AUSTIN, Tex., Sept. 8—General
State-house opinion is to the effect
that Ross S, Sterling will resign
as chairman of the State highway
commission after the November
election and permit Gov. Dan
Moody to appoint a new member.
It would be posible for the
Democratic gubernatorial nominee
to select his own successor. He
could continue in the highway
commission capacity until he takes
office as governor and automatically appoint the new commissioner.
Such will not be his course, however, seasoned observers believe.
In January the new governor
will have to fill the place now held
by Cone Johnson of Tyler on the
commission. It is considered certain that he will reappoint Johnson if the present commissioner
wishes to continue at that post.
Two former highway commissioners have been most prominently mentioned as prospects for Sterling's place. They are D. K. Martin of San Antonio and R. M. Hubbard of El Paso, sponsor of the

entire nation stood united today




