

Security Rep. **Coming To City** Hall on Monday

E. Glen McNatt, field representative of the Abilene office of the Social Security Administraanswered a question plied frequently by farmers:

Question: If a farmer's average monthly income is determined by including the period back to Jannary 1, 1951, will he not be penalized since he had 'no "covered" earnings until 1955?

Answer: Generally speaking, a person's average monthly earnings are figured by dividing his total covered earnings from 1951 the date of his retirement or death by all the months in that period. However, under the new aw, these four years from 1951 to 1955 can be dropped out in figuring his average monthly earnings on which his benefit will be based.

One additional year can be dropped out if the insured worker has five years or more of coverage. The years dropped out need not be consecutive ones. They can be any 4 or 5 years of low or no earnings, so long as they fall within the period used in determining his average income.
