Gilfillan, who is an American resident of Switzerland, came from New York to Cherbourg aboard the Mauretania in 124 hours compared to 111 hours in the air aboard the Graf Zeppelin.

FIVE SLEEPING MEN CAUGHT BY FIRE IN HOTEL

Flimsy Chicago Landmark Where Derelicts Seek Refuge Is Destroyed By Flames.

CHICAGO, Oct. 23.—Fire swept through the Engle hotel today, taking the lives of five derelicts who sought refuge from the cold in the flimsy bedrooms of one of the landmarks of South State Street.

The five victims were trapped in tiny, cell-like rooms on the third floor of the four-story wooden structure. The bodies were charred beyond recognition and there was no hotel register to aid in their identification.

The fire marshal said he would demand an investigation. The fire, he said, probably was caused by a lit cigarette thrown on a trash-littered stairway.

VOTING FACTS IN TEXAS

Poll tax receipts issued in Texas this year as certificates of registration for voting, number 1,189,694, an increase of 50,378 over the last gubernatorial election in 1926 and a decrease of 2050 under the registration in the last presidential election. The qualified voters this year, including those exempt from poll tax payment, number 1,368,044.

The poll tax was paid this year by only 48.2 per cent of those eligible to qualify. Based on a 12-year comparison, however, that is considered normal.

Registration in Texas begins and ends with payment of poll tax on or before Jan. 31 of election year, generally throughout the State, but since there may be special acts applying to certain towns or counties, it is strongly urged that those who would vote in the presidential election, Nov. 6 find out from their local officials their individual status as a voter and act accordingly.

Legal residence is one year in state and six months in county. The only absentee voting allowed is as follows: Voter expecting to be absent from his election precinct on election day goes to county clerk 3 to 10 days of election, files a statement showing that his poll tax is paid, and marks his ballot before the clerk, who deposits it with the precinct election judges to be counted election day.

Women voters are estimated at 40 per cent of the state registered total. Increase of about 20 per cent over previous elections is expected. There is a wide variation among the counties with regard to registration of woman voters. Travis county, including the city of Austin, reports 45 per cent of the registry as women.

Poll tax payment ending in January restricts women registry. Of about 1,370,000 registered voters in 1924, about one-third, or 450,000, are estimated as women. Increase in 1926 and 1927 up to Jan. 21, 1928, may have brought women registry to about 500,000.

Usually the Democratic primary contest brings out a vote of 800,000, but the fall election usually is allowed to go by default with a light vote. It is expected that 1928 will draw to the polls a record vote.

STRAW VOTES, BETTING ODDS MEAN LITTLE

Ordinary Voter Has To Depend On Such Uncertain Weather Vanes To Peer Beyond Election Day.

WASHINGTON. — Straw votes and betting odds.

Unless he likes to believe what the politicians say—and that is always embarrassing because such fellows differ so—the common ordinary every-day garden variety of voter has to depend on such weather vanes as those when he seeks to look beyond election day.

Hoover is the favorite in the betting odds and he is generally running ahead in the more extensive straw votes. Are these facts aligned with a somewhat common belief among non-partisan observers that Hoover is reasonably sure to be elected? They are. Do they spell certain defeat for Smith? They don't.

If there were any infallible method of determining the result of a presidential election well in advance there would be a falling off of enthusiasm as the Republican and Democratic contenders approached the finale. But instead of that one final in these last days that both parties are girding for a mighty effort.

Governor Smith, especially, is credited with the belief that the result can be determined in the fortnight before election. And as if to admit that he might possibly be right, the Hoover strategists have also reserved their greatest broadsides for the closing days.

BORAH STIRS "REGULARS" TO COUNTER PLOT

Texas Democrats Plan Intensive State-Wide Campaign Until Election Day.

DALLAS, Oct. 23.—Regular Democrats of Texas today planned to meet the invasion of Senator William Borah in their midst with an intensive campaign from now until election day.

Borah, who is the first Republican speaker of national note to invade Texas in an effort to win the Lone Star state's electoral vote for Hoover, addressed an audience of 5,000 here last night.

An unseen audience of other thousands scattered throughout the vast area of Texas heard the distinguished Republican over the radio. There was no telling what effect his speech had on the Democratic vote, but party leaders who feared a possible change in sentiment planned to meet the bold offensive with an ambitious speaking program from now until the election day.

There was talk about Democratic headquarters of enlisting the services of Governor Dan Moody for at least two addresses and for bringing in of at least one Democratic speaker of national note.

Young Chinese In Death House Cell Cheats Gallows

SAN QUENTIN PRISON, Calif., Oct. 23.—Preferring death by his own hand to hanging on the prison gallows for the murder of 11 of his countrymen, Leong Ying, young Chinese ranch hand, committed suicide last night in his cell in his cell in death row, penitentiary officials, announced today.

King took his life with a small towel which he knotted around his throat. He was found dead on the floor of his cell when guards came through the death house for the 11 p. m. inspection. Previously at 9 p. m. the guard passed the cell and Ying answered to the call.

The suicide cell was occupied by Ying and another Chinese inmate, Leon Fook.

Whether Fook was asleep and unaware of his countryman's act or whether he knew and decided to allow Ying to cheat the gallows had not been learned today. Fook, however, made no sign to attract the attention of death house guards, it was said.

Two Women Plead Guilty of Arson

HOUSTON, Oct. 23.—Her vote choked with sobs, Mrs. Etta Brenden said on the witness stand in district court today that she "could not let the canary bird burn" when she and Mrs. Anna Parsons set fire to the Brenden home September 16. Both women pleaded guilty to attempted arson.

Mrs. Brenden, who described Mrs. Parsons as a "spiritualist medium," testified that Mrs. Parsons in the course of a reading first foretold that the Brenden home would burn and then struck the match which partly burned the structure.

"I told her I could not stand to live in the house any longer and that I would either have to take poison or burn the house down," Mrs. Brenden testified. Kerosene was sprinkled about the house, the canary bird taken out and the match applied.

Mrs. Parsons was given a three-year sentence and Mrs. Brenden two years. Both were suspended.
