The law limits the sale of liquor only to those having permits to purchase spirits and specifies that bottled goods must be sold only from govern-ment stores. Public drinking is

prohibited. The province has netted \$10,-000,000 profit from the sale of liquor during the past 18 months. according to a report by the con-trol board. Up to and including July 31, 1928, there were in oper-ation in Ontario 100 liquor stores, 38 breweries, 99 brewers' ware-houses and 51 wineries.


All profits accruing from the board's operations are paid into the provincial treasury. A large amount of this money has recent-ly been expended in building new highways and repairing old ones, according to the report.
