3-Way Pavement Serves Cheaney

Rising Star Man, Killed By Crash, Buried

James Anderson Conner, 47, Rising Star, killed instantly in a three-vehicle smash-up in Abilene, was laid to rest in the Rising Star Cemetery Sunday afternoon.

Funeral for Mr. Conner was held at the Higginbotham Funeral Chapel at Rising Star. The Rev. W. L. McKinnley, pastor of the Assembly of God Church there, officiated, assisted by the Rev. A. R. Strickland.

Born at Dryden, Okla., Mr. Conner had lived at his home seven miles north of Rising Star since 1946.

Survivors are his wife; one son, Jimmy Leon Conner, who is stationed with the Air Force at Lake Charles, La.; two brothers, W. H. Conner, pastor of the Pentecostal Church at Olton, and Clarence Conner of Colorado Springs, Colo.; and one sister, Mrs. W. C. Isbell of Grand Prairie.

A Fort Worth man was charged with negligent homicide in the death here of the Rising Star farmer.

Robert Franklin Carson, 32, was freed on a \$1,500 bond.

Carson was driving a pickup that collided with a passenger car driven by Conner. The two vehicles spun, crashing into a station wagon stopped at a stop sign at the intersection.

Mrs. Conner was treated at Hendrick Memorial Hospital for cuts and bruises and released. Two other passengers in the car were not hurt.

Carson and a passenger in the pickup sustained minor injuries. Eight persons in the station wagon, including the driver, Margaret Lorena Wallace, 26, of Los Angeles, escaped injury.

Other nearby improvement includes work in the vicinity of Lake Leon by Commissioner B. M. Bennett, who has graveled the road from the dam south, toward the Walter Duncan property — to the end of the pavement on No. 2214 farm - to - market road.

Another improvement has been the leveling off of the speakers' area, near the dam, in preparation for the Lake Leon opening celebration Sept. 3 and 4. This work also was done under the direction of Commissioner Bennett, using his own and some of Commissioner Arther's equipment.

Burleson Tells of County Speakings

Congressman Omar Burleson tells of his plans for returning to his district presently and about his speaking engagements in Eastland County in a release received by this paper.

"It is my intent to return to my district the latter part of August. I have been honored with an invitation to speak at several functions, including the dedication on September 3 of Lake Leon, sponsored by the towns of Eastland and Ranger. On the following Saturday, September 10, I look forward to having a part on the program at the Gorman Peanut Festival.

On both these occasions I will meet many of my friends of long-standing.

"After about two weeks of speaking engagements, it will be necessary for me to return to Washington for a short time, and then back home for further visits around over my Congressional District.

"A part of my duties during the fall when Congress is not in session is to look into the matter of government printing. An effort is going to be made to cut down the tremendous paper work in which the government is engaged. A part of the President now directs government agencies to cut out so much duplication of all sorts and kinds of forms and reports.

"It has been found that dozens of different departments, commissions, and bureaus actually harass people, and particularly businessmen, with a lot of needless forms for this, that, and the other.

"Perhaps the idea of some high government officials instructing federal employees to write 'chatty' letters might be a good one.

"A Southern newspaper commented, 'Don't be surprised to receive a letter from the Internal Revenue Service beginning, 'Good morning — How's every little thing? By the way, you really didn't think you'd get away with those large deductions you listed, did you?'

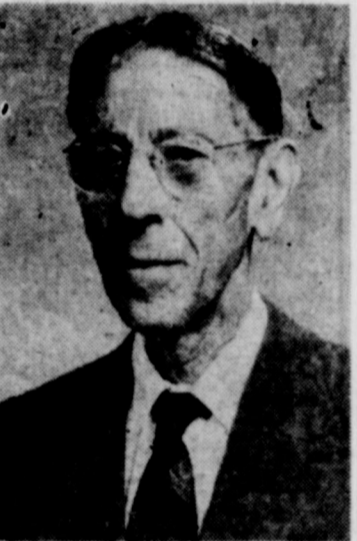
"If I can feel that this column is of interest while Congress is not in session, it will be continued for the time being, or at least until I am back home.

After 57 Years... DR. CATON RETIRES; 'TO TAKE IT EASY'

By Floyd W. Casebolt After fifty-seven years' practice of his profession, Dr. J. H. Caton, widely-known Eastland physician and surgeon, retired Monday, closing the career of a

man who has always been engaged in general practice and likes to think of himself simply as "a country doctor."

"Following a serious illness, my daughter tried to get me to retire last year," said Dr. Caton, "but there was some medical work I had begun which I wished to finish, first."

Dr. Caton was born in a log cabin in Red River County nine miles west of Clarksville, the county seat, Dec. 27, 1878, the son of James H. Caton and Mary Sue (Chambers) Caton, well-known farm couple. C. M. Chambers, who died a few years ago while serving as mayor of San Antonio, was a first cousin of his mother.

After attending the rural school at Caton—a community named for his family—in the Clarksville area, Dr. Caton attended high

school at Detroit, Tex. His father was both farmer and cotton gin-ner, so his son—outside school hours—worked at both of these jobs.

Upon graduation from high school, he first located in the old home community, Caton.

"That," he recalls, "was back in 1898. We didn't have a phone, so someone from a family in which there was illness would ride up to the front door and call Hello," to get attention. I didn't have an automobile until 15 years later, so it would be a trip, then, by horse-back or buggy—usually horse-back—to the patient's home."

From Caton, he moved to Breckenridge, and thence to Detroit. While living in the latter city, he entered military service in World War I and served as a first lieutenant in the medical corps. After the war, he came to Eastland, in 1919, and has practiced here ever since. Dr. Caton had bought some property in Stephens County while living at Breckenridge and, as it was oil boom times, came here to be nearby and, also, to be associated with his former commanding officer, the late Maj. (Dr.) George S. Murphy and the late Dr. H. E. Tanner, father of H. J. Tanner and K. B. Tanner of Eastland.

In 1902, he married Miss Annie Whitener of Detroit, Tex. She died, in Breckenridge, in 1906. In 1908, Dr. Caton married Miss Jessie Talbot of Montgomery City, Mo. To this union two children were born: David, who died at the age of 9 months, and a daughter, Nell, who now resides in Dallas. Their mother died in 1952.

Dr. Caton has been active in a number of organizations. He has been a member of the Christian Church since 16. Rotary Club since 1923 and is a charter member of the Eastland American Legion Post. He joined the Knights of Pythias in 1899 and the Masons in 1906, taking Masonic work through both the Scottish and York Rites and the Shrine. He is a member of county, state, Texas, Southern and American Medical Associations, the Railway Surgeons, Radiological Society of Texas, Radiological Society of North America and the Academy of General Practice.

Dr. Caton owns a home at 701 Moss in Eastland and he and Dr. S. R. Parks of Dallas jointly own a lodge on property at Roseville, between Sonora and Junction, on the North Llano River, which he built in 1938. Four or five times a year, he and friends and relatives journey to this rustic scene, for a few days' relaxation. July 4, this year, he took a party of twenty to the Llano River lodge. Formerly, Dr. Caton hunted wild turkeys and squirrels and also fished quite a bit. At the opening of the deer season, in November, a group of hunters go from Eastland and Dallas and stay at his lodge.

After his having been subject to call, in his profession, any time of the day or night for fifty-seven years, Dr. Caton was asked: "How do you plan to spend your time now, doctor?"

He replied: "Well, I'll have a chance to really and truly relax now—spend quite a lot of time at the lodge, probably, and, most of all, get in some solid visiting with old friends, something I've been wanting to do, for years."

But affable Dr. Caton, a bundle of energy all his life, isn't ready for a rocking chair. He'll be "around," all right.

A wildcat completed 15 miles southeast of Ranger has been placed in Eastland County Regular Field for proration purposes.

It is C. L. Gannaway of Wichita Falls No. 1 W. O. Dawson, A. Tarter Survey.

No. 1 Dawson had a calculated daily potential of 42 barrels of 42 gravity oil. This was based on a 12-hour gauge of 21 barrels.

Stuffed Peppers Go to Sea for a Flavorful Shrimp Cargo

FISH and sea food, now available everywhere, either frozen, fresh or canned, produce delicious protein-rich main dishes in well-balanced meatless meals. Here are three mouth-watering recipes for you.

Shrimp-Stuffed Peppers (Makes 4 servings)

Four green peppers, 1 can Spanish rice, 1 pound raw shrimp, fresh or frozen (or one 3-ounce can of shrimp).
Slice off tops of peppers at stem end. Clean out seeds. Cook peppers and shrimp in boiling, salted water about 5 minutes. (If canned shrimp is used, do not cook; simply drain and devein, if desired). Meanwhile, heat Spanish rice in a saucepan. Clean shrimp.

Reserve enough shrimp for garnishing, and chop remaining shrimp. Add chopped shrimp to Spanish rice and spoon into peppers. Top each pepper with a whole shrimp. To keep hot until serving time, put stuffed peppers in a saucepan with a tight-fitting lid. Put about 1/4 cup water in bottom of pan.

Cover and keep hot over low heat. Add more water if necessary.

Fish Sticks Oven Meal (Makes 3 to 4 servings)

On a large baking sheet, arrange fish sticks from the frozen package, slices of cooked sweet potatoes (either canned or fresh) and thick tomato slices. The fish sticks need no further preparation. Drizzle melted butter or margarine and honey over potato slices and season tomatoes with salt and pepper; dot with butter or margarine. Bake at 425 degrees F. (hot oven) 15 to 20 minutes.

Filletts with Brazil Nut Sauce (Serves 3)

Let 1 pound fish fillets thaw until they can be separated. Place in a frying pan. Add 1/4 cup water and 1 tablespoon lemon juice. Cover pan and let simmer 8 to 10 minutes, or until fish flakes easily

Brown Butter Sauce with Brazil Nuts

Put 3 tablespoons butter or margarine in a heavy saucepan, melt and cook very slowly until it is hazelnut brown. Serve over fish fillets garnished with toasted Brazil nuts.

To prepare Brazil nuts: Cover shelled Brazil nuts with cold water. Bring water slowly to boil and let simmer 3 to 4 minutes. Drain. Slice nuts. Brush slices with butter or margarine, place on cookie sheet or in baking dish. Place in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 10 or 15 minutes until golden brown. Turn occasionally.

Hollywood's New Dimension, Time, Described In Cinema

Pack in 1911, Hollywood's first screen adaptation of "David Copperfield", a feature-length attraction, ran into exhibition trouble. Thirty minutes in length, it could not be sold to the combination vaudeville and movie houses. It was just too long, and the theatre owners would not buy it to force down their patrons' throats. Finally, "David Copperfield" was issued in three ten minute segments, or installments, and it was easily sold, one part to be run on each change of program.

And, in 1915, when the accepted length of a movie had jumped to 50 minutes in length, Cecil B. de Mille caused a furor, and was called mad because he released a picture that was one hour and five minutes; in length.

In that same year D. W. Griffith was called insane when he released a film called "Birth of a Nation" in the unprecedented length of two hours and fourteen minutes; although its success was enormous, it was not until 1924 that producers started making a few pictures that would exceed the accepted one hour and one hour-and-twenty minute pattern.

All of which preamble points up to the fact that the accepted length of motion pictures has been changeable and variable since they became America's most popular form of entertainment; and all of which was brought on by the recent announcement that Cecil B. de Mille's latest Biblical picture, "The Ten Commandments," now in production, will run three hours and thirty minutes, which will be runner-up to the record three hour and forty eight minutes of "Gone With The Wind."

But, according to Hollywoodians who should know, this will not necessarily set a trend of three-hour or more super-films; granted, pictures as a whole are getting a little longer, with the average length today around one hour and forty-five minutes, about fifteen or twenty minutes longer than was the fashion ten years ago. There are a number of reasons for the longer picture; during the past decade the public has indicated that it was no longer satisfied with the "assembly-line" type of picture; they began to be more discriminating and selective; only the better films made money. In 1944, there were 430 pictures ground out in Hollywood; in 1954 there were only 232.

The producers were catering to the public demand for better and finer productions. With production halved, and with the miraculous new techniques in photography and screen presentation, the film makers had opened to them all sorts of new opportunities. Productions coming along now, and being planned, which will approach or exceed the two hour time a bit, will include such films as: "The Interrupted Melody," "The Cobweb," "The Scarlet Coat," "Ulysses," "Not As A Stranger," "Pete Kelly's Blues," "Land of the Pharaohs," "To Hell and Back," "Moby Dick," "Helen of Troy," "The Kentuckian," "The Conqueror," and probably a half-dozen others.

In addition to these, there will be the great number of "A" attractions which will come under the wire at around an hour and forty-five minutes. advised of and approve the sales and the manner in which the same is to be collected. Similar provisions apply to the making of mineral leases and other transactions. These provisions apply equally to the executor of a will, unless the testator has freed him from such requirements. A single short paragraph inserted in a will designating him as an independent executor in appropriate phraseology may serve this purpose. Then he will have a free hand to dispose of property upon short notice whenever a favorable opportunity arises, with a minimum of legal formality.

Since every application or other paper filed with the probate court and every order obtained from the court involves the expenditure of attorney fees for its preparation and court costs for its handling by the clerk, in proper cases many dollars may be saved for the heirs by adequate provisions of a will.

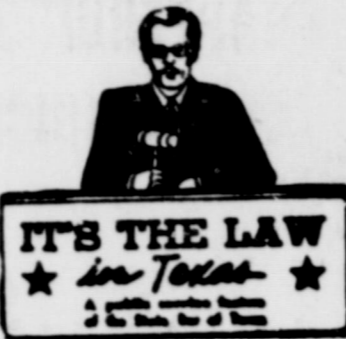

IT'S THE LAW

WILL MAY REDUCE RED TAPE INVOLVED IN SETTLING ESTATE

A properly drawn will can be the means of short-cutting many legal formalities, and save a great deal of time in distributing the estate of a decedent among his rightful heirs. It may also serve to save many dollars in legal fees and court costs.

As an example, whenever a person dies without a will and it is necessary for the probate court to appoint an administrator of his estate, the person so appointed is required to post a bond. This bond is for the purpose of insuring the faithful performance of his duties. When signed by individuals, the amount thereof must be double the estimated value of the personal property of the estate plus a reasonable amount to cover prospective rents and other income from real estate involved.

When issued by a bonding company, the estimated value of the personal property need not be doubled. The administrator's bond must be kept in force until the estate is finally closed and he is discharged from his obligation by the court.

The same rule applies to an executor under a will, unless the testator has specified that no bond shall be required. This provision may be inserted or left out of the will at the option of the maker. Needless to say, there are situations in which the bond serves a real purpose. But when not needed, the statutory requirements may prove a distinct annoyance to the executor and a burden upon the estate in the form of annual premium payments.

Another example: A court appointed administrator may not sell any property of an estate without an order of the court authorizing him to do so. He must make application to the court for approval of each sale. The court must be

of Representatives. "The vote was 209 to 203 in favor of the measure. Those of us who have been working on this matter for more than a year have known all along it would be a tremendously hard fight.

"It is to be hoped that the Senate will immediately act on this legislation when the Congress reconvenes.

"Each year I have been in the Congress, it has been my hope that we would not end up in a great rush of legislation crowded in during the last days. It invariably happens and this year is no exception.

"It always seems that we should have some of the time wasted in the earlier part of the year to apply to these last days. Twenty-four hours a day is simply not long enough when the Congress is in the process of adjournment."

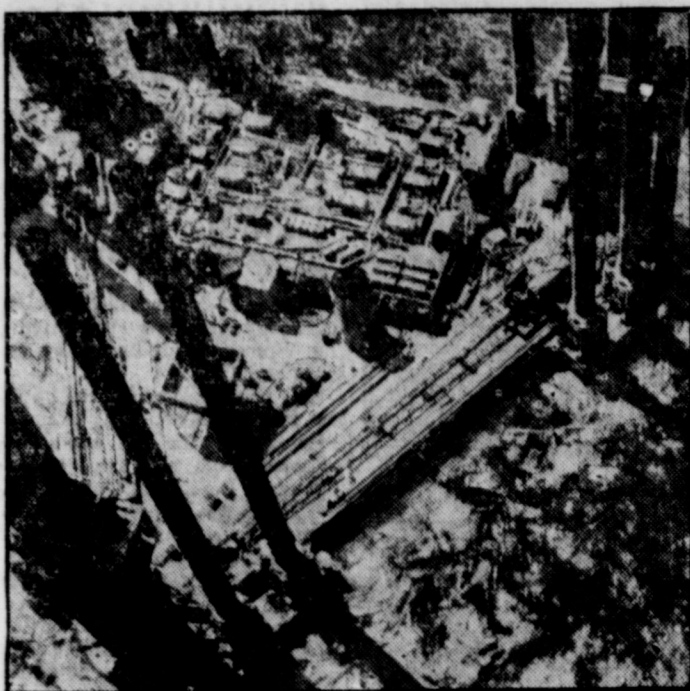

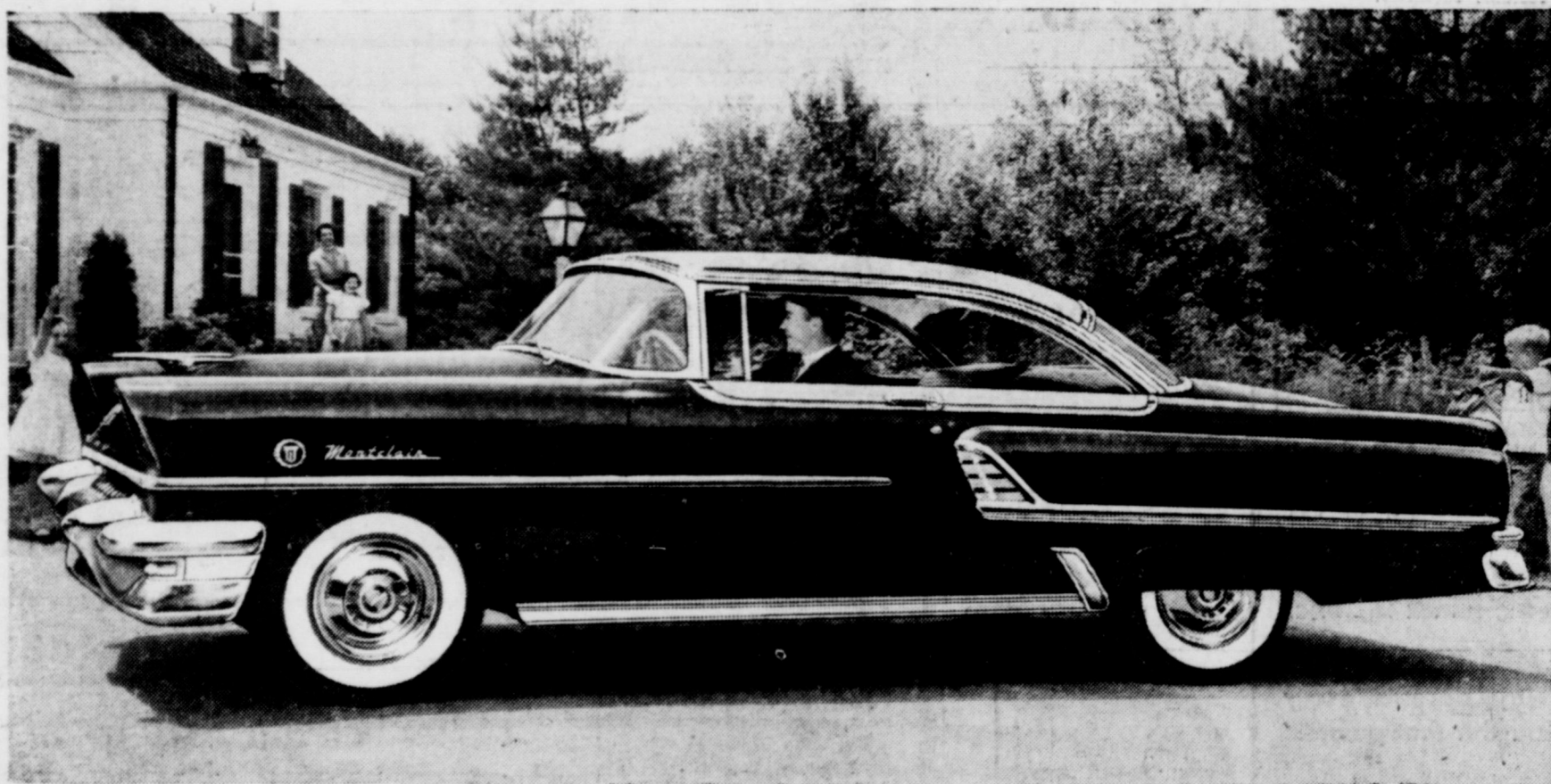

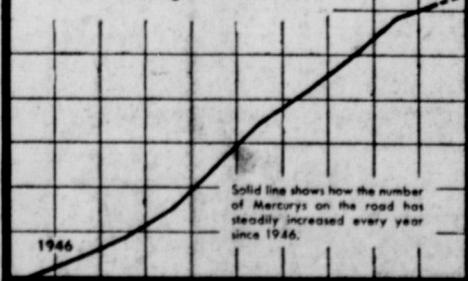
