## Ranger Rodeo Whirling To End Tonight

Eleven steer wrestlers staged a dazzling performance at the Friday night showing of the World's Championship Rodeo now in progress at Ranger.

The total time required to throw the first three steers was only 17.7 seconds. Cotton Procter, seventh man out of the chutes, however, made shortest work of his project — when he threw one of the wiry animals in only 4.7 seconds.

Antonio, placed fourth at 6.8 seconds.

Only two of the 11 steer wrestlers received no time. The steers of these contestants stopped in front of the chute allowing the wrestlers and their assisting hazer to overshoot them, before the steer had crossed the barrier.

C. P. Watson of Loco, Okla., was the only contestant to touch the 20 second mark, throwing his steer at 20.1.

## Three Injured In Auto-Truck Crash, Cisco

A 33 year old Dallas man, his 26 year old wife and their 8 months old son were seriously injured early Thursday about 3 miles west of Cisco on U.S. Highway 80 when their 1951 Pontiac plowed into the side of a heavy transport truck.

Injured were Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Lee Willis and baby of Oak Cliff, Dallas. They were en route home from a trip to California at the time of the accident. According to investigating officers, Mr. and Mrs. Willis were headed east on U.S. Highway 80 and the truck was headed west.

The Willis car was said to have swerved into the side of the truck and the impact drove the auto partly under the body of the truck. The car was demolished.

A Hammer Funeral Home ambulance took the injured trio to Graham Hospital where they received emergency treatment. Physicians referred them to Dallas specialists, and they were taken to Parkland Hospital.

Mr. Willis received a serious fracture of the left leg and knee, deep lacerations about the face, shoulder and chest and possibly other injuries.

Mrs. Willis received a fractured right scapula and deep lacerations about the face and head. The baby received head cuts and leg and possibly skull fractures.

They are selling advertising space in the programs, in an effort to raise in the neighborhood of \$2,000, having estimated that the expense will approximate that amount.

Several angles of the Leon celebration, set for Sept. 3 and 4, will entail expense, it was pointed out, as support of the project was solicited.

The Eastland Terminal of the Gulf Oil Corporation will go into operation Monday.

Considered the most modern transport terminal in the state, it is a \$1,500,000 installation, on a plot of ground consisting of 12.78 acres.

The gasoline will reach here from Fort Arthur by pipeline, traveling at the rate of 8-10 of a mile an hour and requiring 18 days to make the trip. From this installation, the gasoline will be sent as far as Fredericksburg and Del Rio.

The plant consists chiefly of loading rack, a parking area for trucks, two steel storage tanks for gasoline — one for 2½ million gallons, the other, 1½ million gallons.

Probable monthly terminal run will be 5 to 7 million gallons of gasoline.

At the first, there will be four permanent employees of the plant. Just how many transports and drivers for the terminal itself there will be has not been determined but the management expects there will be several, in addition to a number of common carriers.

Heading the terminal employees is Charles K. Turner, 34, superintendent, who was reared at Hillsboro — son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Turner of that city — and who has been with the Gulf since 1917. He was recently assigned to an ocean terminal at Houston as assistant superintendent. The terminal here is the fourth he has opened since March. Others were at Austin, Victoria and San Antonio.

Mr. Turner, who is unmarried, lives at Hillside Apartments. He was in the Army 1942-46. He is a member of the Methodist Church.

"We have employed all Eastland County men," said Mr. Turner.

The three permanent terminal employees, besides Mr. Turner, are: Arthur Carson Holdings, Cisco; Arthur Lee Gallagher, Eastland; and Glen Max Hart, Route 1, Ranger.

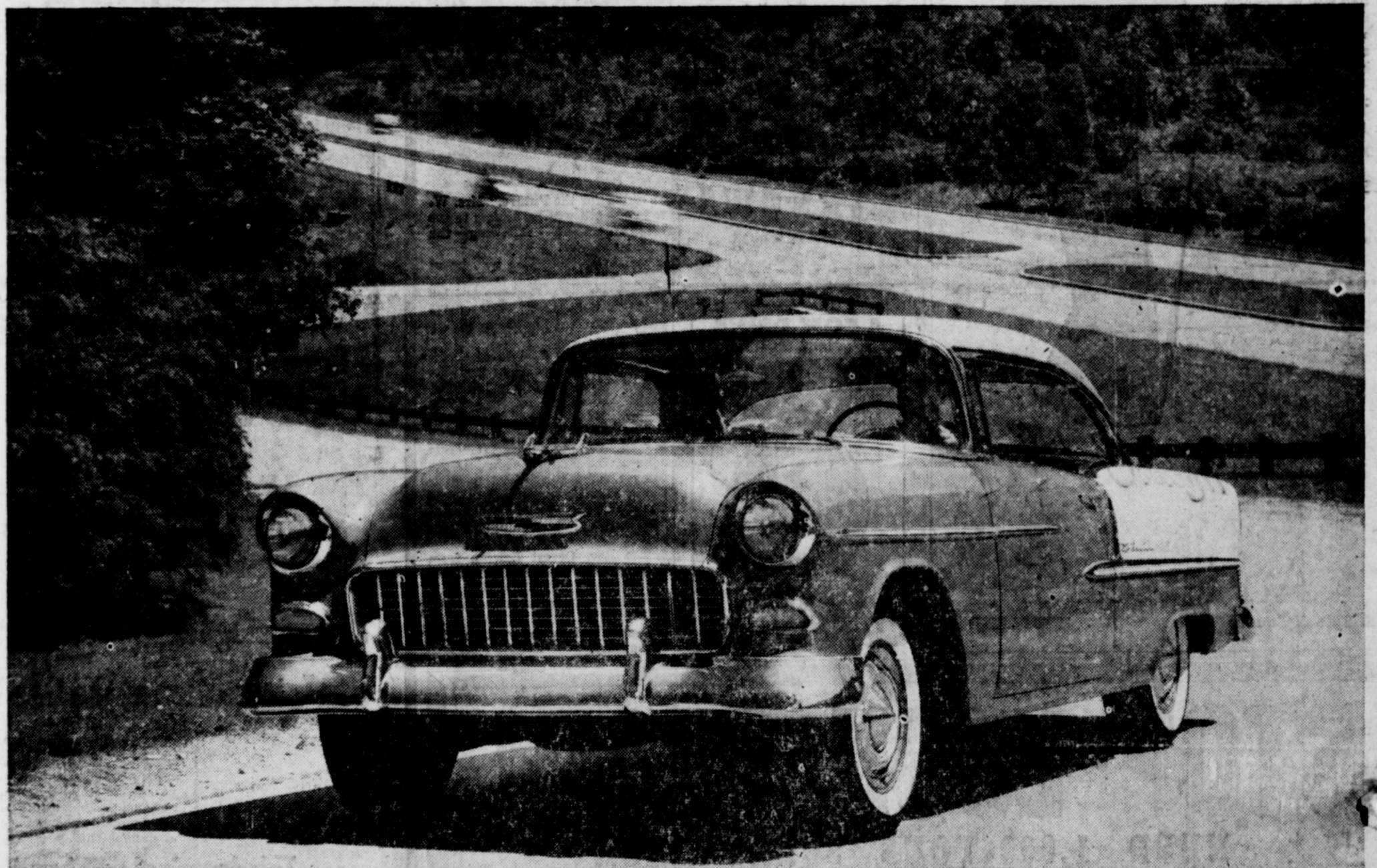

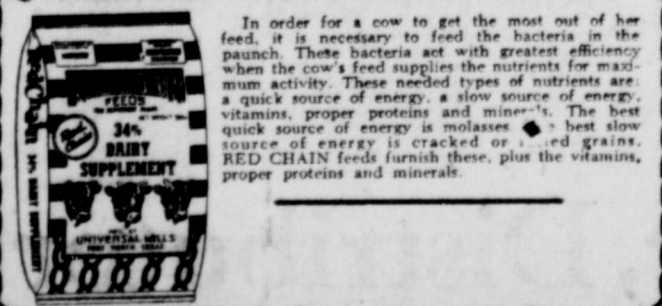
