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WATERMELONS OUR MAJOR CROP

Watermelons should be one of the major farm crops of Rastland county. This is essentially a truck growing country, all types of fruit and truck crops grow and do well here. Given an average season of rainfall and proper cultivation and care we can produce as big yields here as anywhere.

At the courthouse in Eastland two paved highways converge. At this point during the summer there is a steady stream of trucks coming together, heading west and carrying great loads of watermelons and other truck crops that might as well have been grown in Eastland county. The haul is longer and the expense is greater when these melons are trucked from the East and South of us and brought right back to a better melon growing country than that in which they were produced.

Speaking of food for thought, it occurs to the Telegram that we could do a lot of constructive thinking just along this one line. Why is is that these trucks pass us by and make a longer haul? The principle reason is that when this truck driver starts out he wants to stop where he is sure of getting a full load of the quality of melon he is looking for. And, as a rule, he cannot feel sure of getting it here. Could we produce sufficient melons of marketable size to supply this demand? Certainly we can grow this crop and can make the melons just as big as the trade demands.

Why do we not grow watermelons to meet this demand? We can and will grow any crop that can be profitably grown here if we know that there will be a market for it. When we can see the market passing right through the county making longer and more expensive hauls does it tot stand to reason that if we do not supply that market it is our own fault? Think it over.

Don't misunderstand us, we believe that Eastland clerks are just as efficient, just as congenial and work as hard as do clerks in any other town. Bees Carry One Half Their Weight At One Trip

An unladen honeybee ran fly about 25 miles per hour, the United Sintes Department of Agriculture estimates, but seldom flies faster than 15 miles per hour. When weighted with nectar, it often flies as rapidly as when unladen, although it sometimes stopa to rest on a long journey. Sometimes bees with heavy loads become exhausted when flying over lakes or rivers, fall into the water, and are drowned. A heavily loaded bee semetimes makes an ungraceful landing at the aplary, bumping into the hive or dropping to the strough before it. The lead of nectar which the bee brings to the hive varies with the density of the nectar, but the average load is about 40 milligrams, or about one-half the weight of the bee.
