### Valuable Herrera Is Seriously Injured In Game Friday Night

Before a scant and shivering crowd of 500 fans huddled together in a strong and biting wind, the Eastland High School Mavericks defeated the Wylie Bulldogs by a score of 33-0 Friday night at Wylie Stadium near Abilene.

Twenty of these points were racked up by the "A" team in the first half and the "B's" made the final 13 points in the second half. The "A's" made 146 yards rushing in the first two quarters of the game and the "B's" made 118 yards in their half for a total of 246 yards. Wylie made 17 yards in the first half and exactly zero yards in the final chapter for an all night total of 17 yards. First Downs stood Eastland 16, Wylie 3.

It was a costly victory for the Mavs because they lost another star player and team spark plug when Lupe Herrera was injured late in the second half. He suffered a broken left ankle. The Bulldogs had got off a quick kick and Herrera had raced back to retrieve it. He was off balance, not facing his tacklers when he was hit. It was a clean tackle, not even a hard one, but due to Her-

rer's off stride position the accident just happened. Herrera was carried from the field, placed in his family's station wagon, and brought to Eastland Memorial Hospital after arrangements had been made for an Abilene physician to meet the car on the road and give the injured player a hypo. There was no doctor present at the ball game. Herrera is out for the season.

The Mavs began their scoring early. They kicked off over the goal line to Wylie and after the Bulldogs failed to gain an inch from the 20 they got off a short 5-yard punt. The Mavs took over on the 25 and after chalking up two quick first downs Harvey Lewis went over from the 2, and also kicked the goal.

The second touchdown came late in the same period when Jimmy Phillips recovered a fumble on the Wylie 17. Herrera and Benny Cates worked the ball down to the 1-foot line and Cates plunged over from there. Lewis again kicked the extra point.

The third touchdown came soon after Herrera was injured in the second half. With the Mavs in possession of that quick kick on their own 48, a pass and run play from Lewis to Willoughby accounted for 51 yards. On first and goal to go, Lewis took the ball on over but his kick for point was blocked and the score stood 20-0 as the half ended.

PROCLAMATION BY THE MAYOR OF THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, GEORGE L. DAVENPORT, Mayor of the City of Eastland, Texas, do hereby call upon all the citizens of the city of Eastland to observe Friday, November 11, 1955, as Veterans Day. I request all citizens of this City, business enterprises, veterans' organizations and city officials to assist the State Committee for the observance of Veterans Day in every way possible for the observance of November 11, 1955, with appropriate ceremonies.

As the third quarter got under way the fourth touchdown was an almost exact repetition of the first. The Mavs kicked off over the goal, Wylie took over on the 20 and failed to gain and then got off another 5-yard punt. The Mavs took over on the 25, Martin got 20 over right guard. Cates picked up a couple and then Martin scored from the 3. Jaye C. Jerrett kicked the goal.

At this point Button Humphreys came in as quarterback, making an almost complete "B" team. There was no more scoring until the fourth quarter when Henry Sims intercepted a Bulldog pass to put the ball on the Mav 35. Humphreys picked up 10, and then another 3, and then Saul Fullman took off like a goosed goat and went through the middle of everything on the field for 52 yards and the final touchdown. Jarrett's kick for extra point was low.

With the exception of that one fatal quick kick, the Bulldogs didn't cross the 50-yard line all night. The Mavericks also made two touchdowns that were called back on account of offside penalties.

Postmaster Marene Johnson today gave some tips on how to mail for Christmas. At the same time, she urged mail patrons to start planning now to shop early and mail early for Christmas.

A new illustrated pamphlet, "Packaging and Wrapping Parcels For Mailing," describes the type and sizes of cartons best suited for shipping, and lists hints that will help with special Christmas mailing problems, such as shipping chinaware. Copies are available — free — at the Eastland post office.

wrapping with unnecessary wording. For example, "Do not Delay," is superfluous. "Rush" does not properly belong on a parcel. If it is desired to expedite delivery of a parcel, use special handling or special delivery service.

Do address plainly and properly, using postal zone numbers where available. Addresses should be printed in ink or typed, and a return address should appear on every parcel, no matter how near or far it may be going.

The proper place for the return address, incidentally, is the upper left hand corner of the parcel — not on the back, side, or one of the other corners.

The overwhelming bulk of Christmas mail will be by parcel post, of course, and it should be remembered that size and weight limits vary, depending upon the post office of mailing and the post office of address.

Mailers may check with their post office and ask for the pamphlet "Post Office Department Publication 3," which contains the rates of postage and limits of size and weight for domestic mail.

Books may be sent at a special low rate of postage, but mailers must not enclose other articles with books at this rate.

### Ethel Foster, GFWC Official, Is Guest Speaker Fed'n Day Program, Thursday Afternoon Club

"To unite women's clubs throughout the world for the purposes of their mutual benefit and promotion of their common interests" is the great objective of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, said Miss Ethel Foster of Sterling City when she spoke in Eastland Thursday.

Miss Foster, who is on the Council of International Clubs, was guest speaker for the Thursday Afternoon Club's "Federation Day" program.

With eleven and a half million members in the General Federation of Women's Clubs and more than half of that number in other countries Miss Foster explained the importance of the women from the United States—visiting other lands—a custom inaugurated five years ago.

Miss Foster has visited 74 of the 113 clubs in foreign countries and they all want the same things the American women want—good homes, good jobs for their husbands, education for their children, security, peace on earth and goodwill—she said. The women in foreign countries are coming out of their kitchens to the polls to vote and to take their places as citizens, she added.

Miss Foster, long-time board member of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, then gave an enlightening account of her trip this summer to Geneva, Switzerland, to the International Clubs Conference, held at the Palace of Nations building in 1920 for the League of Nations.

Mrs. Theodore S. Chapman of Jerseyville, Ill., GFWC president, responded to roll call at the Geneva Conference with representatives from 35 of the 48 states, Canada and Korea. The entire delegation from the United States numbered 351.

The first day included talks by noted statesmen from various sections of the world including G. J. Van Heuten Goedhart, an Amsterdam editor, who formerly was Dutch minister of justice and under whose direction the office of the UN Commissioner for Refugees was established in 1951. The Norwegian Nobel committee Thursday awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for 1954 to the office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees, Miss Foster commented. The purpose of the agency is to give protection to refugees who leave their home countries in fear of political, religious or racial persecution. Its headquarters are in Geneva.

The 2nd day at the conference a UNESCO panel was held on "How to Rear Children," Miss Foster said. Those from Austria, Sweden, U.S., Egypt, England, France and other experts working together found problems much the same in all countries. Understanding, justice, good relations and the first factor, love, were given as rules.

Mrs. Chapman gave a check of \$500 from the GFWC to Pestelotze at Trogen Village, Switzerland, an orphan home for 200 boys and girls from all countries. One of the speakers at the conference was Dr. Adelaide Lohner whose subject was "My Life at Pestelotze."

The women wore their prettiest native costumes for their reports at the convention; for instance, Miss Foster was hostess to a Filipino girl in native costume.

Women from the various nations telling of their appreciation of what the women from the U.S. had done for them was most gratifying, Miss Foster said, such as the women of India who reported about the U.S. sending them items for their baby clinics, the Greek women for mounds of clothing, women from Finland for aprons, items for the GYA in Germany, blankets for Holland, scrapbooks for the TB hospitals in India. "It was an inspiration that they were so pleased and proud of the things the women are doing

for them in the United States," added Miss Foster.

For the closing session the U.S. ambassador to Switzerland—Miss Frances Willis—spoke, advancing the thought that all people have become neighbors, that education must be expanded to include the study and understanding of other people's. They advocated the exchange of more students between countries.

Following the conference, the 351 women from the United States took a bus trip through Austria, Italy, Belgium, France and England. Miss Foster said now the farms are well kept and there are projects of building houses on the farms—there is a relaxed condition among the people whose smiles and friendly waving as they passed gave the 351 international goodwill people a real thrill. In 1950, when Miss Foster made her first trip to the continent there was much debris from the war and the people were not as relaxed, the farms were not in such good condition and women were seen going to the farms from the villages with nothing to eat but a loaf of bread, bottle of wine and olive oil which they carried under their arms.

The GFWC will go as emissaries of goodwill again soon—this time to the Pan-American Conference at San Jose, Costa Rica, Feb. 6-23.

Miss Foster, Mrs. James Horton's guest while in Eastland, was introduced by Mrs. Horton, who spoke of her as a friend, clubwoman, and world traveler who began her career in Sixth District, serving as president of her district, her state federation and as GFWC treasurer and as one who has traveled around the world twice in the interest of clubdom.

Mrs. Frank Castleberry, immediate past president of the Thursday Afternoon Club, gave the history of the state federation, beginning in 1897 when Mrs. Dickson of Waco Woman's Club called the first state meeting. Mrs. Rotan of Waco was the first president of the Texas Federation of Women's Literary Clubs. Later the word "literary" was dropped. The first state convention was in Tyler a year from the Waco organization meeting, the second in Galveston; in 1900 in San Antonio when "Texas

Day" was begun; next in Dallas and thence in Fort Worth, Austin, El Paso and on the 10th anniversary back in Waco.

In 1913 the pecan was adopted as the federation tree; in 1914 the federation received its charter; in 1915 the Texas Federation of Music Clubs was formed from it; in 1918 it met in Dallas and pledged \$25,000 for recreational canteens for the U.S. Army; in 1920 in San Antonio, and in 1930 it asked that the licensing of motor cars be required.

It built its headquarters building at 2312 San Gabriel, Austin, and Mrs. Volney Taylor of Brownsville was president in 1936; Eastland's Mrs. Joseph M. Perkins was president in 1938; in 1940 Clara Driscoll paid off the \$90,000 note on the headquarters building, Austin; the convention was held at the headquarters in 1943 during World War II because of the crowded conditions at the hotels in Austin.

In 1901 there were five districts; 1915, six districts, 1921, seven, and in 1936 the state was divided into eight districts. Mrs. Castleberry closed her history by reading from the new Texas Clubwoman the message of Thanksgiving penned by Mrs. L. E. Dudley of Abilene, state president.

Mrs. Frank Sparks, president of the club, conducted a brief business session and Mrs. Robert G. Perkins read the minutes and correspondence. Mrs. Turner Collier, treasurer, reported and Mrs. Castleberry, federation counselor announced that the picture taken at the Eastland County Federation meeting appeared with a story in the Texas Clubwoman magazine and another page in the issue carried an article by Mrs. Perkins, GFWC education chairman.

Mrs. Cyrus B. Frost asked the women to take dress lengths of three and a half yards, buttons, trimming, thread, needles, knitting needles and other such items to J. C. Penney's, where the committee will pick them up and mail them to the proper source for the German Youth Assistance Program, a project the club voted to undertake at the last meeting, as suggested by Mrs. Chapman, GFWC president, in a letter to all clubs.

The president recognized three

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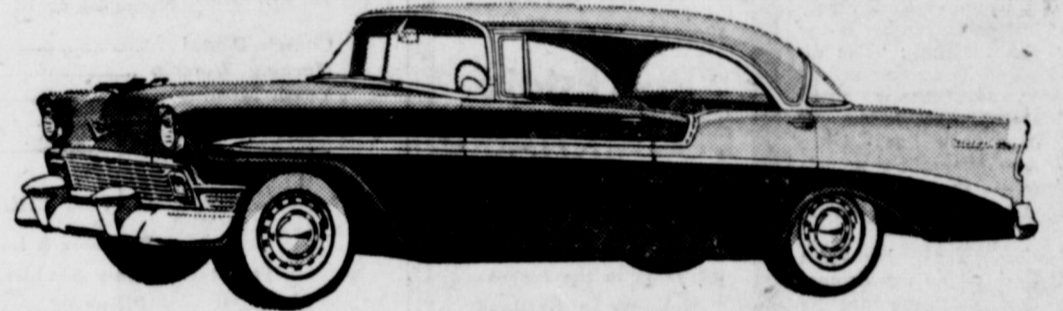

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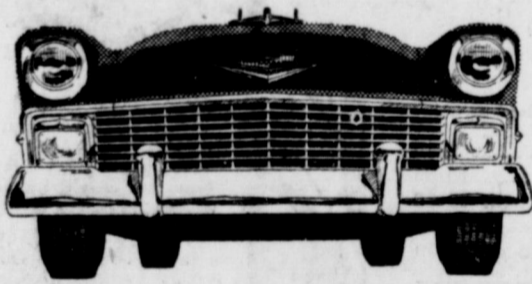

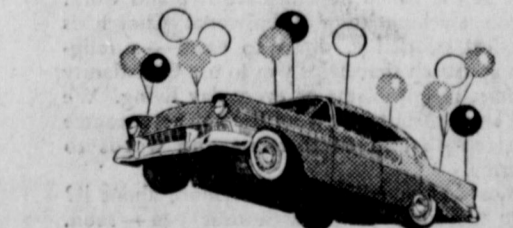
