

**MINUTEMEN OF TEXAS**  
The Making of the Texan Cavalier Soldier, Mark E. Nackman

"The heroes of Texas would be her citizen soldiers. There seldom were any illusions that Texas, either as a republic or a state could turn to other than her own settlers for defense.

The emergence of the Texas citizen soldier in the 1830's and 1840's was a natural consequence: "We are few in numbers, and the very nature of our situation makes every man a soldier" (from a letter).

Every settler was a minute man—ready to start at a moment's warning. "Rummers were sent all over the country to rendezvous at a certain point, and every man just saddled his horse and started to that point, and from there faced the problems—Indians or Mexicans or bandits". So wrote a veteran ranger.

Before there was an "Eastland County" the area was an unpeopled wilderness, except for roving tribes of hostile savages. A company of about 50 volunteers under the command of Capt. William Mosby Eastland in the autumn of 1837, left LaGrange, on the lower Colorado, on an expedition against the Indians in the upper country, known as North and Northwest Texas. The commander was a hero of San Jacinto. He led the company of civilian soldiers to the "highlands" dividing the waters of Pecan Bayou, the Leon and the Clear Fork of the Brazos. In what is now Eastland County he divided the men into two parties—the larger under his own leadership returned south on the Colorado slope of the country. The other, consisting of 20 men, under Lt. Van Benthusen and Miles, moved

Northeastwardly, crossed the Brazos near the mouth of Clear Fork and struck the main or West Fork of the Trinity in what is now Wise County. On November 10, 1837, they were attacked by 150 Indians, found refuge in a ravine where they were besieged from forenoon to night, losing Lt. Miles and eight men, besides several being wounded, and all their horses. For five days they followed the river. (From History of Dallas Co. Page 4-5 by John Henry Brown).

"The men who composed "the army of San Jacinto" and who won the battle which because of its far-reaching affect, was one of the decisive battles of the Western Hemisphere—were as follows: **Sam Houston, Major Gen. Commanding, P. 313 in Houston's own report:**

"Our cavalry, 61 in number, commanded by Mirabeau B. Lamar, whose gallant and daring conduct on the previous day had attracted the admiration of his comrades and called him to that station, placed on our extreme right, completed our line. Our cavalry was first dispatched to the front of the enemy's left, for the purpose of attracting their notice, whilst our extensive island of timber afforded us an opportunity of concentrating our forces and deploying from that point, agreeably to the previous design of the troops.

Next to these, on the extreme right, was a company of cavalry, 61 in number, under command of Col. Mirabeau B. Lamar, only recently arrived in Texas. # City Commission Run-Off Wednesday

Eastland voters will go to the polls again Wednesday to vote in a run-off election to break a tie vote from the recent city commission election.

Polls will open at 8 a.m. Wednesday at City Hall and remain open until 7 p.m. Only two names will appear on the ballot.

Incumbents W.Q. Verner and H.V. O'Brien each received the same number of votes (266) in the regular April 1 election, and the run-off election was called.

Incumbent Dale Bakker was re-elected and Mike Siebert was elected. Three places were to be filled and Verner and O'Brien tied for the third slot.

Mrs. Marcus O'Dell will be election judge and Mrs. John Morren will be Alternate Presiding Judge.

The run-off was called in compliance with the state election laws, and under those laws no write-ins will be counted in this type of election.

Eight persons were candidates for the three places to be filled.

Mr. Verner was first elected to the commission in 1967 in a special election to fill a vacancy resulted from an unexpired term. He was elected mayor April 30, 1974. O'Brien has served two two-year terms.

**AMENDMENT NO. 2**  
H.J.R. NO. 6

[Setting the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month and setting a per diem of \$30 during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees.]

The proposed amendment to Article III, Section 24, makes several changes in Article III, Section 24, of the Texas Constitution. These changes are:

(1) The salary of members of the legislature, now set at \$4,800 per year is raised to \$600 per month, or \$7,200 per year, and the per diem allowance, now limited to \$12 for the first 120 days only of a regular session and 30 days of each special session, is increased to \$30 for each day during each regular and special session of the legislature.

(2) The mileage allowance, now limited to \$2.50 for every 25 miles in going to and returning from the seat of government by the most direct route of travel as indicated on a table prepared by the Comptroller of Public Accounts, is changed to entitle members of each house mileage at the same rate as prescribed by law for employees of the State of Texas.

**AMENDMENT NO. 1**  
S.J.R. NO. 3

[Revising and consolidating provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and providing for a maximum state contribution to state systems of 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals.]

The proposed Constitutional Amendment No. 1 has two major purposes: (1) to consolidate nearly all constitutional provisions relating to state and local retirement systems in one section of the constitution, and (2) to lift the ceiling on state contributions to state systems from the existing maximum of

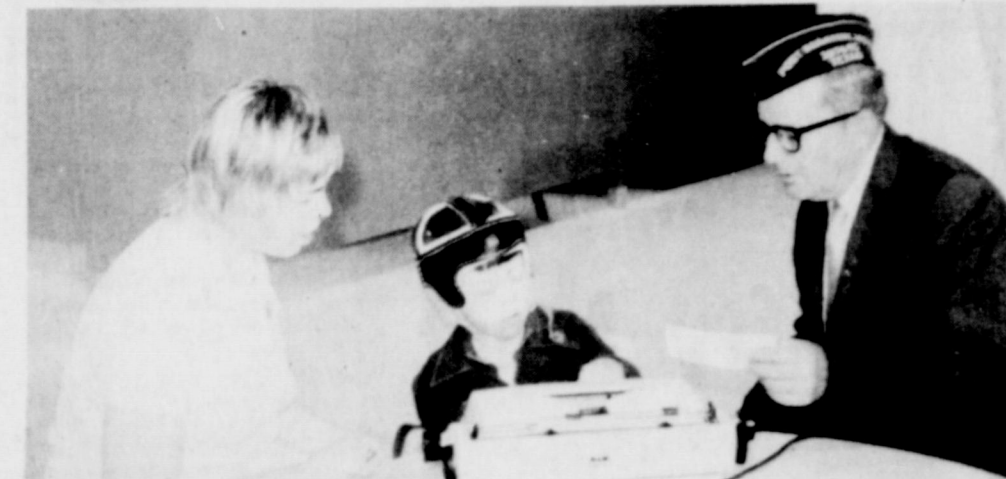

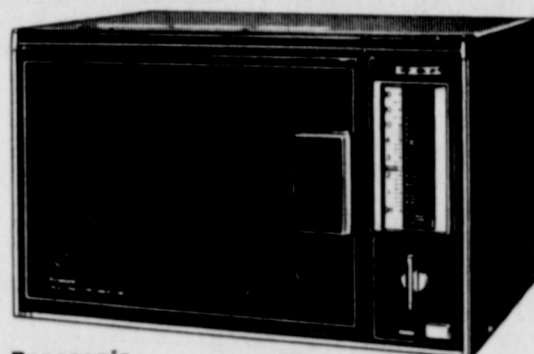
Senior honor students were announced this week: Darlene Wood, daughter of Mr. and

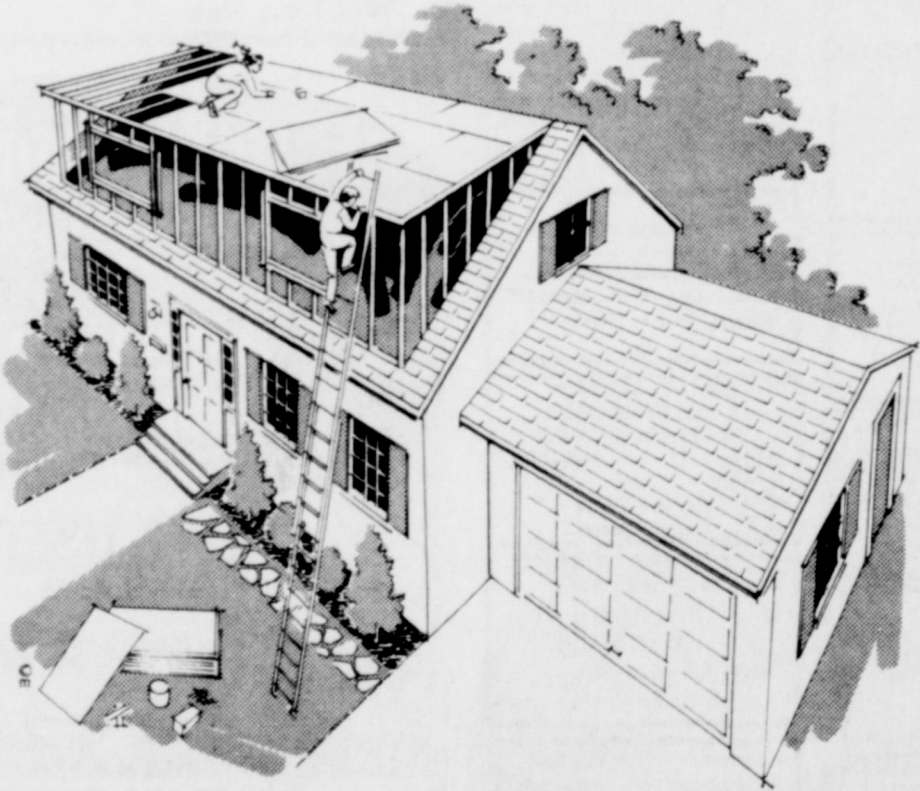
