



Famous Pilot Completes Ex-tensive European Tour of Inspection.

Military Flying

By PAUL H. KING United Press Staff Correspondent ST. LOUIS, Aug. 14-The mili-tary air forces of the United States is excelled by those of European countries, James H. Doolittle, for-merty a licutenant in the U. S. Air Corps, said here after return-ing from a survey of Europe. "Although we are considerably behind in military flying, our com-mercial aviation is on a -ar with that of the Europeans," Doolittle said.

that of the Europeans," Doolittie said. Doolittie, after a three months aviation survey of Europe, blames our loss of military supremacy to abandonment of air racins. "The army stopped building rac-ing planes in 1925 and since then we have not added a mile to the speed of our pursuit ships. "The fastest planes we have to-day are the old ones which were constructed in 1925. But, the ful-laps and other countries have con-tibuted air racing activities and the lesson they learned has enabled them to surpass us," he said. "Some of the European fighting places can outfly the best we've sot by 90 miles an hour." "In commercial flying there is not a great deal of difference be-tween here and abroad. 




