



Every American community has excellent service stations providing all manner of services in addition to selling its wares. But in Moscow, one of the world's biggest cities, there are only five service stations. And at these the cus omer, when he buys inferior rationed gas, does the chor himself. All the attendant does is watch the meter and colect the rubles.
