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DOCTORS AS NOVELISTS.
 Don't be surprised if your family doctor takes down his M. D. sign almost any day and goes in for writing novels instead of prescriptions. No one has satisfactorily explained the urge to authorship that runs through the medical profession, but it is fairly estimated that literature draws more recruits from the ranks of the doctors than any other professional field, excepting newspaper work.

If its current issue, for instance, a well known magazine presents 30 medical men who are far more widely known as authors of the first rank. Most of them, in fact, have given up their science for their art.

Henry C. Rowland is probably the most prolific of the American writing medical men. Since 1903 he has produced a novel a year, besides practicing medicine until after the world war, in which he was a medical officer overseas.

Somerset Maugham who wrote "Rain," "The Moon and Sixpence" and a score of other best-selling novels and plays, was educated for medicine, served in an English hospital and practiced for several years before he devoted himself exclusively to literature.

S. M. Hutchinson, author of "If Winter Comes" among other things, began his career as a physician, and Sir Arthur Conan Doyle's early medical practice enabled him to make the scientific feat of his detective hero, Sherlock Holmes, plausible.

Just to amuse his children, Dr. Henry A. Pulsford wrote "The Old Brig's Cargo." He intended to read it to his small sons. Then it got into print, the public asked for more, and he's been writing since.

Ever hear of Dr. G. W. Deeping? He's the Warwick Deeping who produced "Sorrell and Son" and a dozen novels before it. He divorced medicine after only a year for a world-wide success as an author.

Among others there is Francis Brett Young who utilized his medical knowledge to write "Love is Enough," Arthur Schnitzler, the Vienna physician whose greatest fame rests on his "Casanova's Homecoming," and Harold Deardon, who still clings to medicine despite such success as the play "Interference," and a half dozen outstanding novels. And Dr. George A. Dorsey, although long known as an eminent scientist, won his greatest fame only recently with "Why We Behave Like Human Beings."

Mrs. Silver Will Ask Governor To Save Son's Life

 FORT WORTH, Oct. 19.—Mrs. Mary Silver, mother of J. R. Silver, has gone to Austin to make a last appeal to Governor Moody to save her son from the electric chair. Young Silver, sentenced to die for his part in the robbery and murder of Roscoe Wilson, theater treasurer, on Jan. 31, 1927, is to be electrocuted after midnight next Thursday.

Mrs. Silver, who twice before has appealed personally to Governor Moody, in her son's behalf, is making the last move that might save Silver from death. She went to Austin in the face of a statement from the governor that he would interfere no further in the carrying out of the judgment in the criminal district court at Fort Worth.

FRENCH TRAIN TO SPEED 100 MILES HOURLY

Orleans Electric Flier Will Rival Charlie Hogan in His Famous "999."

 PARIS.—Within a few weeks French railroaders will give Charlie Hogan, engineer of the famous old 999, the "fastest thing on wheels" something to shoot at.

The Orleans railroad is electrifying its lines south from Paris towards the Spanish frontier and as soon as the work is completed, an electric flier will be put into service which will keep the indicator in the cab always pointed above 100 miles an hour.

Charlie Hogan, piloting the famous old "Gold Medal Engine," did 112 between Syracuse and Buffalo with train 51, an engine and four cars. But that was years ago. The fastest train in America today travels at an average of 53.6 miles an hour, which includes time out for stops.

The Orleans recently put its electric engine through the paces and touched 124 kilometers an hour with a full load. That amounts to about 78 miles an hour. By using steel cars and a short train, the new electric engine is expected to build up that speed to 100 miles an hour.

English Train Fastest.
 The fastest train on this side of the Atlantic today is the London and Swindon Express, on the Great Western company's railroad in England. It averages 61.8 miles an hour, and in order to keep up that speed the engineer must touch 90 during certain parts of the run.

The fastest train in France is the Cologne Express, on the Nord railroad which hits it off between Paris and St. Quentin at an even 60 miles an hour. That run of 153 kilometers is covered in one hour and 32 minutes.

The fastest electric train in the world is undoubtedly the Sud Express on the roadway between Bordeaux and Dax, where, on a flat strip of sand and pines travelers towards Madrid are hurled along at 60.2 miles an hour.

The Sud Express is the fastest train in Spain, as well as being the fastest electric train in France.

There are 53 other de luxe trains in France which cover their runs at average speeds of from 55 to 60 miles an hour. Most of them are on the Nord and Midi systems, with several on the State, East and the Orleans.

Charlie Hogan's time with old 999 was about 20 miles an hour faster than the speediest run ever recorded in England. The British record was 102.3 miles an hour on a downhill portion of the Great Western Express run from Plymouth to London on May 9, 1904.

Brownwood Plans \$2,000,000 Dam Project; to Vote

BROWNWOOD, Texas, Oct. 19.—At a meeting of the city council, city planning commission, city charter commission and the board of Brown county improvement district No. 1, here recently, it was decided to hold a bond election Dec. 4, at which time the people of Brownwood and Brown county will have the chance to vote for or against a bond issue of between \$2,000,000 and \$2,500,000, needed to defray expenses of erecting a big dam on Pecan bayou and Jim Ned creek, about nine miles north of Brownwood.

Saxophones Would Have Been Worse

DALLAS, Oct. 19.—More harmonicas or French harps have been imported from foreign countries to the port of Dallas during the last few months than in the remembrance of C. J. Geyer, deputy

collector of customs in charge of the Dallas station.

Mr. Geyer attributes the unsurpassed number of harmonicas being received to an increased demand among young men, especially in the rural districts, for these musical instruments created by the radio. Practically all of the French harps come from Germany.

Imports of foreign made toys has dropped off materially, Mr. Geyer reported. American toy manufacturers are making better toys cheaper than the German makers, he has been informed by dealers.

Chief of Police Roenberry said Smith had pushed aside all food offered him since yesterday, declaring he would not taste food during the 27 days he proposes to serve in jail in lieu of a \$25 fine imposed upon him Tuesday.

Wife Murderer In Nebraska Executed

NEBRASKA STATE PRISON, Lincoln, Nebraska, Oct. 20.—Frank Sharp was electrocuted here this morning for murdering his wife with a hammer. He walked to the chair easily, seated himself and died with professions of innocence on his lips. He was pronounced dead at 6:32 a. m. Two juries had found Sharp guilty on circumstantial evidence and the supreme court upheld the second conviction, which carried with it the death sentence. Mrs. Harriett Sharp was the victim of the man who died today. She was found dead in an abandoned car near Lincoln. Her skull had been crushed by a hammer and experts identified Sharp as the murderer through palm prints on the hammer handle. Sharp's calmness and absolute lack of emotional show was striking. "I am ready to go," he said. "I am innocent of any crime so I have nothing to fear."

Three Members of Greenville Family Burned To Death

GREENVILLE, Texas, Oct. 20.—H. G. Norwood, district attorney, announced today that he was working on the theory of "fool play" in his investigation of the fire which destroyed the home of P. Carter with resultant loss of life to Mrs. Carter and her two children, Otis, 5, and Nora, 1. Bodies of the three members of the Carter family were found by neighbors yesterday, buried almost beyond recognition in the ruins of the home. Several witnesses were called for questioning this morning. Norwood said his investigation had not yet reached the point where arrests would be made.

Jailer Held After Killing Prisoner

POST, Oct. 20.—J. H. Ramsey, Garza county jailer, was charged with murder and placed under \$7,500 bond late yesterday, following the shooting of E. L. Bracken, a prisoner in the county jail. The shooting is said to have climaxed high feeling between jail attendants and prisoners. Three bullets struck Bracken and he died almost instantly. The prisoner was being held for authorities to take him to the penitentiary at Huntsville.

Fertilizers Increase Soil Production, Proper Feeding of Cows Gets More Milk

Six bales of cotton on five acres has been made by E. Whitmire of Madison county by the use of 3500 pounds of 9-6-3 fertilizer costing \$75.00. The six bales of cotton and two tons of cotton seed are worth \$660, making a net profit above the cost of cultivation and fertilization of \$542. At a field meeting on this place arranged by the county agent and attended by 47 farmers, Mr. Whitmire pointed out that his success was due to deep breaking, proper cultivation and heavy fertilization. A five-acre check plot, waterflooded, produced only 1 1-4 bales of cotton and 1-2 ton of cotton seed all of which was worth only \$110.

Milk enough to pay for their own feed, food for a family of six and to pay the family gasoline clothing bill, is the achievement of 5 registered and 3 grade dairy cows on the farm of J. G. Sanderson in Cottle county, who told the county agent that with only a small cotton crop in view and a hospital bill to pay the cows are real lifesavers. Cow testing associations for the purpose of weeding out poorer cows and increasing herd profits by the feeding of balanced rations, have been formed by county agents in the following counties: Wise, Bexar, Potter, Randall, Deaf Smith, Hale, Swisher and Hartley. Similar associations are contemplated or in process of formation in Denton, Tarrant and Galveston counties. The net income from a Jim Wells county demonstration poultry flock of 100 birds has been increased \$18 per month by culling and worm and insect pest control, according to County Agent J. A. Pierce. Ground milo maize is worth considerably more than head maize for feeding pigs, so club boys of Mitchell county, hink after feeding both ways. The local record for the heaviest months pig has been broken four times this year by club pigs weighing 224, 310, 276 and 267 pounds each, the ration in each case consisting of ground milo maize, skimmed milk and commercial pig feed. The owners of these record breaking pigs are J. L. Galey, Vernie Prescott, Don Blasingame and William Griffith. The heaviest of four litter mates of young Blasingame's pig, fed 1 to 1-1/4 gallons of skimmed milk per day and head maize, weighed only 179 pounds. Most of the difference is attributed by the county agent to the use of head instead of ground maize.

To insure clean milk and cream in Hood county an organization for the testing of dairy cattle for tuberculosis has been formed by the county agent with owners signing up a total of 215 cows. Testing is to be done under the direction of the U. S. Bureau of Animal Industry.

By adding heets to the ration of dairy cows, O. B. McGuire of Tarrant county has increased the milk production of his herd 150 pounds daily.

Next varieties developed by the Denton sub-experiment station, have grown as pure line seed by farmers of the Denton County Pedigreed Grain Association which ships this pure seed direct to farmers throughout the Southwest. The organization was suggested by county agents for the purpose of developing a reliable supply of these superior varieties. The Association has a warehouse rented, owns its re-cleaning machinery and is said to be doing a good business.

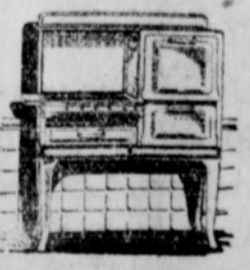

BULLDOGS TIE MOUNTAINEERS, DEFEAT MINERS

Ranger Varsity Play 0 to 0 Game With Mineral Wells. Second Team Beats Thurber, 35-7.

Playing the first double header in the history of West Texas football, Ranger came out Friday with one victory and a tie. The tie was achieved by the "varsity" who found the Mineral Wells Mountaineers a plenty stubborn outfit and a 0-0 score was the result. It remained for the Ranger "second team" to contribute the victory—a 35 to 7 win over the Thurber Miners.

Mineral Wells has a fullback named Bird and that's exactly what he is. That 200-pound chunk of muscle battered the Ranger line with Coach Curtis shooting in reserve to stop the onslaught. And there was a powerful rangy half-back named Browder on that Mineral Wells team, too, and he could certainly grab those passes.

The Bulldogs, minus the services of Garland Hinman, did not show a sustained attack.

At that, the locals should have won the game when Browder threw a short pass to Browder who was tackled so hard he tumbled and Mitchell, Ranger guard, caught the ball as it shot into the air and raced 95 yards across the goal line. It was a thrilling gallop. A Mountaineer in a desperate lunge 200 yards behind Mitchell by the time he reached the goal line was too late. Ernest Whitehall guarded him from Mountaineers who were gaining as the lad with the ball grew weary on his long run. But it meant nothing. The referee had blown his whistle as soon as Browder was tackled, consequently the ball was dead.

The class B team has been seeded on only one time this year and they have won all their games by good margins—that is of course until the game in Ranger Friday. They started off with a rush against the Bulldogs. Three line plays gained 25 yards to Ranger's 10-yard line.

End First Quarter
The visitors were halted and Brewer got off a poor punt to Ranger's 30-yard line. Whitehall gained six yards through right tackle but McLaughlin's fumble resulted in the Mountaineers gaining the ball on their own 45-yard line. They gained five yards but two passes were incomplete and they lost the ball on downs. Whitehall on an end run made five yards, Caraway gained five through the line and on a pass Caraway gained five more. Whitehall went around end for three yards to the 50-yard line as the first quarter ended.

Caraway made two yards for a first down. A spin play culminating in a lateral pass lost ground. Whitehall punted out of bounds on Mineral Wells' 5-yard line. The Mountaineers kicked to their own 20-yard line. Whitehall slashed off right tackle for 11 yards. Caraway fumbled, but recovered, Ranger losing three yards. Whitehall losing through right tackle for five yards. A bad snarback lost yards. A pass over the goal line went incomplete.

Mineral Wells' ball on their own 20-yard line. And now Mr. Bird got busy. He went off right tackle for nine yards. He hit left guard for 15 yards. He went off right tackle for six yards. He was dragging one of two secondary defenses along 60 yards after being tackled. By the time Mineral Wells had to punt—kicking to Ranger's 30-yard line. Visitors Try Passing
The visitors opened up six passes in the third period, combining three in a hurry for 63 yards, placing the ball on Ranger's 11 yard line. Browder did spectacular work in catching the passes. Hamilton on three Browder for a loss on a completed pass and accused Bulldogs gained possession of the ball on downs. Whitehall kicking near the sideline sliced the ball out on Ranger's 35-yard line. On a spin and a reverse, Brewer went around right end for 30 yards. Bird made a yard. Browder in two tries made three yards to the one-yard line but he was thrown for a yard loss off the fourth down as the quarter ended.

Whitehall got off a pretty kick that Browder returned 10 yards to Ranger's 45 yard line. Hamilton "clapped down" two passes. Brewer kicked out of bounds on Ranger's 20-yard line. In a pair of plays, Whitehall and Hamilton made six yards. Caraway made six through the line but Ranger failed by inches on fourth down and lost the ball on the 50-yard line. Mineral Wells, in two plays, had a first down. Then Ranger was penalized to the 12-yard line. Two plays through the line gained four yards. A pass from Browder to Browder was complete. Browder fumbling, Mitchell entering the ball and running 35 yards to the whistle had blown and it was still the Mountaineers' ball. Mineral Wells drew a 15-yard penalty. Ranger stopped the attack and gained the ball. Whitehall to Seal, placed the ball on Mineral Wells' 41-yard line. The next play—a pass—was intercepted and the game was over.

Combine ginger ale, sugar, salt and lemon juice. Soften gelatine in cold water for five minutes, add boiling water and stir until dissolved. Add to ginger ale mixture and stir until thoroughly blended. Let stand until mixture begins to jelly and add remaining ingredients and let stand on ice several hours to chill and become firm. Serve on a bed of lettuce with a cooked salad dressing.

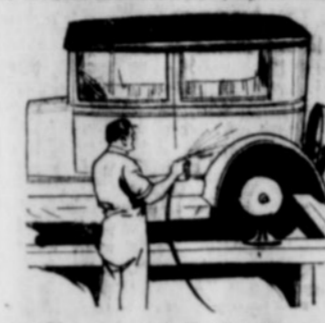

WASHINGTON LETTER

BY RODNEY DUTCHER

WASHINGTON—The publicity organizations of the Republican and Democratic national committees are running a neck and neck battle as the campaign gets into its final month.

The Democrats hold a record for delivering eight news stories to your correspondent in a single envelope, but Republican messenger boys arrive far more frequently.

Whenever more than an hour passes without receipt of mimeographed releases from Republican headquarters, correspondents begin to fear some accident to Mr. Hoover. When National Committee woman Caldwell of Virginia broke into fame with her "Romanized and rum-ridden" letter, a whole morning passed in which no courier dashed breathlessly about town with G. O. P. news releases and correspondents regarded this astonishing phenomena as indicating great perturbation at Republican headquarters.

The Republican publicity machine operates here where it may be viewed in all its glory and efficiency, whereas the Democratic publicity office here is just a branch of the main show in New York. The latter issues most news propaganda release simultaneously with the New York office, together with some work of its own.

In addition to these mimeographed stories delivered during the day to all correspondents, the Democrats issue a weekly known as the "Democratic Campaign News" and also a weekly clip-sheet from which pro-Smith editors can make a wide choice of favorable items.

A few weeks ago one of the Democratic publicity products made a stupid break about Hoover's Quakerism, but the machine is now hitting on all six.

Most of the mimeographed sheets which flood into the newspaper offices consist of predictions by visiting state leaders that the party's candidate will carry such and such a state by healthy majorities, announcement of somebody's bid or declaration for the candidate, announcements of speeches and radio hoopups, all the latest blasts from national chairmen and other campaign leaders against the opposition and news stories of speeches about to be delivered.

In both campaign organizations, the publicity divisions are among the largest departments. The Republican director of publicity is former Governor Henry J. Allen of Kansas. His assistants are Alfred Kirchofer and Harry Brown, veteran correspondents, at the head of a small corps of trained news writers.

The Democratic staff in New York is under Mrs. Henry Moskowitz. There are two women on the Republican staff, Anna Steese Richardson and Alice Fox Pitts of Buffalo.

Between 50 and 200 telephone calls are received each day from newspaper and magazine writers.

state penitentiary." State of Mind. Relative to the state of mind of the defendant at the time of the slaying the court charged that: "If the defendant was incapable of cool reflection on account of sudden passion arising from terror, threats or excitement, if any, caused by the acts of Clyde Thompson, the jury cannot assess the punishment at a period longer than five years in the state penitentiary. Continuing, the court charged:

"When two or more unite to accomplish some criminal action and, while engaged in such illegal enterprise, one of the conspirators commits a crime different from the one first contemplated but one likely or probable result of the criminal action contemplated, all who are present are principals."

The defense claimed that a statement made by the defendant to the county attorney had not been entirely voluntary. It had been made under conditions prejudicial to the defendant, and the court instructed the jury to judge if the confession had been made voluntarily, and if not then it must not be considered as evidence against the defendant.

The court also instructed the jury on the law of duress and told the jury to decide if the defendant had acted under duress. The court also instructed the jury on conspiracy and the punishment of a person who might be found to have been insane at the commission of a crime. The court gave this instruction:

"In case the jury finds from the evidence that the defendant committed the act with which he is charged, but at the time of the commission of the act he was in a condition of mental insanity as above defined, you will say by your verdict, 'we, the jury, acquit the defendant on the grounds of insanity.'"

The court also gave the jury the law on suspended sentence, instructing that if a person had not previously been convicted of a felony and that the punishment meted out to the defendant was not more than five years imprisonment in the penitentiary, then the jury might recommend to the court that sentence be suspended.

Two Webb County Officials Warned

By United Press. LAREDO, Oct. 10.—Threats against the lives of District Attorney John Valls and Sheriff Joe Condren of Webb county were exposed in a letter received by the sheriff today, in which a plot of three persons was related. Condren said he knew the parties in question and would seek their arrest when further evidence can be gathered.

Valls was the object of a shooting two months ago while he was taking an evening walk. The shot missed.
