Expect 300 At Convention Of Turkey Ass'n.
Three hundred persons are expected to attend the Central Texas Turkey Growers Association's annual barbecue in the Eastland City Park Thursday night.

Don Kincaid, association president, said that 275 attended last year and there appears to be greater interest this year. All turkey growers and others interested in the industry are invited to attend.

Alva Johnson Rodgers, 26, who admitted previously in a signed statement that he burglarized Eastland High School and stole 12 Eastland High School Band instruments, pleaded guilty to burglary and to theft and was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary in each case Tuesday afternoon.

Dist. Judge Turner Collie, who levied the penalties, informed Rodgers that they would run successively, thus Rodgers is due to serve four years.

The state was represented by Dist. Attorney Joe Nuessle and Earl Conner Jr. was attorney for the defendant. The state presented the statement Rodgers had given the authorities, in which he said that he drove to Eastland on the night of Sept. 12, broke into the high school, looking for typewriters, and when he didn't find them took band instruments instead.

The instruments were pawned and sold to individuals, pawnshops and music stores in Oklahoma City, where Rodgers had been living; Tulsa, Okla., and Dallas. Sheriff J. B. Williams, who traveled more than 1,200 miles in the investigation, and who brought Rodgers to the courtroom and took him back to jail after sentencing, said that the authorities found good co-operation in retrieving the instruments.

Rodgers was apprehended by the Dallas Burglary and Theft Bureau when he took a car he had been using back to the rental agency from which he had obtained the auto. Prior to coming back to Texas, he had been trying to sell five typewriters in Oklahoma City, according to Sheriff Williams.

In court, athletic-appearing Rodgers, whose trade is brick masonry, sat, cigarette in hand, at the counsel table, and had no comment to make, other than in one brief conference with his attorney. He looked down, at the table, while the attorneys spoke briefly before the court.

Sheriff Sweatt of Eldorado, Schleicher County, came to Eastland Wednesday afternoon to take Rodgers back to Eldorado to stand trial for theft of 17 typewriters from the school there.

Sheriff Williams picked them up in Oklahoma and Dallas, where Rodgers had disposed of them, and brought them here while working on the band burglary case.

Electric Score Board For Mavs Seems To Be Prospect

There is a movement under way in Eastland to provide an electric score board for Mavrick Stadium.

Although it has been discussed with several civic groups, the movement does not have an official sponsor at this time. That is, no certain group has agreed to sign upon the dotted line and put the project through.

The present drive for an electric score board which has been needed here for a long time, and which has been discussed before, was started by Henry Pullman and other interested Mavrick boosters, after the ill-fated extra long second quarter in the Merkel game last week.

Pullman contacted a firm in Houston who said they would install an electric score board here for \$750, and could do the job within seven days.

Contacts were then made with the Rotary Club, the Lions Club, the Quarterback Club, and other local organizations with a view toward raising some money.

It is understood the Rotary Club said they'd match anything the Lions Club was prepared to give, and the Lions membership voted Tuesday to match anything the Rotarians gave, subject to final approval by the board of directors.

The Lions directors decided that was all well and good but they wanted to know more about it before they started signing checks. They wanted to know, for example, what kind of a score board it was, and how big was it, and what all it was supposed to keep track of. They also wanted to know if it would be installed in a manner to protect it against the wind and elements, if it was going to work after it was installed.

Several citizens have asked the question "What kind of a score board can you get for \$750?" It is known that the board at Breckenridge, which is a good one, cost in the neighborhood of \$1,600. A similar board, recently installed at Sherman, Texas, cost \$1,500.

There is considerable expense involved in the installation of a score board. They must be mounted fairly high above the ground on something akin to telephone poles or better and a lot of expert electrical work must be done. Among other things a system of controls must be set up in the press box, or some other equally advantageous place. If all this expense has got to be taken out of the \$750, it is wondered what kind of score board would be left.

It is expected that all of these questions will be answered within the next few days, and if enough support can be found for the project, the board might possibly be installed in time for the first district game at home, if at all.

The first district game is with Gorman on October 21, but the first district game at home is with Rising Star on October 28.

LOCALS DUE TO GO ALL OUT FOR WIN

The Eastland Mavricks will take the field here Friday night in Mavrick Stadium at 8 o'clock and lick the tar out of the Dublin Lions.

That is our story and we're stuck with it.

The Mavricks are itching to put another bright spot on their record after the Merkel defeat last week and they're pretty apt to do it at the expense of Dublin.

Movies of the Eastland-Merkel game, which were shown to the Quarterback Club at the high school Monday night, revealed that the Mavricks didn't play such a bad game against the Badgers after all. In the first place, the Mavs made more yards on the ground than the Badgers did. It was those long passes from the Badgers' skyscraper backfield to their skyscraper ends that did all the damage. When Merkel hit the Mavrick line they got nowhere, fast.

The movies showed that Eastland was running hard and tackling hard and the Mavs played much the sounder football. One had break of the game was the high pass over center on a punt formation that set the Mavricks back and behind, and from which they never recovered.

Another thing the movies showed was the consistent off-side play of the big, towering, Badger left end. The gentleman was off-sides on practically every play of the game and the officials did not call it on him even once. Getting this big jump on the ball, the left end was able to play havoc in the Mavrick backfield while he was on off-side, and to get a start on everything else when he was playing off-side. The movies actually showed this — not just a little bit off-side but a whale of a lot off-side.

The Dublin Lions were badly trounced by Ranger last week, 48-19, as a result of which Ranger was jumped in the Class A football No. 8 to No. 2 in Class A football in the state. It is said the Lions got their 19 points only after Ranger had put in their third and fourth stringers, that is, if the Bulldogs have anything except first stringers.

Although past performances can be forgotten when Eastland and Dublin lock horns in a football game, the fact remains that the Lions have not won a game all this year. It doesn't seem logical that they should start now, especially against a team that is capable of playing as good a game as the Mavricks.

The only common foe that both teams have met this year is DeLeon. The Bearcats beat Dublin 21-6, and they beat Eastland 19-0.

Coach Carrol Shelton has had a little more to work on this week than last. He had an opportunity to scout Dublin, but was denied that opportunity against Merkel on account of the Badgers having an open date.

With the exception of those who were injured and knocked out for six years at the very start of the season, the rest of the Mavricks are in good shape and are expected to go all out for a win.

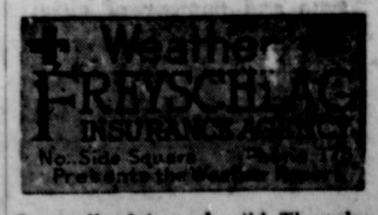
Appointments of Mrs. Jack Frost as home-canvass chairman and John Goodie as business section chairman, were announced also. Their work will open at the time of the general campaign.

Big D's Biggest Doin's, State Fair of Texas, Is To Open Friday

DALLAS — The 1955 State Fair of Texas, Big D's biggest doin's, will throw open the gates for its 1955 exposition at 5 p.m. Friday, Oct. 7.

The traditional parade through downtown Dallas will start at 3 p.m. Friday, with the SMU Mustang band heading the line of march. Two hours later Gov. Allan Shivers will snip a silken ribbon with a pair of golden shears to officially open the nation's largest annual fair.

Two bigtime football games are scheduled in the Cotton Bowl for the opening weekend — SMU vs. Missouri at 8 p.m. Friday and Texas vs. Oklahoma at 2 p.m. Saturday.

"The Pajama Game," "Ice Capades," and the Joie Chitwood Auto Thrill Show will all open Friday night. The three shows will each present 24 shows during the 16 days and 17 nights of the fair.

Color television is the big new attraction at the 1955 State Fair. Both Dallas TV stations will present live programs in the studios in the Agriculture Building, and there will be a series of 23 "closed circuit" variety shows which can only be seen on the TV sets at the fairgrounds.

Over 7,500 entries are listed in the Pan-American Livestock Exposition, Junior Livestock Show and Poultry Show. The Pan-American show runs the first week of

the fair, and the juniors take over in the second week. Horse shows are scheduled each of the three weekends.

The Women's Department has been deluged with over 10,000 entries in the household arts divisions, about three times as many as ever before. Also in the air-conditioned Women's Building, free fashion shows will be presented two and three times daily.

The world will be on display in the thousands of exhibits of automobiles, luxury items for the ladies, farm machinery, foods, electric and gas appliance, home furnishings. The new International Center features exhibits of nine foreign countries — Japan, Great Britain, India, Egypt, Sweden, Belgium, Finland, Germany and France.

"The Family of Man," the greatest collection of photography ever assembled, will include 503 pictures from 68 countries.

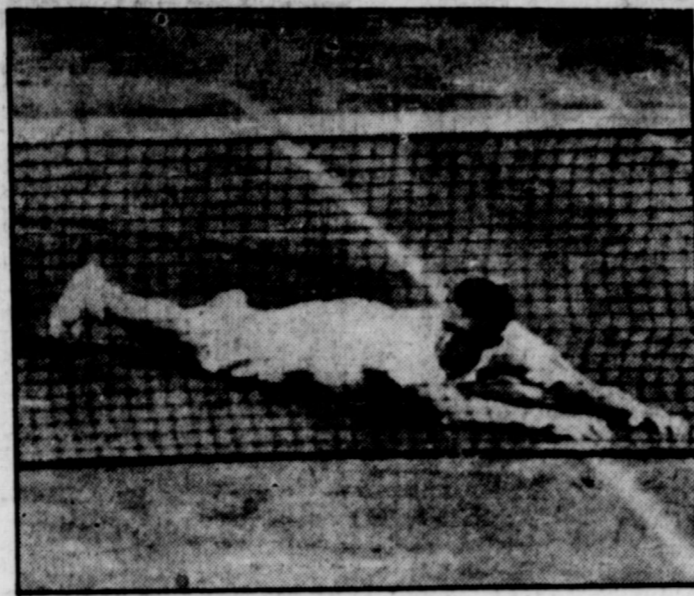

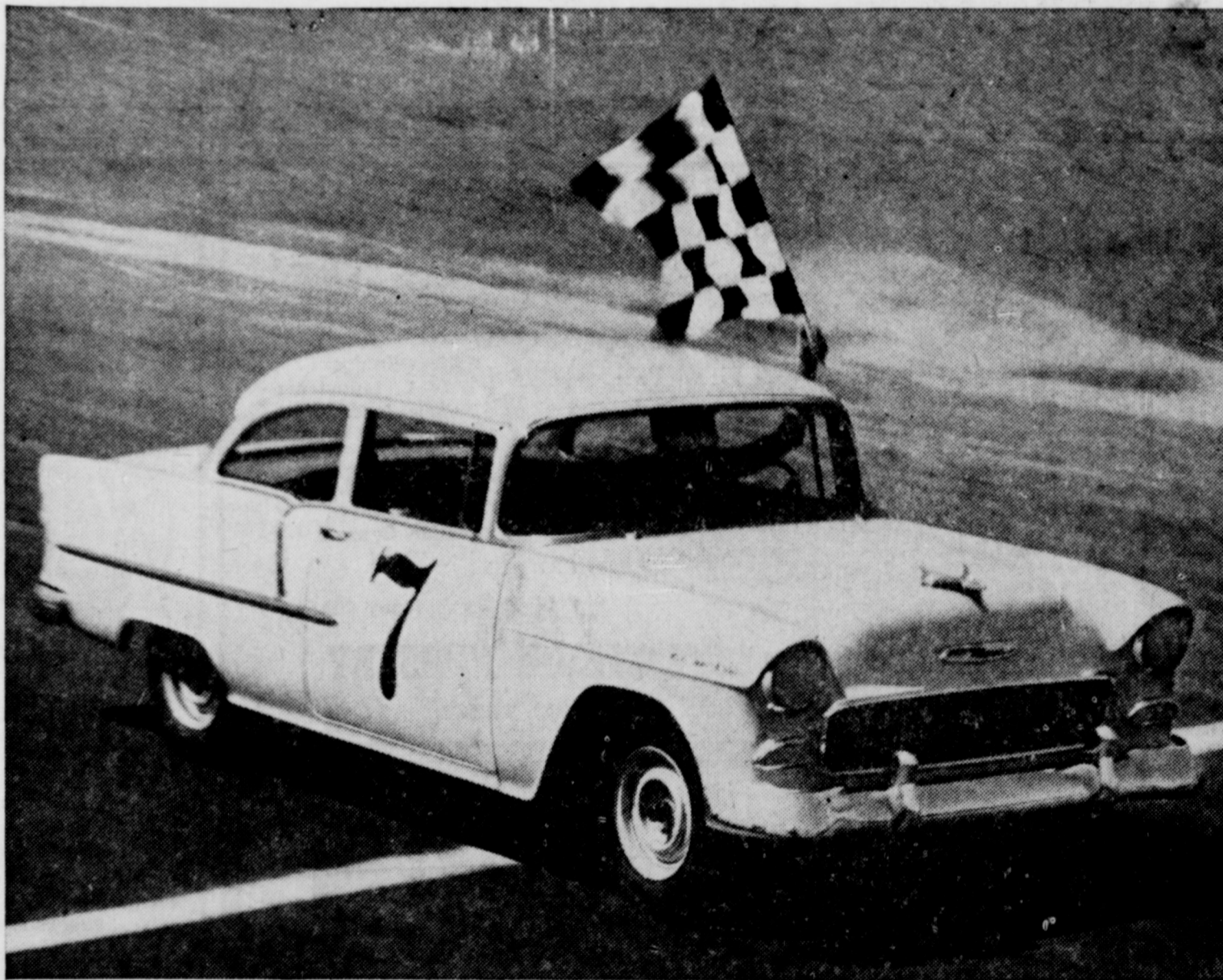

Educational scholarships totaling \$100,000 will be awarded in the second Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow, it was announced today by General Mills.

This is a \$25,000 increase in scholarships awarded in the 1954-55 program when 187,463 high school senior girls from 8,040 schools sought the All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow title which was won by Deloris Arnette of Enterprise, Ala.

In addition to a \$1,500 scholarship to each state winner, there will be a new award of \$500 to the homemaker rating second in each state. The scholarship of the national winner, who will be announced April 12 in Philadelphia, will be \$5,000.

The basis for selection of winners will be test scores in a written homemaking knowledge and attitude test developed by Science Research Associates of Chicago. The test will be given in all participating high schools on Dec. 6. The project has the endorsement of the national contest and activities committee of the National Association of Secondary School Principals, a department of the National Education Association.

"The enthusiastic endorsement of thousands of educators, religious leaders, civic leaders and parents throughout the nation and the extensive participation of students in our first year project have made General Mills pleased to renew this worthwhile activity and increase the scholarship

funds," declared Charles H. Bell, president of the company.

"We believe in sponsoring programs which contribute to a better way of living for all. We are happy to assist public, private and parochial high schools in training girls for successful family life after marriage, and we are equally happy to focus public attention on the fine work these schools are doing.

"We have faith in the American teen ager of today. Given the opportunity, the guidance and encouragement, this teen ager will become the type of American homemaker who will assure the health, happiness and security of our communities and nation in the years ahead."

All 12th grade girls in the nation's public, private and parochial high schools who will graduate in 1956 are eligible to participate in the Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow. They must be enrolled by their school not later than Oct. 31.

Study materials for use in teaching many subjects will be sent to participating schools. The girl with the highest test score in each school will be named Homemaker of Tomorrow for that school. She will receive a pin designed by Trifari of New York, her school will receive a copy of the Good and Easy Cook Book and her test paper will be entered in the competition for her state.

The school of each state Homemaker of Tomorrow will receive a set of the Encyclopedia Britannica. Each state winner and a female faculty adviser will be invited to participate in an expense-paid educational tour of Washington, D.C., Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Philadelphia April 8-12.

Miss Arnette, the first year national winner, is using her scholarship at Judson college in Alabama.
