All other conference teams are scheduled for Saturday night.

Ranger, which rebounded from an earlier loss to Tyler by galloping by the McMurry Frosh, 26-0, last Thursday, will face the strong Hardin-Simmons Frosh at Ranger; and the Schreiner Mountaineers—who appeared much improved by holding the highly touted Del Mar Vikings to an 0-12 victory, will go to Corsicana to play the Navarro JC Bulldogs.

Banner games of the week will pit San Angelo against the Wharton Pioneers at San Angelo and the Tarleton State Plowboys against Texarkana at Texarkana.

The San Angelo-Wharton contest may be an indication of the fate of the Rams in conference competition. Earlier this season the undefeated Wharton Club beat ASC, 28-7. Despite losses to Tyler and Victoria, San Angelo has great offensive prowess and might well be a bidder for its third league championship this season.

The Texarkana-Tarleton State game promises to give the Plowboys, who lost little prestige by being nudged, 20-14, by Kilgore last Saturday, another stern test.

Texarkana, back in JC football after an absence of many years, has rolled over three opponents, 106-0, but the East Texans are not apt to find the big and powerful Plowboys easy pickings. This game could be one of the best of the junior college season.

T-P Coal And Oil Approves Stock Split

FORT WORTH—Stockholders of Texas Pacific Coal and Oil Company in special meeting today approved a two for one stock split recommended July 27 by the Company's directors.

The action called for issue of one share of stock for each full share outstanding, or a total of 1,817,825 shares of new \$10-par stock to be distributed October 21 to share holders of record October 7. This will give the Company 3,636,143.125 shares outstanding, including 54,524 shares held in the Treasury. There is only common stock outstanding.

The split has the effect of a 100 per cent stock dividend, since \$18,178,250 will be transferred to the capital account from earned surplus, which is currently in excess of \$33,900,000.

Texas Pacific's last quarterly dividend was 45c per share, with the annual dividend rate currently running \$1.80 per share.

Furniture Laden Van Plunges Into Colony Creek

Hugh L. Lawson, 24, of Alexandria, Va., barely escaped injury Sunday morning when the moving van he was driving struck the Colony Creek bridge on U.S. Highway two miles west of Ranger Sunday morning.

The tractor remained on the highway when the van fell into the creek in about three feet of water. Lawson estimated the damage to the household goods at about 50 per cent and said that the tractor was a complete loss and that the van sustained about \$3,000 in damages.

The load is to be transferred to another truck for the final leg of the trip to California.
