

Security Field Man Coming To Eastland Monday

E. Glenn McNatt, field repre curity office, who will be in Eastland at the driver's license office in the City Hall at 10 a.m. Monday, today gave some pointers on the farm phase of social security He presented it as a question and - answer:

Question: What is a farm operator's responsibility with regard to filing a social security report of the wages paid to his farm workers?

Answer: Beginning January 1, 1955 the Social Security Law covers farm workers who are paid at least \$100 by a farm operator. In these cases, the farm operator will withhold 2 per cent social security tax from wages paid to the farm worker.

The farm operator will add 2 per cent as his share, and will file an annual report with the Internal Revenue Service. The report will show the names of each employee who was paid \$100 in cash in the year, his social security number, and the total amount of wages

If the total tax liability of the on the geographical center of Texmuch as \$100 by April 1, July 1, or October 1, he will deposit that tax money with Internal Revenue but will not report names of employes until time for his annual report. The farm operator will keep a permanent record of the name and social security number of all his employees.






