The testimony was much the same as in the Hyden trial, following which the jury found Hyden guilty and sentenced him to 99 years in the penitentiary and he accepted sentence,

Allen was not positively identi-fied as one of the bank robbers. Defense Counters.

Defense Counters. Most important, perhaps, in the Allen defense, was an effort be-ing made to discredit the testi-mony of A. D. Wilburn, engine-man at a gasoline plant near Desdemona, who testified that Allen had told him in the pres-ence of Hyde a day or two before the robbery, that "they" were there to rob a bank and wanted a place to go afterwards and would pay for it. ould pay for it.

Wilburn testified further that Allen told him he did not mind telling a man his business, for if it was told on him he would find that man and kill him. He said the conversation occurred at the home of his sister-in-law,

the nona, about twenty minutes or so that he was at that house the Sunday evening before the bank robbery.
