This field was originally dream ed up by James Brock, who was Junior High School coach several years ago, but since it was an expensive undertaking the Quarterback Club took over the project and brought it to completion this

Approximately \$1,500 has been spent on the field by the Quarterbackers. After the surface was all leveled out by extensive grading, the field was covered with 700 yards of rich soil and conmercial fertilizer and sowed with Bermuda grass seed. After careful watering all summer long the turf is as beautiful and healthy as that in the Cotton Bowl in Dal-

The football field is also sur-rounded by a 440-yard track with a 220-yard straightaway. The Quarterback Club has not yet decided whether to cover the cinders or oil, but one or the other will be decided upon before track season opens and the final surface will be applied.

The proximity of the practice field to the school campus makes it handy to the storage rooms, lockers and showers, and the condition of the turf allows the boys to practice on the same kind of field they would find in regular season games.
