





FIRE LOSS ON THE RISE. The National Board of Fire Underwriters estimates that the fire loss in October totaled \$36,\$36,614—over \$5,186,229 more than in the same month last year. The total loss for the first 10 months of 1930 amounted to \$387,300,260, as compared with \$353,426,921 in 1929. The United States is once more on its way toward a record waste. Fire waste is inexcusable. All but an infinitesimal num-ber of fires could be prevented through the expenditure of a little time, a little thought, a little money. Adult Americans need to return to "school" long enough to learn the lessons of fire prevention.


