

THE EIGHT SURPRISES

HAS THE WORLD GONE TO HELL??

On March 27, 1973, I heard Garner Ted Armstrong say over the television:

"There is no way you can have any optimism for the continuation of life on this earth because of the pollution, over population, and results of technological advances

It bothers me that there are so many purveyors of gloom who talk about the hopelessness of our future.

There is an entire spectrum from zero to infinity, of views and actions on almost any problem. Let's take the pollution problem, for example. We all know there are still some companies and cities who put toxic gases and liquids into our air and streams. It's almost unbelievable that many of our large cities still discharge raw sewage, or only partially treated sewage into our streams. Both industry and the cities should be stopped immediately from these flagrant violations. On the other extreme we have those people who wish to have distilled water in the streams and zero particulates in the atmosphere. These are impossible concentrations and could not be attained even if we had no people on this earth. The answer, obviously, is somewhere between these two extremes. Just like most of you, I am a family man. My lovely wife and I have four wonderful children. It is my wish that they have clean air to breathe and clean water to drink. Not distilled water nor absolutely pure air, but I do want them to have odorless, non - toxic, clean air, and clean water. I believe we still have a great deal of environmental work to do in the USA. I believe, however that extremism is bad on either end.

We're all deeply concerned about reports of the destruction of our environment as a result of technological recklessness, over population, and the lack of consideration to the preservation of

As Chairman of the National Air Quality Commission I have to read great amounts of technical literature in this area, I've turned up a lot of evidence that I'd like to share with you.

Some of the people, who are filled with gloom and believe we have no future, blame our apparent demise on the Judeo Christian ethic that it is God's will that man exploit nature for his proper ends and that we have overdone it. Others recommend that we return 2500 years and embrace the practices of druidism. Many many people express a disdain for science and mistrust in technology in general.

They say our automobiles are no longer a wondrous method of freeing man from his immobility, but instead have become terrible polluters and ultimately piles of junk to desecrate the landscape. Electricity, which has been the most convenient form of energy ever available, has come into disrepute. The bad industry that produces electricity is looked upon as an evil organization of the establishment whose objective is to create new radiation hazards with nuclear power plants, cut down trees, stick poles into the ground and pump smoke into the air to poison all of us.

It's a gloomy picture indeed. But I've found out this outlook is not justified. This is what I'd like to talk to you about. I hope you'll understand that I'm speaking to you as one who understands elementary science and engineering and not as an emotional supporter of any particular "side" of ecology. Some of the facts I will mention will surprise many of you. I can assure you that my conclusions are supported by evidence that is difficult to interpret in any other way. They may be verified by anyone who wishes to do

# **Prospects Bright** For Rate Relief

Eastland County is amoung the seven counties requesting a change in the Insurance Rating. Tuesday Spokesman, Raymond Thompson of Graham, asked the Stare Board of Insurance to transfer these counties from the north northwest territory to central inland territory for rating puposes, a move which would reduce premiums for tornado, hail and windstome insurance.

Several Eastland men went to Austin for this meeting. The counties asking to be transfered are: Wise, Jack, Young, Stephens, Eastland, Brown, Coleman and Concho counties.

There will be a decision made at a later date as to whether or not the counties will be changed.

Those attending the meeting from Eastland County were: Bruce Pipkin. Lewis Tiner, James Wright, Judge Scott Bailey, and Mayor W.Q. Ver-

The frontier of the north northwest territory starts with Montague County, proceeds south and west through Wise. Jack, Young Stephens, Eastland, Brown, Coleman and Concho counties, the Follows a straight line west to the Pecos

All Big Country counties except Erath, Comanche, Mills, and McCulloch on the southeast are in the much more expensive north northwest territory.

The board may someday adopt a rating system classifying each of the 254 counties according to its individual loss ratio, but it will take time to collect the statistics needed.

The spokesman said he thought past history of casualty loss in the counties in question justified their transfer to the much less expensive inland central territory, but said only the State Insurance Board would have the statistics.

A staistician for the State Insurance Board, Kenneth Arnold, siad that rates are bosed on a 10-year histories of the casuality losses. The statistics are only on a yearly bases that are kept. The only useful statics

# Leon To Be Bass Stocked

Lake Leon is among the number of Texas public lakes to be stocked with Florida bass this year, according to fisheries biologist at the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Tentative plans are to stock 21 lakes with some two million

Starting in April, 700,000 fry, 1.535,000 fingerlings and 300 broodfish will be released. The broodfish will be placed in nursery coves on three lakes -- Livingston, Sam Rayburn and Falcon. Brood bass already have been stocked in a 50 - acre cove at Falcon.

TP&WD officials hope that the Falcon brooders will produce 300,000 to 500,000 samll fish for release in the border lake without trying up valuable state hatchery ponds.

According to Billy White, department fish culturist in charge of rearing Florida bass, the state has some 400 broodfish on hand in hatcheries but could use 1,000 of the fish. Most of the broodfish are



EASTLAND MEMO

Have you thought about how high, or fast birds fly? All of us have been hypnotized at various times watching a bird in flight, whether it be a sparrow, woodpecker, or a turkey vulture. Some of the facts surrounding bird flights are interesting.

It appears that birds fly from speeds of 20 miles per hour as the sparrows, crows, robins and pelicans, to the 50 mile per hour records of wild turkey, hummingbirds, canvas backs and golden eagles, and yet still faster to falcons, and plovers. The barn swallow looks fast but would get ticketed on the freeway for going less than 30 miles per hour. These various speeds surely are dependent on size, wing spread, and natural ability. In migration the slow pokes have to stop and eat more often, which would increase the chance of a bird sighting by a person on the ground. These slower birds no doubt have a higher mortality rate being subject to more perils on, and close to the ground. Logic, which is not always the same in nature, would seem to encourage these slower birds to fly lower, to be close to feed.

A fact that may force birds to fly at certain altitudes is the height of favoring winds, but seldom is this over 5,000 feet. The smaller birds seem to hold at a maximum up to 1,000 feet. There are many accounts of these smaller birds being found dead in large numbers at the base of skyscrapers, lighthouses and monuments, apparently on night flights, or during zero visibility when migrating. In rare cases storks, and cranes have been observed flying over the 20,000 foot Himalayas. We must conclude that flight speeds, and height have a bearing on a given bird's migratory habits. Further aspects of bird migration will be examined in our next article. In the meantime you can keep an eye open for the harris sparrow, which winters in our area, and looks as though someone wiped soot in his face. A ribbon of black goes from his crown, down over his face, and finally to his bib. The black may not shade all of his eyes. The harris sparrow is larger, and not to be confused with the house sparrow. This sparrow hops and flits sharply while scratching and eating, mainly on the ground. You can add this bird to your growing list of sightings if you will look carefully.





> FINANCIAL CONTRIBUTION on population. The U.S. represents only 5.6 percent of the total population of the membership of the United Nations. Even if we take into consideration the fact that the U.S. has a permanent seat on the Security Council, there is no reason we should pay by far the largest share of any member nation. We pay almost twice as much as the Soviet Union and, even here, the Russians are in arrears of payment. So here many of the Arab nations which have money to burn but have joined many of the little nations in calling the tune.

CONGRESS HAS AT LEAST TAKEN ACTION TO LIMIT THE U.S. CONTRIBUTION TO 25 percent of the regular U.N. budget but on the basis of population we would only pay 5.6 percent which, in dollar terms, would be a saving of some \$338 million.

BACK TO THE FIRST PROPOSITION, WE SHOULD IMMEDIATELY SHOW our independence of the U.N. General Assembly but go ahead and participate in the Security Council deliberations, which are really the only important function. This action was taken in spite of a vote in 1972 by Puerto Rico which rejected independence by a 96 percent vote to remain a Commonwealth of the United States
