APE AND MAN.

You can take seriously or humorously, as you like, the suggestion of Dr. H. S. Harrison, a British anthropologist, that man is a mistake.

Accepting the evolutionary theory that man and ape branched off from the same anthropoid stem, Dr. Harrison holds that it is a pity man ever parted company with his hairy cousin. He seems to think we have lost a good deal and haven't much compensatory gain.

It's no harm doing a little thinking about that, anyway. Hamlet may be quoted against the scientist. "What a piece of work is a man!" He exclaims. "How noble in reason, how infinite in faculty! In form and moving how express and admirable! In action how like an angel! In apprehension how like a god!"

At our best, when we are feeling good and full of egotism, we may agree with that. But we don't live up to the description much of the time. And Hamlet himself, as we know, lived unhappily, struggled with problems too big for him and came to a bad end.

The ape is fine—as an ape. We couldn't take the place of that bull-necked, low-browed, big-jawed cousin. We couldn't compete with him on his own level. We've lost a good deal.

Yet we seem to have got something, too, in parting company with him. If we're not so good an ape as he is, he isn't so good a man as we are. If he can break us in two, we can shoot him to pieces. We can beat him at boxing, baseball, tennis and golf.

We live longer, though more painfully. We have more needs, and work harder to supply them. We can look up when we feel like it, which isn't very often. We can look up when we feel like it, which isn't very often. We can hink about heaven, which he probably can't; also about hell. And we can have the satisfaction of feeling immensely superior.

BIG MEN AND BOOKS.

The Book Publishers' Research Institute conducted a survey to discover what the successful man of affairs reads. Opinion prior to this had been divided into three beliefs: that a successful man relaxed his mind with mystery stories; that he read nothing that did not have a direct bearing on his business, or that he read not at all.

Forty-three prominent men were willing to divulge their reading habits. It was found that all of them are book-minded, spending at least two hours a day on serious reading. Economics, foreign relations and the classics rank high in their lists, but biographies lead. These busy men read many of them, the current ones and older volumes. Nearly all of them say frankly that their own lives have been influenced in some way by great biographies.

An interesting sidelight on these readers is the fact that most of them buy and keep the books they read. Evidently the successful business man is not the cause of the hard luck of authors, publishers and booksellers.

THE PROSPERITY PUZZIE.

President William Green of the American Federation of Labor takes a firm stand against the unemployment "dole." A big majority of Americans will uphold him in that, especiany win the sad experience of Great Britain in mind. The effect of unemployment pensions paid by the government on the British system seems to be to make the evil worse by corrupting the self-respect of workers and drying up the sources of wealth.

Mr. Green proposes, instead, unemployment insurance for short periods, provided jointly by capital and labor; a shorter working day and week; a guaranteed yearly wage; division of work among workers in dull times. Many American employers are thinking along the same lines. Such proposals are no longer frowned on as "radical," but are considered by intelligent people as worthy of serious discussion.

His general aim is to adapt production to consumption, and so stabilize employment. This is the aim of all our economists and capitalists today. And here is the supreme problem. But the solution is far off.

It wouldn't be so hopeless if demand were definite. Then it might be possible for either organized industry or government, through economic experts, to calculate the demand, distribute orders among all the industries and keep goods flowing evenly from consumers back to capitalists and workers.






