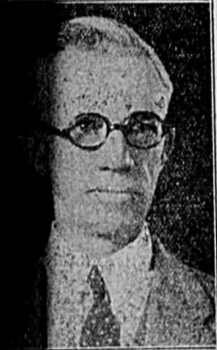
Bishop Hay Urges Preachers To Be Popular Without Sacrificing Principles.

ral of St. Jean, where doctors and nurses worked to save them. Unofficial estimates of the dead reached as high as 100.

Entire families were wiped out in the first landslide, which occurred at 1:15 a. m. Houses collapsed as though they were cardboard, falling into chasms opened in the earth.

The second fall of earth, shortly afterward, buried the debris under a huge mass of stones and rocks, trapping the living occupants and some of the rescuers who had arrived to save them.

Troops and Red Cross workers labored in the dark amid the screams and groans of the injured. A Red Cross ambulance carrying victims to the cathedral of St. Jean was caught by the third landslide, which came unexpectedly when the danger was believed past, and was buried under the tons of rocks and earth.

Lawyers Argue Film Contracts In High Court

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12—A brilliant array of counsel headed by John W. Davis appeared before the Supreme Court today to argue one of the most important pieces of litigation the motion picture industry has faced in many years. It is the attack of the government through anti-trust injunction proceedings on the standard form of contract required of motion picture exhibitors by the motion picture producers and distributors and the 32 film boards of trade representing them throughout the country.

Two appeals are to be argued. One is taken by the government from the decision of the present Solicitor General Thomas D. Thacher, rendered by him as a district court judge in New York City. This decree found there was no injurious restraint of trade shown on that part of the contract which provided that the exhibitor abide by the rule of credit committees of the various boards.

Thatcher's Finding He based this finding on the requirement of enforced arbitration of differences between the film organization and the exhibitors. The court found there was restraint of trade in that it excluded from the trade exhibitors who find the contract unacceptable.

The members of the producers and distributors association, of which Will H. Hayes is president distribute about 60 per cent of the movie film exhibited each year and the boards distribute about 98 per cent. Thus, the government argues they virtually control a total of between 22,000 and 25,000 motion picture houses.

OIL NEWS

By UNITED PRESS SAN ANGELO, Tex., Nov. 13.—Production from new wells in the West Texas permian basin declined last week when only three holes were completed in two counties with total daily initial yield of 1,585 barrels.

Two failures were listed last week; one in Pecos and one in Tom Green county. Three Pecos county locations were abandoned. Twelve new locations were staked.

EDOM, Tex., Nov. 13.—The D. H. Byrd No. 1, C. H. Morris, three miles northeast of here and 10 miles south of the discovery well at Van, was abandoned today at 4,739 feet.

The well had surface elevation of 570 feet and peccan chalk from 3,250 to 3,401 feet.

D. H. Byrd's Cherokee county well, six miles southwest of Alto, came in flowing 3,000 gallons of sulphur water a minute at 590 feet. Preparations were being made today to drill deeper.

ELECTRA, Tex., Nov. 13.—R. R. Clark No. 10, John and W. B. Bickley, C. M. and R. Survey three and a half miles northeast of Electra, is being completed as a 200-barrel at 410-50 feet. The well began to flow this week after the sand had been penetrated only a short way.

TEXARKANA, Nov. 13.—Promoters of the Citizens' Oil and Gas Company's Burnham-Burnett No. 1, test well three and a half miles southwest of here, declared today the hole would be drilled to 5,000 feet if necessary in quest of oil and gas. The well is now down 3,145 feet.

ABILENE, Tex., Nov. 13.—A six-hour swabbing test on the Pope and Anderson's No. 1 Swann, in the Noodle Creek-Tiner area, has proved the well good for 800-900 barrels of 40.9 gravity oil per day.
