There's been considerable discussion of the Salk polio vaccine — far-and-away most of its favorable. The other day our phone rang and Mrs. F. N. Sayre suggested: "Read the report on it, from Denmark, in Parade Magazine." This we did.

And here's an impressive excerpt: "Copenhagen (Dateline) Denmark, the country of Hans Christian Anderson, cheese and Victor Borge, is rejoicing. And with good reason. Danish doctors, using America's new Salk vaccine, are convinced that they have licked polio, which in 1952 and '53 ran rampant over this little nation (pop. 4-2 million) causing more than 7,200 cases.

Since last April, 400,000 Danish children between the ages of 6 and 12 have been inoculated. Each second Salk shot six weeks later. What makes the Danes so confident that, as of this writing, the case of infantile paralysis has developed in the inoculated youngsters.

(Canada has had similar good results with its vaccine program.) Thus, doctors here are willing to assure Americans — and anyone else concerned — that the vaccine is safe and effective. "Convincing, isn't it?"

Private Rody entered the Army in January of this year and completed basic training at Fort Leonard Wood, Mo.

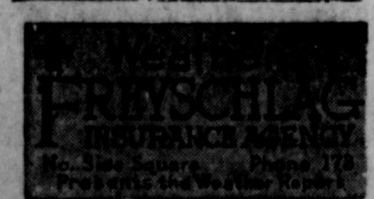
Rody is a 1953 graduate of Plains High School.

McFarland Is Promoted By Peanut Ass'n.

Paul McFarland of Eastland, an employee of the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association for seventeen years, was promoted from auditor to a assistant manager and auditor with an increase in salary at the recent meeting of the association in Fort Worth. S. E. Cloninger was re-elected manager of the association.

J. E. Thigpen, director, Oils and Peanut Division, Howard A. Akers, chief, commodity Programs Branch both of Washington, D.C., and E. E. Dennard of CSS Commodity Office, Dallas, met with growers to discuss the over-all operations of the 1955-56 Peanut Program.

J. E. Britte, Pleasanton, was re-elected chairman of the board. H. H. Hudson, Holdenville, Oklahoma, was made vice president of the board. D. E. Warren, Gorman, was re-elected secretary-treasurer.

Advance Growers' \$228 — Provided parity does not change upward, which will be determined after July 31, SWPGA will advance to growers \$228 per ton on 70 base grade peanuts in all areas.

The board unanimously agreed to inform growers in all areas that the advance of \$228 will be made available to all growers, and that growers should receive more than \$228 per ton or place peanuts under loan. As long as trade pays more than \$228 SWPGA will make no attempt to acquire peanuts under loan. Growers have the privilege of selling outright or placing under loan.

Shellers who sign warehouse contracts with SWPGA agree to receive any farmer's peanuts who desire to place their peanuts under loan, provided they meet minimum standards.

Policy for approving warehouse locations and warehouse was established for 1955-56 crop year only.

Annual Meeting in Okla. — The annual meeting of growers and members will be held at the Oklahoma Experiment Station, Stratford, Oklahoma, in September or October. Announcement will appear in the September issue of southwestern Peanut Growers' News.

Scratching Cat Is Found Rabid

Miss Buena Van Winkle of Gorman saw a stray cat while driving on the Desdemona highway, near the Rayford Burgess home.

So she picked up the pet, to give it a home. Presently the animal scratched her.

Parker Tells Texas Bond Sale Success

Guy Parker, US Savings Bonds sales chairman for Eastland County, Saturday afternoon told of the successful selling of the bonds to Texas the first half of this year.

Mr. Parker had just received word from Nathan Adams and Ed Gossett, co-chairmen of the bonds advisory committee for the state, to the effect that more than \$101 million worth were purchased in the six-months period.

Sales of the bonds throughout Texas for the first six months up to July 1 totaled \$101,606,381, including purchases during the month of June amounting to \$13,787,277.

"At the half-year mark 50.3 percent of the state's 1955 Savings Bonds goal of \$201.9 million was attained," the co-chairmen told Mr. Parker. "It should be emphasized, however, that bond sales generally have been greater during the first half of each year and it is urgent that more people in every county of Texas buy more bonds during the remainder of this in order for our state to achieve year."

"This is going to be necessary its proportionate share of the \$5.5 billion national goal this year for this vital program. It is essential to the sound money and stable economy plans for our nation, every community and each individual," they added.

The co-chairmen urged a 10 percent increase Bond-a-Month or Payroll Savings Plan deductions during the remaining months of this year. They also urged the more than 1400 Savings Bonds volunteers throughout the state to step-up the program in every county so that Texas can put its 1955 bond goal over the top.

Revival Meet At 1st Baptist Closing Sunday — The revival continues through Sunday at First Baptist with Dr. Jesse Northcutt of Fort Worth bringing messages that are "stirring the souls and minds of the people," it was stated.

Attendance has been outstanding at the early morning services and many visitors have attended the services. "The special music composed of duets, trios, quartets and solos under the direction of Gayle Bowen, have been exceptional."

As a climax for the revival the Sunday school teachers and officers are working toward a goal of 500 in Sunday school Sunday. An effort is being made to exceed the high attendance record set at the close of the spring revival, which was 466.

Much visitation has been done and expectation runs high for the Sunday services. Dr. Northcutt will preach both services Sunday. The choir will sing "O, Thou in Whose Presence" for the special music in the morning service.

1 More Rain Due To Make Peanuts

"Farm prospects are the best his summer in Eastland County he've been in several years," said County Agricultural Agent M. Cooper Saturday.

However, there was one "fly in the ointment" — or, rather, bug

in the crop. That's the cotton pest, according to the agent.

"Some are half-knee-high. Part of the crop, by the way, will require only one more rain to make a good yield." The peanut harvest is in September and October.

"Feed crops are looking good, too," said Agent Cooper. "It's chiefly maize and hedges."

Little corn is grown in Eastland County. This year's crop which was planted early did well, Cooper said.

The stockmen, he pointed out, are favored with good pastures and plenty of stockwater, due to copious rains earlier in the year.

Regarding the cotton situation, he said: "The pests are working on our cotton — flea hoppers, bollworms, bollweevils. Not enough spraying has been done, by the way."

The county's great crop, peanuts, is looking fine, however.

Prepare white sauce: Melt 2 tablespoons butter or margarine, remove from flame, stir in 2 tablespoons flour to make a paste. Add 2 cups milk gradually, salt and pepper, 1 cup processed cheese cut in pieces, return to heat, and cook, stirring constantly, until smooth and thickened. Combine with vegetables. Pour into greased casserole, sprinkle top with grated cheese, paprika, and bake 10 minutes. Set under broiler 2 minutes to brown top.

3. Sour cream. Top vegetables with sour cream and paprika.

Iced Coffee, Greatest Refresher of All



WE doubt whether the First Aid Book gives any hints on the care and feeding of slightly wilted friends on hot summer afternoons, but we're going to remedy the deficiency, right now. Our suggestion is that you feed them iced coffee — lots of iced coffee — in tall, elegant glasses with little droplets of frosty coolness clinging to the outside of each glass!

Of course, you must be certain that the coffee is just the best you know how to make. It will always be that if you bear in mind the very simple rules of good iced coffee-making.

First, remember that good iced coffee starts with good hot coffee, and that takes two level measuring tablespoons, or one Standard Coffee Measure, of coffee to each three-quarters of a measuring cup of fresh cold water. You have a choice of several ways to convert it into iced coffee.

Quick Method with Coffee Ice Cubes: Freeze regular strength coffee in your freezer tray to make coffee ice cubes. (This may easily be done by brewing extra coffee at breakfast time for the purpose.) When the time comes — at you need your iced coffee, make it regular strength and pour it immediately into tall glasses filled with coffee ice cubes. They will cool the coffee quickly without diluting it.

Quick Double Strength Method: Make coffee double strength by using half the amount of water to the usual amount of coffee. Pour over regular ice cubes in tall glasses. The extra strong coffee allows for the dilution caused by the melting of the ice.

Pre-Cooled Method: Make regular strength coffee. Cool in a non-metallic container for not more than three hours or, if the container is tightly covered, chill in the refrigerator. Pour over regular ice cubes when the iced coffee is needed.

Finally, don't forget that instant coffee, made according to the directions on the label of the jar, makes a truly delicious brew with a minimum of fuss and bother. Serve all iced coffee with regular ice cream and sugar, or a simple sugar syrup, to taste.

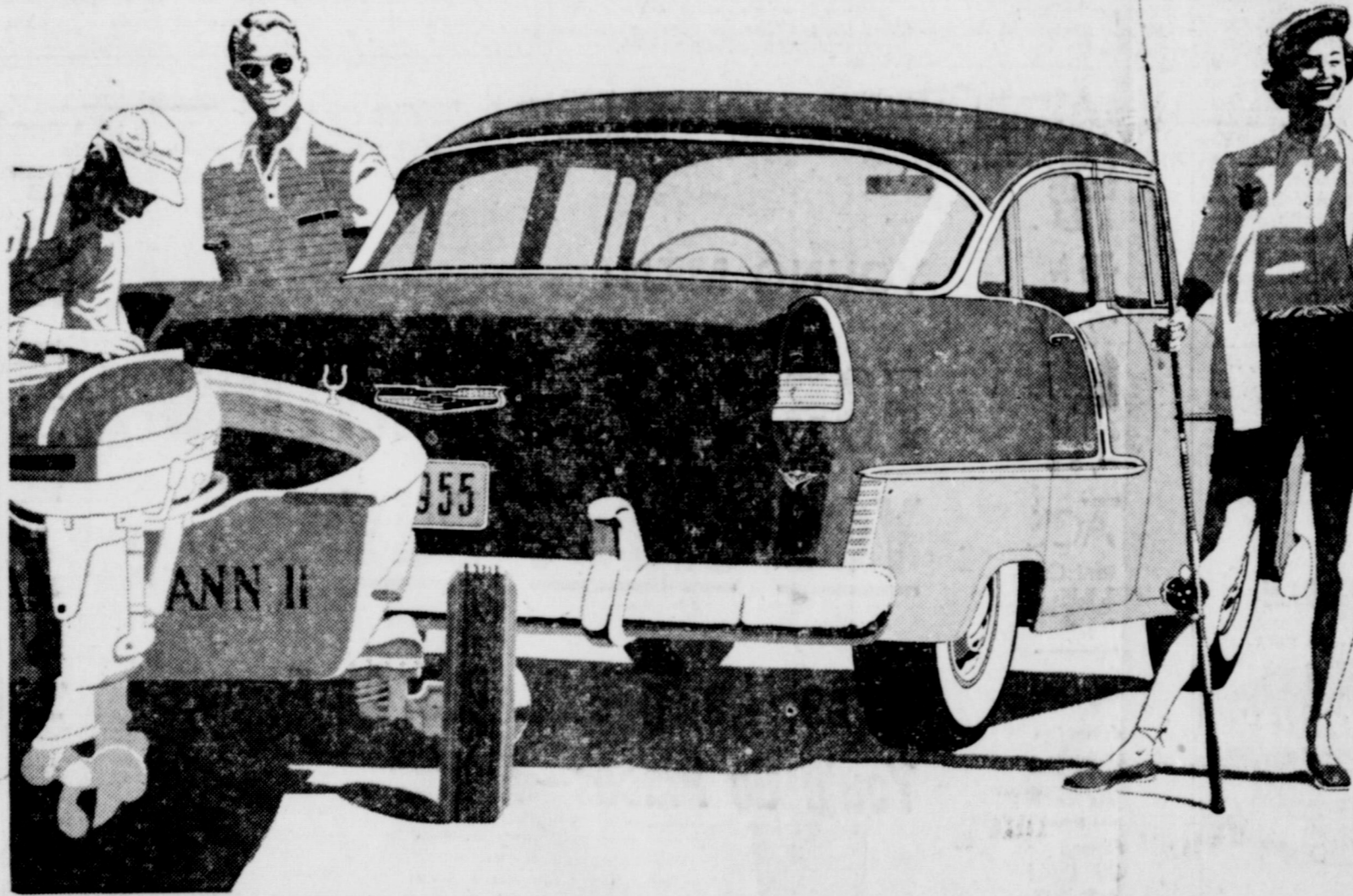

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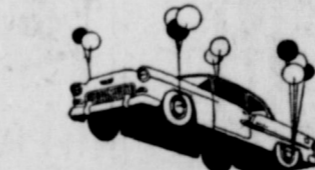
