THIS EARTHLY HEART.

Dr. Benjamin Ross, director of the Dudley Observatory at Albany, N. Y., says the earth pulsates like a human heart. When the poets sing of "this heart of earth" or "the earth's sad heart," we call it fanciful. Dr. Ross is not poetizing.

The earth, he explains, actually expands and contracts like heart. This, he suggests, is caused by bombardment of the sun in the form of electrons. These electronic showers, while causing expansion and contraction, also produce winds, storms and northern lights. He doesn't expect scientific men to agree with him, at least not immediately, but wants to give the world something to think about. He presented his theory to the American Astronomical Society at its annual meeting.

More and more, scientists are interesting themselves in the fascinating study of the sun. It is generally agreed that all the life on this earth is supported by the sun's energy. It has given out power at a tremendous rate, astronomers say, for billions of years, yet continues to pour fresh energy in o space without apparent diminution. How it keeps going is not yet understood. The only thing about which general agreement is developing is that the sun's energy is electrical—that it is a vast source of electric force.

Dr. Ross goes farther than this. The whole universe, he believes, is "an electro-magnetic field in which each rotating body creates its own magnetic field." He adds that 'in all probability the universe we know is but an aggregation of atoms in another, far greater, universe." Studebaker

THE RED MODE.

We think women kill men rather freely in this country, and get away with it too easily But our conjugal slaughter is nothing to that in France, nor is the feminine immunity so scandalous.

In the last couple of months there have been about 40 feminine murderers tried in Paris courts. In few cases was there any real question of guilt—that is, if unlawful killing implies guilt. But in every case but one the fair defendant was acquitted. The only prisoner found guilty was sentenced to two years in prison.

OUTDOORS FOR THE KIDS.

During the next few months, a physician points out, we may expect far more colds among children than there have been during the summer. This will not come from the cold weather. It will come from spending so much more time indoors. People living an outdoor life seldom catch colds and the ailments that follow colds.

The boys and girls catch cold in over-heated homes or in stuffy school rooms. However caught, the colds are passed on to other children, who carry them home and pass them around the neighborhood.

Keep the children outdoors as much as possible through the fall, winter and spring. Keep house temperatures down to a healthy level, 70 degrees or less.

The colleges of Columbia University, one reads, will offer more than 150 courses in religion during the coming year. In addition there are to be courses for home study in religious history and literature, as well as several religious conferences and a series of public lectures on religious subjects.

These courses and lectures may not be so well patronized as other branches of study, but when one of the nation's educational centers prepares such an extensive religious program for its school year, a genuine demand must be assumed.

CINCINNATI, Sept. 15.—"Soft" x-rays, similar to the familiar x-rays used to photograph bone structure, but differing in that they are only about one millionth of an inch long, may solve the problem of providing vitamin D., preventer of rickets, scientists at the University of Cincinnati announced today.

Experiments on rats in the laboratories of the university have shown ability of the new "soft" ray to cure rickets within three weeks, it was announced. Vitamin D is not gotten from tod liver oil, olive oil, milk and the like, the research experts said, while the new ray changes ergosterol, a substance in foods, into vitamin D.


