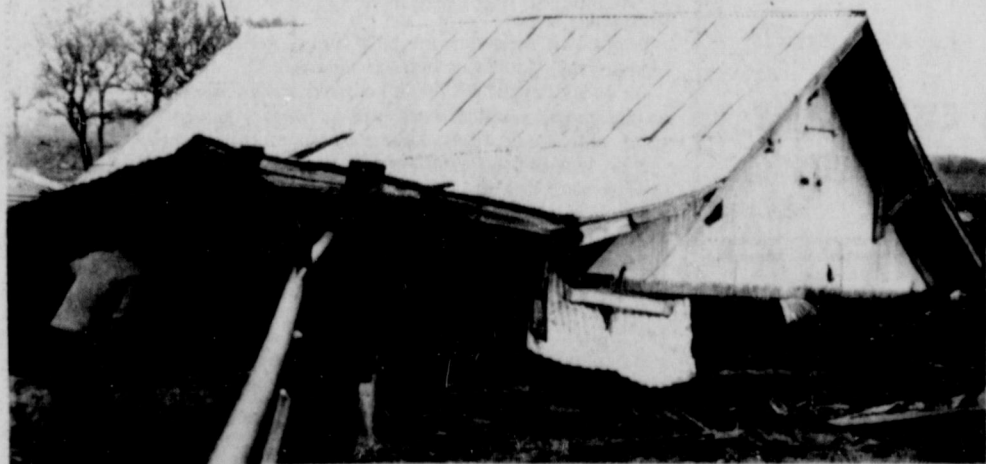

**Tornado Slams Morton Valley**

Texas weather is so unpredictable as we all know, but we didn't expect a tornado to hit around here. About 2 a.m. the residents of Morton Valley were awoken to high winds. Just an old fashioned tornado!

Several residents have reported quiet extensive damage to their property. Luckily there have been no reports of persons having been hurt during the tornado.

Persons have reported damages to their hay barns, sheds, chicken houses, garages and trees.

There was quiet a bit of damage done at the Lee Morton place. It was reported that their big barn was completely turned around, there was damage done to their roof and another barn had some damage done to it. The total amount of damage is not known at this time.

J.D. Clements had damage done to the roof of his garage, and the high winds scattered some tin he had weighted down. There was some tree damage and the tornado demolished a shed he did have out in his field.

D. Williamson reports that the winds tore the new tin off his garage and cut off the tops of his fruit trees. The barn has quiet a lot of damage done to it. He had his cows in the barn, but is unable to tell if there are any dead cows in there. The winds damaged his new fence he had just put up, also.

It was also reported that a big two story house that Morton Valley was named for shook when the high winds came early Friday morning.

The tornado did major damage to an 80-ft chicken house at

the home of O.D. Cunningham. The tin roof was completely demolished with sections blown a distance of 300 yards.

Power lines were knocked out in the Morton Valley area. There were some phone lines down, also.

The Eastland County Home Demonstration Council will meet Wednesday, April 2, in the Texas Electric Reddy Room in Eastland. The meeting will include the election of new officers for 1975-1976 and yearly reports of clubs and officer activities for the past year.

Council members will finalize plans for a spring trip which will include a tour of the newly completed State 4-H Center at Lake Brownwood.

One hundred and fifty-six home demonstration delegates from some nineteen counties recently attended the annual District 8 Texas Home Demonstration Association spring meeting in Waco. Overall theme was "Home-the Foundation of America". Voting delegates were Mrs. Sue Taylor, Mrs. W.G. Hall both of Cisco; and Mrs. Zelma Lusk of Eastland. Others attending included Mrs. R.W. Gordon of Ranger, Mrs. Janet Thomas and Mrs. Arleen Atkins, local Eastland County Extension Agents.

Mrs. Gordon and Mrs. Taylor were co-chairmen with Brown

County ladies in presenting the Citizenship Workshop. Mrs. Zelma Lusk also assisted in the workshop presentation.

Other workshops included Safety and 4-H. The keynote speaker was Mrs. R.N. Allison of Bell County who told of her trip to Austria to attend the National Meeting of Associated Country Women of the World organization.

The April H.D. Club program will be "Freezing Prepared Foods for Convenience" presented by Mrs. Janet Thomas, County Extension Agent. Dates the program will be given include: April 1--Rising Star Extension Home Economics Study Group; April 3--Flatwood H.D. Club; April 14--Kokomo H.D. Club; April 18--Pleasant Hill H.D. Club; April 21--Lake Cisco H.D. Club; April 23--Morton Valley H.D. Club; and April 24--Word H.D. Club.

All interested homemakers are always welcomed to attend the club programs.

Homesewers may notice new information in pattern catalogs, on pattern guides and on patterns themselves in the near future. Pattern companies will include measurements in terms of meters and centimeters so that homesewers can get used to them if the change to the metric system becomes mandatory.

Probably the greatest effect on the homeseWER may be psychological. For example, a 26 inch waist will be expressed as 66 centimeters.

Perhaps the easiest way to learn the metric system is to visually estimate the lengths. For example, a meter is slightly more than 39 inches, or about three inches more than a yard.

HomeseWERS may want to start obtaining measuring tools with metric markings. Tape measures, meter sticks and rulers are available now.

But there is one consolation to the shock of metric measurements--a homeseWER weighing 130 pounds will only weigh about 59 kilograms in metric expression!

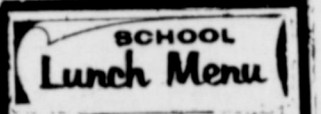
**Services For James R. Waton**

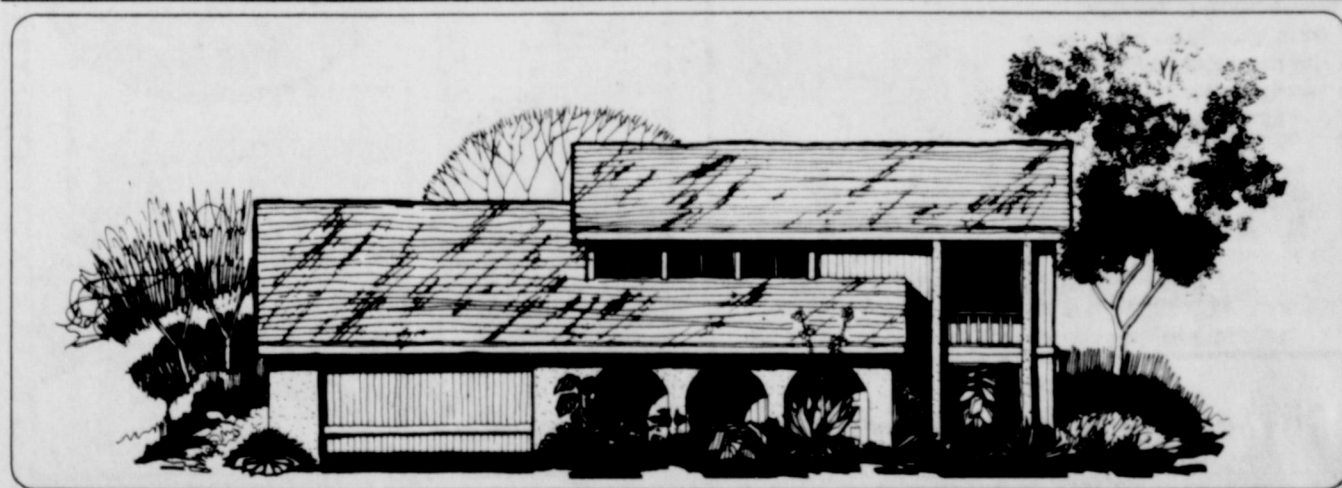

In the late summer, the community usually promoted a community fair where the people displayed their prized possessions such as their horses, mules, fat calves and other specially cared for livestock. The women showed off their homemade bed quilts, canned fruit, garden vegetables they thought was outstanding and all kinds of special dishes of food they prepared themselves. First, second and third prizes were awarded.

During these fairs, many people traded their livestock to other people for different livestock they felt could serve them better in their operations. One such case developed where a man needed a work horse or mule to replace the only one he had that had grown old and died. He traded a milk cow for a good looking mule. ### Local DAR Chapter Hears Report On Appalachian School Sponsored By DAR

**ALLYE TERRELL**  
Appalachia has been much in the news for a good many years. Church groups and others have been concerned about the needs of the people who live there. Perhaps one of the most concerned about the education

ional needs were the South Carolina Daughters of the American Revolution. Mrs. W.W. Wallace received a book at the regular meeting of Charles Crawford Chapter March 24, 1975. It was a report on one of the

DAR schools recognized and approved by the National Society and which receives an annual contribution from the National Fund. The school is Tamasee in South Carolina. Another is Kate Duncan Smith in Alabama. There are other approved schools in which DAR members send regular help in the form of money.

Mrs. Wallace's subject was "Tamassee's Half Century" a story of the visions, hopes, ambitions and hard work of dedicated people to bring the school into being, and its progress during the past 50 years.

Mrs. Wallace reported that Mrs. Grace Ward Calhoun, author of the book, and South Carolina State Regent DAR, from 1914 to 1917, made an appeal to South Carolina DAR State Conference in 1914 for permission to establish a school. The Conference voted permission.

Three years later a suitable location was found, and in 1917 the State conference accepted an offer of 110 acres in Oconee County, South Carolina, near the border of North Carolina and Georgia in the Appalachian area.

Business men of the nearest town gave \$1000 toward a school building, and men of the community promised labor and hauling and Tamassee was born! It began as a school for mountain girls, but some years later a boys dormitory was added. In 1920 there was only one building sitting on a hill in the woods, but Mrs. Calhoun had done a good job informing all the states of the need of this school. The DAR Chapters responded generously and gradually dormitories, cottages, electric power, water supply, dining hall, health center, central heating and administration building and other were built until today 24 attractive buildings have come about from the one in 1920. And the complex accommodates 400 children instead of the 23 in the first building.

During the reign of Mrs. Talmadge, NSDAR President General, after World War II, the first real recognition of Tamassee came from the National Society, the organization voted to give \$1000 each year from the National fund as support for Tamassee and Kate

### April 15 IRS Deadline

Abilene, Texas - With less than a month remaining until April 15, the annual deadline for filing individual income tax returns, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) is cautioning taxpayers to watch out for the last-minute mistakes that can delay refunds or, worse, cost money.

Arthur Fogle, administrative officer in charge of the Abilene IRS office, said today that a disproportionately large number of taxpayers traditionally wait until the final days of the filing season to send in their returns. One result of this, he said, is that thousands of returns come in with simple mistakes that can only be attributed to haste.

"We can't do much with a return that shows up without a taxpayer's name on it, which is not as uncommon as you might think," Fogle said. "The same goes for unsigned returns and those on which there are no social security numbers. But these things, and the frequent math errors that crop up, mainly just cause delays in processing. The sadder thing is the money taxpayers lose because of rushing."

The tax official said that when people are hurried and trying to get the return in the mail by the deadline they frequently overlook legitimate deductions which could save them tax. They may forget that trip to the dentist or doctor that the insurance did not cover, or the interest paid out all year on their revolving charge accounts.

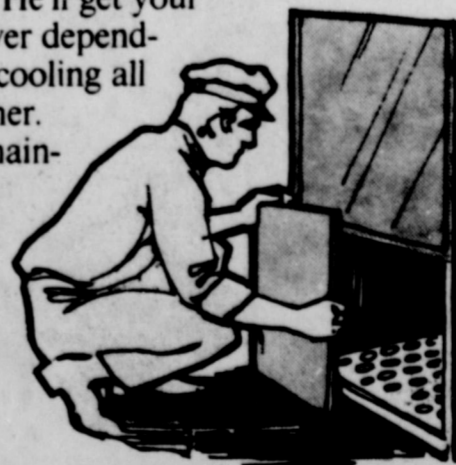

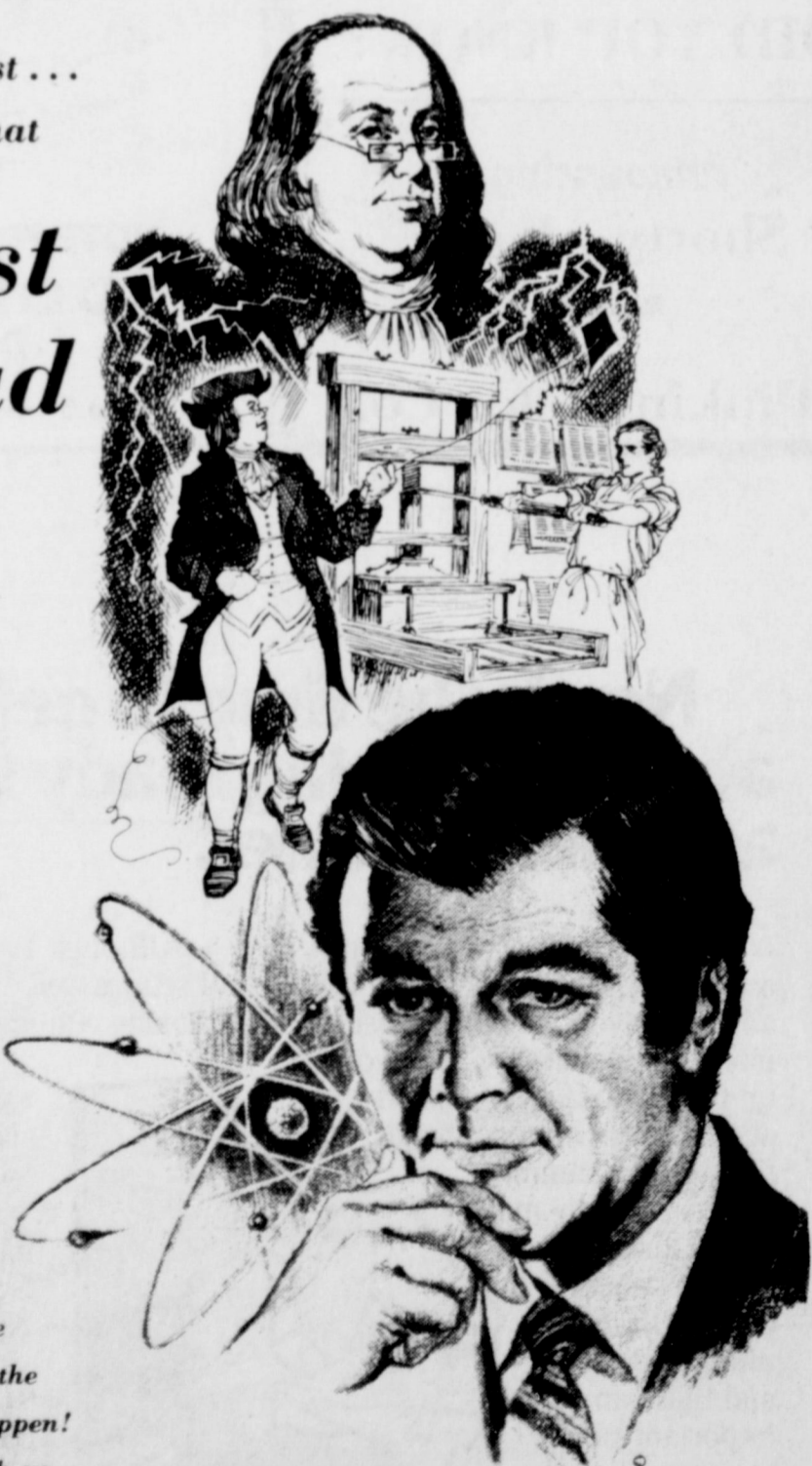
