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SPLENDID SHOWING FOR THE NEWSPAPERS

A survey of the publishing industry by Haley, Stewart and company of Chicago shows that the last decade has seen an increase of 39 per cent in newspaper circulation and 60 per cent in newspaper advertising revenue.

Newspapers and magazines, the survey shows, are delivered to the reader at a price less than the cost of production. Advertising revenue making up the difference and providing the publishers' profit, and the reports said, advertising provides three-fourths of newspaper revenue and two-thirds of that of magazines.

Another reminder that the wise man who has something to sell contributes to the revenue of the publishing business as well as to the extension or expansion of his own business and of his own fortune.

COL. CAPONE FEEDS THE POOR

Chicago has one of the largest free soup kitchens in America. It is said that Col. Al Capone with some help from friends is financing the kitchen and feeding about 1100 men daily. This kitchen is not identified with any of the various relief agencies.

Col. Capone's critics are fond of saying that he has a gizzard but is without a heart. If he is feeding 1100 hungry men daily he must be the possessor of a remarkable gizzard.

TO WHOM DOES THE COURTHOUSE BELONG?

The Telegram continues to hear complaints that the county courthouse is closed to the public in the evenings and early part of the night just when many people want to be in the building for various reasons.

We have repeatedly called attention to the fact that these complaints are being made, but it seems that those in charge of the building do not take them seriously or else don't care for what the public wants.

The people of this county are paying for the courthouse and if they wish to use it in a way that does not damage it and does not inconvenience others, we believe they are entitled to the privilege.

MONUMENTS FOR THE OLD SOLDIERS

By the authority of congress the federal government will provide free of charge suitable monuments to mark the graves of departed Confederate soldiers. There is certain information and certain things that must be complied with, however, before these monuments will be furnished.

Dr. H. B. Tanner, secretary of the Eastland chamber of commerce is taking an interest in securing these monuments for those of this section who are entitled to them. He is doing it purely on his own initiative without hope of reward other than that he is performing a service for his fellow man.

EASTLAND COUNTY SCHOOLS SCORE AGAIN

Eastland county schools have just been awarded a neat little sum from the state department of education for state aid.

Whether you realize it or not the department of education does not hand out appropriations like this just to get rid of the money. The schools to which it is allotted must meet numerous, rigid requirements imposed under the law. It is a credit to the County school superintendent, county school trustees, trustees of the schools affected, the teachers, patrons and pupils, that these schools get this aid for it takes the co-operation of them all to get it.

ANOTHER TRADE EXTENSION PROGRAM

The committee appointed by the Chamber of Commerce to arrange for a series of programs of entertainment to be given each Saturday until Christmas, has announced the second of the series. This announcement was made in Tuesday's Telegram.

Also plans for decorating the downtown district for the holiday season are being formulated. In fact the spirit of Christmas is noted in the actions of the buying public even now. Other towns are getting ready to get their share of the holiday trade and if Eastland lags with her part of the program they will get a portion of our share.

ACREAGE REDUCTION.

Speaking for the Texas Bankers association, its executive committee has endorsed the Garrett plan for cotton acreage reduction, which would restrict bank credit to those farmers and landlords who agree to cut their cotton acreage 25 per cent below the 1930 planting. J. E. Garrett of Corpus Christi is the author of the plan. He is president of the Southern Cotton Reduction association. He is the head of two banks and plants from 7,000 to 8,000 acres to cotton in Nueces county. He proposes to go before the bankers of 11 Southern cotton growing states seeking approval of the plan. His plan outlines a program of milk cows, chickens, livestock and garden truck which a farmer must adopt to be eligible for a loan and stipulates that no credit be extended to farmers with which to buy food that can be raised on his farm?

ADVICE GIVEN BY A NEW YORK EMPLOYER.

W. C. T. U. Ends Convention At Houston Today

HOUSTON, Tex., Nov. 19.—With practically all major activities of the national convention of the Woman's Christian Temperance union entered its last day at the city auditorium today. Features of the program of the final day were an address by United States Senator Morris Sheppard, the father of prohibition and the annual convention banquet.

Two major reports during the morning session were delivered by Mrs. Mary D. Ream, department of social morality director, and Mrs. Eihelyn H. Roberts, narcotic department director.

Progress to a largely accepted single standard of morals with a preparedness of youth for marriage and parenthood was pointed out by Mrs. Ream.

The W.C.T.U. is fighting the drug problem through a program of education carried on through the younger people's branch at the Loyal Temperance Legion, Mrs. Roberts said.

Boyd T. Doty, attorney for the World League Against Alcoholism told the convention at the Monday night session that the recent election results must jar every dry out of lethargy.

"The smoke of battle is still clearing away, but we can see the strategy of the enemy and their strengthened position," he said. "These advances of the enemy, made possible by an outpouring of wealth by eastern millionaires, must not be overlooked by militant dry forces," he said.

The 1932 election will be a show down, Doty said, and dry battle fronts must be strengthened for the struggle.

"Some 24,000,000 new voters have come into the public life since the early days of prohibition," he said. "The success of the dry cause depends on our swinging their vote. If we can get them we will have to fight—and fight hard."

Charles V. Bob Surrenders On Fraud Charges

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—Charles V. Bob, mining stock promoter who disappeared mysteriously six weeks ago, surrendered at the district attorney's office today, to answer to an indictment in connection with the financing of some of his large stock enterprises.

Shortly after Bob disappeared while on a business trip to Chicago, an investigation was started by some of his many business. Investigators said collapse of some of these interests might cost investors as high as \$12,000,000.

Yesterday the grand jury returned a number of indictments in connection with the Bob affair and the promoter was surrendered to answer an indictment charging grand larceny. Immediate arraignment was planned.

Louis J. Rubin, a business associate of Bob, also surrendered today.

Bob, associates said before his reappearance, has been in New York since Saturday. His previous whereabouts have been kept secret even from his wife.

"It's for you," Barney said, handing over the telephone.

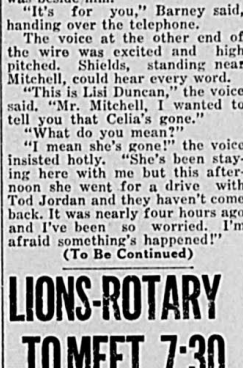
The voice at the other end of the wire was excited and high pitched. Shields, standing near Mitchell, could hear every word.

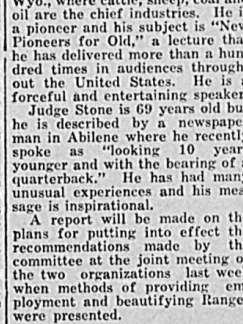

Official Count Of Census Announced

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—President Hoover today officially announced the results of the 1930 national census as it affects representation of various states in the house of representatives.

Outstanding gains were made by California which will have nine more members in the house, by Michigan with four more and by Texas with three.

Mr. Hoover said the official figures certified to him by the census bureau did not differ materially from the informal estimates made in recent months.

The change in representation causes certain states to lose 27 seats in the house, which are, of course, added to those of other states.

The president announced that the census showed the population of the United States, excluding the District of Columbia and various territories and possessions to be 122,093,455.

This section is well adapted to the raising of sweet potatoes and, if the industry developed to sufficient proportions, a kiln could be provided.

Three Deer Are Killed by Group Of Ranger Men

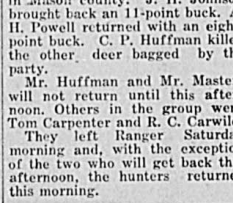
RANGER, Texas, Nov. 19.—Ranger hunters returned this morning with evidence of their skill.

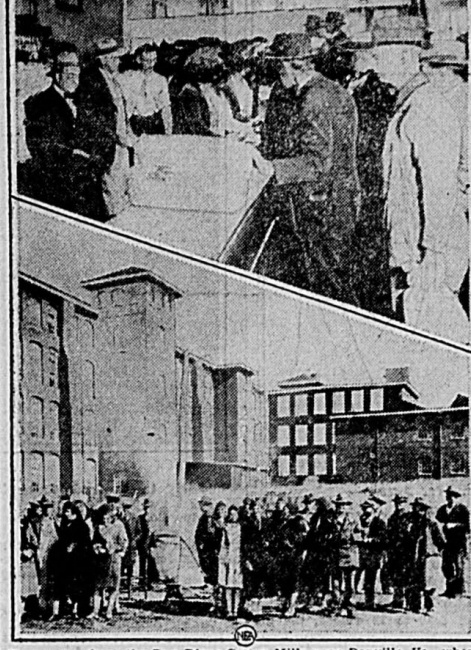
