Coach Carrol Shelton and James Hughes directed a session of pass defense during which everybody got a chance to throw the ball and catch it and run with it. There was a punting session and a workout on the tackling dummies.

Nothing strenuous was attempted, but it is a pretty good guess that plenty of Mavericks woke up Tuesday morning with sore muscles and aching backs.

All this is to be expected, however, and by the time the week is out the boys ought to be in shape for some fairly heavy contact work.

### POSSE TO ASSIST IN CAR PARK

Committees whipping together the details of the Lake Leon Sept. 3-4 opening celebration are coming into the last stretch.

Such interest in the Sept. 4 fishing rodeo, for which \$100 in prize will be given, is reported. The prizes will be: For largest bass, \$50; for largest catfish, \$30; in the youngsters' under-14 division — largest bass and largest catfish, \$15 each, and the largest aggregate catch (for youngsters under 14), \$10.

The catches will be weighed in at the station at the north side of the dam at 4 p.m. And the winners will be announced at the bathing revue, which is to be held at 5 p.m.

Fifteen to twenty girls are expected to be entered by sponsors in the bathing revue, also arranged for the north side of the dam. The entries have been coming in steadily.

At least three bands will furnish music the first day of the celebration. They are the Mosiah Temple Band of Fort Worth and the Ranger and Rising Star High School bands. They will play before the 2 p.m. address of Congressman Omar Burleson and while the boat races, starting at 3 p.m. are in progress. More than a hundred professional racers are expected to take part in these water thrills.

Starting off the first day's activities will be the luncheon for visiting personages at the Connellee Hotel.

The sponsoring Ranger and Eastland Chamber of Commerce have announced that a special invitation to attend the celebration has been extended to Mrs. Bob Young of Cross Plains, formerly of Baird, who won the \$100 prize given by both chambers for naming the lake Leon. Many hundreds of names from various parts of the world were submitted.

The Eastland County Sheriff's Posse will be present and attend of the orderly parking of cars of the expected throng.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon for Mrs. Sam Mayo, 62, at Wylie Funeral Chapel in Cisco, with interment following in Oakwood Cemetery.

The Rev. H. M. Ward and the Rev. Tex Culp, Baptist pastors in Cisco, conducted the services.

Mrs. Mayo died following an automobile accident near Cisco. Mrs. Mayo, who with her husband operated the Cisco Grille Cafe, received her injuries in a car-pickup collision on the Rising Star Highway some six miles south of Cisco Wednesday evening.

Mr. and Mrs. Mayo had been to a farm home to purchase eggs for their cafe at the time of the accident. They were entering the highway when their car was in collision with the other vehicle, it was reported.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Mayo were injured in the accident and taken to the hospital.

Mrs. Mayo had lived in Cisco all her life with the exception of some 15 years when she lived in Breckenridge, Kilgore and Corpus Christi.

She is survived by her husband of Cisco, and four sisters, Mrs. Ethel Bean of Corpus Christi, Mrs. Ruth Parmer, Mrs. Ida Massey and Mrs. Tom Graves, all of Cisco.

Seeking a ten-mile hard-surfaced road around Lake Leon replacing the extensive section now gravel, a delegation from Eastland and Ranger Chambers of Commerce was in Austin Tuesday to appear before the State Highway Commission.

## Terracing Improvements Moving Up In Eastland Co

The terraces on the Emery L. Jennings farm recently are now being built. Jennings has about 1 1/2 miles of field terraces and a diversion terrace. The diversion terrace is to be constructed above the cultivated field to protect the terrace system and carry outside water safely away from the field.

Terrace lines have also been run on Mrs. Sallie Bishop's farm located 9 miles north of Gorman, John Thurman farm and ranch located 11 miles southeast of Eastland, Ira Hanna, F. M. Spurlen and Charles T. Brockman of Eastland and F. R. King of Ranger plan to terrace their croplands in the near future.

Farm ponds have been staked for H. R. Casey, 1 mile southwest of Mangum, O. P. Carter, Orval Treadway and J. E. Weaver, located west of Gorman, A. E. McNeely 9 miles south of Cisco and Clint McCain, 6 miles southwest of Eastland.

Farm ponds have been built and checked for completion on J. M. Webb, J. W. Harper and B. M. Atwood of Eastland, W. J. Brooks and A. E. McNeely of Cisco area, and L. D. Waddington, Murry Ott and L. W. Riddell of the Strawn and Desdemona area.

Diversion terrace lines have been run and construction completed on Booth and Snoddy farms located southwest of Cisco. These diversions were built to protect cropland from outside water from pasture areas.

A farm water way has been staked for E. E. Donaldson, 7 miles southwest of Eastland. A water way is properly located well drained terrace strip designed to handle terrace water and in some instances outside water which can not be diverted from cropland.

Soil Conservation Service technicians assisting the supervisors of the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District have worked with land owners in planning, laying out and applying the above conservation practices.

It will soon be time to seed winter cover crops. No single practice can do more to protect and improve our farming land, especially the sandy soils. A cover crop will "cover up" the land and help to reduce soil loss from wind and water. Winter cover crops including a legume make both tight land and loose sand easier to plow. The tight land becomes more mellow, and the loose sand more firm. Cover crops add organic matter which helps to hold water, plant food and air.

Legumes add nitrogen to the soil which is essential to the growth of all crops and grasses. Cover crops will, under normal seasons, increase crop yields on the following crops and will furnish supplemental income from grazing and seed production.

The supervisors of the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District, along with others, wish to encourage farmers to plan now to seed their fields to cover crops this fall. The peanut fields are especially subject to severe wind erosion if they are not "covered up."

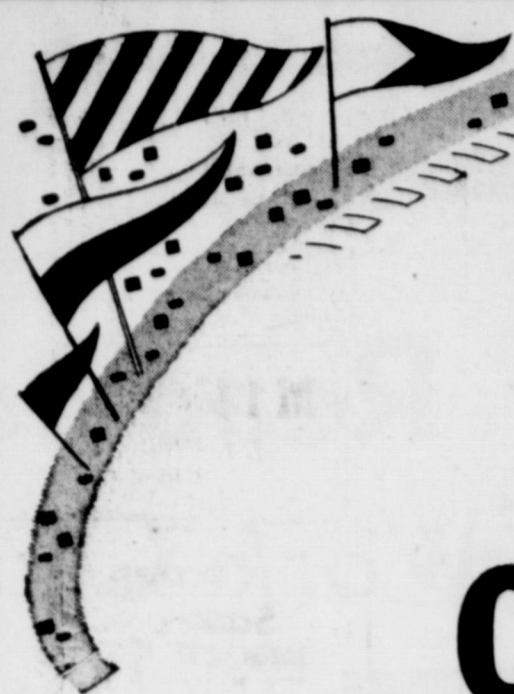

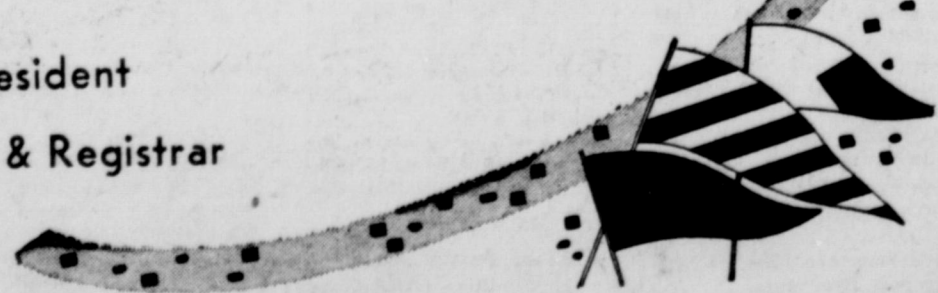

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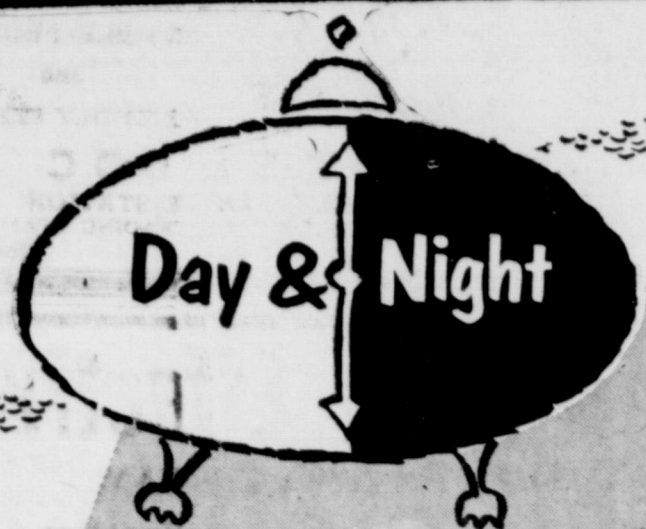
