These Oriental powers, while at present on not too friendly terms toward each other, always must keep a watchful eye on Russia. While Moscow pretends to desire amicable relations with Japan and China, the pressure of events is ever at work influencing events is ever at work influencing Russia to strengthen her position at the eastern end of her great Asiatic possession.

Japan is firmly entrenched in Manchuria and is resolved not to abandon her hold on that province which Japanese money and enter-prise has lifted far above the eco-nomic level of China proper. Ja-pan, too, for some time has had her gaze fixed on Mongolia as of-fering possibilities for future de-velopment somewhat as Manchu-ris has been developed. Mongolia ria has been developed.
