





Checkbook Charity Condemned at The Lutheran Meeting

ERIE, Pa., Oct. 10.—"Check-book charity" was denounced to-day by Dr. Frederick H. Knubel, president of the United Lutheran Church m America, who presented his biennial report to the convention of that body at the Luther Memorial church here.

The belief that the churches of America are undergoing a very

America are undergoing a very definite process of change was expressed by Dr. Knubel.

The past tendency, he said, has been toward developing their own membership through evangelistic

been toward developing their own membership through evangelistic efforts and educating their youth in church-supported institutions but the opersent trend is toward unselfish works of mercy in which the Christian takes thought first of all of his fellow beings.

"Christian love," he said, "is a very thorough thing. It marks a life which is not brooding over its own miseries and does not evade care for the distresses of others, but willingly permits itself to become full of other men's troubles.

"All stress is necessary upon the fact that this mercy goes the full length in service, in that it is ready personally to administer relief. It is not what has come commonly to be known as 'checkbook charity.' All distress possesses loneliness and bitterness. Only the personal touch will heal the loneliness. Only the personal love will heal the bitterness. No help is really being offered and no relief is really being accomplished unless somehow the personal element enters in."

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—A
warning against "intrusion of politics and economics in the pulpits and on the platforms of the church," was uttered today by the Rt. Rev. Charles Palmerston Anderson, bishop of Chicago, in a sermon opening the forty-ninth triennial general convention of the Episcopal church.

Bishop Anderson's reference to politics in the pulpit came early in his sermon. Defining religion as an intensely personal thing as well as an intensely social thing, he said that "there is no sphere of human conduct, whether in society or business or politics, in the follower of Christ can detach himself from his religion." The bishop then added: "You will not construe this as a plea for he intrusion of politics and economics in the pulpits and on the platform of the church.
