. 

Dr. Peeples attended Eastland High School two years, playing on the basketball team and representing the school at the District track meet in

Abilene in shot put and discus. He graduated from Clarendon College, where he played on an undefeated football team and won the outstanding debate award.

He received his Bachelors, Masters, and Bachelor of Divinity Degrees from Southern Methodist University. While there he coached debate and taught government. He also did

raduate work at Columbia University and the University of Texas.

He was coach one year at Tahoka High School, coach and high school principal one year at Texline, and superintendent of schools one year at Texline. He served four years as a minister in East Texas and then for 38 years was president of Lon Morris College. During his administration an entirely new plant was built, eleven major buildings and twelve brick homes for teachers. The en-dowment grew to \$1,700,000.

Dr. Peeples has been president of the Texas Methodist College Presidents' Association, the National Methodist Junior College Association, the Texas Junior College Associa-tion, and the Jacksonville Chamber of Commerce. He is a member of the Jacksonville Rotary Club.

He is a permanent member of the Lon Morris College Board of Trustees and chairman of the Endowment Committee.

Dr. Peeples married the former Miss Gladys Labenski of Dallas. They have two daughters Mrs. Nelda Darrell of Owensboro, Kentucky, and Mrs. Vernon Weddle Jr., of Los Angeles, California.



A THANKSGIVING DINNER 1916

In response to your request for class agents to write news articles, humorous, serious or dramatic, I am happy to report on a very unusual Thanksgiving Dinner which our superintendent, Mr. George Brogden, who was our room teacher, planned when we were seniors in 1916 and 1917 until our graduation in May 1917.

This wonderful occasion was planned by Mr. George Borg-don. The dinner was an expression of his originality and his love and confidence in us; also it has been a beacon in my life throughout these 58 years since our graduation, May 1917.

One day a few days before Thanksgiving in 1916, Mr. Brogdon requested our class, consisting of three boys and six girls, to remain in our room a few minutes after school.

His announcement started like this: "How would you like to have a Thanksgiving Dinner together? Just you seniors and myself--' Of course we were thrilled. Mr. Brogdon said, There is room for us upstairs, the boys and myself will bring in tables and place them together until there is room for ten place settings. On Saturday the boys and myself will go opossum hunting and we will not come back until we have killed one. Also we will gather beautiful golden brown leaves from the trees on the river bottom. We will pick pecans under the big trees along the Leon River.

vegetables, salad, cake and fresh pecans, and as you crack pies, the usual Thanksgivin dinner, with the exception of the opossumn.

The boys and myself will dress the opossum and keep him in the ice box. Now who will bake this opossum??" All the you know opossum is a delicacy if prepared properly, all the successful. girls again shook their heads

'No Finally Irene Collins said, "I have never baked one but I'll try". The dressed opossum was to be delivered to Irene the day

before Thanksgiving and that completed the boys part.

Now that all the plans were made, we had only to wait for Thanksgiving morning. I awakened very early and baked the sweet potato pie, as I had promised. Soon I was dressed and walking 3/4 mile to school carrying my pie. On the third floor of the high school I found Gussie Simmons (now Mrs. Gene Andrews) who had arrived a few minutes before myself and had lit an old oil stove that was in the old time clock room. This was enough heat for our

vegetable dishes.

The other girls came shortly with their dishes and food. I brought a beautiful white linen table cloth which we spread. over the long table that the boys had arranged by putting small tables side-by-side.

Soon Mr. Brogdon came with the autumn leaves which he carefully spread over the white linen cloth to a depth of three inches. Then he took the fresh pecans and hid them among the autumn leaves. The boys came one-by-one, each had done his

Remember when Bill Stanley and Pat and Annelle Miller trained an A capella choir which was a delight to listen to and which won all kinds of honors. Then on KID DAY Douglas King presented his a casmella choir, exaggerating Mr. Stanley's style so effectively that during the rest of the day our popular principal asked one and all if he really twitched his fanny that way!

Years ago Hal Holbrook, the actor, appeared on an assembly program as Mark Twain and as William Shakespeare. The spell bound audience of teenagers recognized the talent of this man and talked in English and speech classes about how far he would go in the world of theater. How different from Box and Cox.

The Trapp Family Singers introduced us to the Sound of Music long before that movie. And they were gracious in giving our students interviews.

Football and dramatic productions kept things lively. At one time pep rallies were held the first period in the auditorium and the rest of the day small rallies were held between classes. What pandemonium!

Play practice often lasted late and stage crews stayed and worked far into the night building sets and painting. As Bob Latham so often observed too many chiefs and not enough Indians. The police often cameby to see what we were doing in the auditorium during the wee hours. Mothers frequently brought food and drinks, saving our sanity. Sometimes the thrilling drama was backstage. Remember those rehearsals that led to the altar?

Study halls were sometimes ideal, but toward the end of the day were nightmares endured by students and teachers alike.

Someone noticed how smooth the front walk became after having been used as a dance floor.

Remember some of the beautiful dances in the old gym---for instance, that Christmas holiday dance with cedar trees and swags and snowmen, and beautiful girls in formals.



We look back on those long days of pleasant associations and lasting friendships and uncomplicated activities with rose-colored glasses. NOSTALGIA!!



History Of Eastland Schools

HIGH SCHOOL

Eastland High School is one of the several schools in the Eastland Independent School District. The first Eastland Independent District was organized in 1882; however, the present district was founded in 1929. At the present time the Eastland District covers some thirty square miles and owns five school buildings -- West Ward School, South Ward School, Junior High School, Senior High School and Douglas School.

The system also has a field for track and band marching practice, tennis courts, a football gymnasium, as well as several fields suitable for playground ball and for football and track practice.

The first school to be owned by the Eastland Independent School District was a two-room frame building. This building was used until the erection of a three-room house in 1883; school was conducted there until 1895. A two-story frame building was built in 1905, and later a large red brick structure was erected. The present high school was constructed in 1927. Situated on a hill overlooking the business section of Eastland it has three stories, 28 rooms, an auditorium capable of seating 588 persons, a stage fully equipped for theatrical productions, a cafeteria, a sound-proof band room, excellent physics and chemistry laboratories, and a fairly large sized library. The present ward schools were built in 1920; the junior high building in 1930; and the gym in 1929.

At the present time there are 13 teachers in high school and 315 students. At the end of this year Eastland High will have 33 affiliated credits.

Eastland High consistently turns out good students; the records of the University, Texas Technological College and Texas A&M, along with other schools show that the grades of Eastland students are considerately above the average. Few other schools have graduates whose grades equal those made by these students.

This would be an incomplete record of our high school if it did not mention the men who have built our Eastland school system. As well as we can gather from the records that go back to 1911, the past presidents of the school board have been T.E. Downtain, M. Hill, E.P. Davenport, John Mat-W.B. Sutton, J.A Beard, George Brogdon, J.H. Caton and K.B. Tanner.

The superintendents of the Eastland schools since 1911, as well as the records show, have been A.S. Johnston, George Brogdon, E.A. Bills, C.A. Peterson, W.Z. Bates, P.B. Bittle, and W.G. Womack.

HISTORY OF EASTLAND HIGH SCHOOL [Continued] 1975

In 1975 the Eastland Independent School District covers an area of 99 square miles. It was increased by the consolidation with Morton Valley Common School District in 1949 and with the Olden Independent School District in 1969

The high school and junior high buildings "on the hill" are still in use today. Several buildings have been added to the campus since the 1941

history was written. Morton Valley had a metal gymnasium which was moved to the high school hill and placed to the south side of the old red brick gymnasium soon after the consolidation.

In the early 1960's the band received a building of its own when the new Eastland Medical and Surgical Clinic was built by Dr. M.A. Treadwell Jr., and the frame building which housed the Clinic was moved just south of the high school. Last year the band hall was completely redecorated, paneled and carpeted and is one of the most complete band facilities in the area, having a large rehearsal hall, practice rooms, instrument storage, music library and a cedar lined uniform storage

On the southwest corner of high school campus is the Vocational Agriculture building built in 1965 with shop and classroom facilities. An addition to the building to allow for another full unit of Vocational Ag is under construction at the present time. The campus at Eastland High School now has a total of six buildings "on the

South Ward and West Ward Elementary Schools were replaced and wrecked for salvage in 1963-64. The Wendell T. Siebert Elementary School housing grades one through six is located on a thirty-acre site two blocks south of the school on the corner of West Sadosa and Madera Streets. The one story building contains sixteen classrooms, three administrative offices, a teachers' lounge and a spacious cafetorium and kitchen. It is centrally cooled and heated.

The new gymnasium was constructed in 1964 on the West Ward Site just one block west of high school. A concrete walkway from the high school and junior high buildings connects the campus with the new gymnasium.

Other facilities of the East-

land ISD include Maverick Stadium east of town to which improvements are made from year to year, a grassy practice field and all-weather track just south of high school, tennis courts which have been newly topped this year, and livestock feeding pens located in the northwest corner of the 30 acres on which elementary school is

Eastland Schools were integrated in the 1961-62 school year. The Douglas School was used as a Community Club Room for several years, then finally sold and torn down.

"The Little Red School House" kindergarten building is an attractive addition to the Wendell T. Siebert Elementary School site. There was no thought of our giving up free time, and certainly none of her relinquishing leisure. It was simply an exciting, challenging chance to make music, and we came out quaking and energized and stretched and wanting more!

What a woman! In how many ways does she live today! How many musicians play now with hands and minds first molded by her knowledge and personality? How much continuing devotion to music was implanted by her spirit? How many adults have tackled other tasks with discipline first strengthened by her demands?

She gave opportunities to ordinary boys and girls and turned them into people who could achieve, perform, appreciate, produce. She was a true original, a rare and gifted and unforgettable person. Wherever they may be, her students "rise up and call her blessed.

W.G. Womack is easy to remember. When he stood in the halls of the high school, we students responded with a slower gait and a silent nod. Yet we were not afraid of him; he was Mr. Womack and we respected him.

Teaching was his profession; he loved it and lived it, although it did not come first. God was his first love and he served Him fervently and faithfully. For two decades he directed the music program of the First Baptist Church. The Men's Bible Class enjoyed his playing the piano for years. He really loved music, and the joy of serving was his reward.

He was a family man. Mrs. Womack shared her husband's love for teaching and also for serving the church. Their children: Gladeene, now Mrs. Holman Lee of Fort Worth, and Bob of Snyder, followed their parents into the teaching profes -sion. Both children and grand-children inherited Mr. Womack's talent and fondness for music.

Employed by the Eastland schools to teach, that is exactly what Mr. Womack did. When he was principal and later superintendent, he never ceased teaching. Although his classes were not always at scheduled times, he never refused an appeal. Those who sat in these extra sessions ranged from the unruly student paying the penalty for misbe-havior to one in peril of failure who needed additional instruction. His challenge was an insecure boy or girl whom he might help to find the way to become a secure man or woman.

His successful academic op-eration was uncomplicated. He led the principals, who led the teachers, who led the students. We all knew the chain of command and respected it. When a crisis arose, it was resolved as quickly and quietly as possible. We remember this friend

because he is a good memory. We appreciated him because he gave us a sense of security

when we were not yet ready to make decisions on our own. We trusted him. A lasting memorial has been built to W.G. Womack in the hearts and minds of teachers and students alike, who grew in knowledge and understanding under his gui-

dance.






