Missionaries Tell Gruesome Tales Of Starvation In China

PEIPING, June 6.— One of the greatest military movements in recent history has been completed with evacuation of Kansa and Shensi provinces by the armies of Marshal Feng Yu-Hshan, according to V. G. Plymire, American missionary who paused here in route to the United States from his station in Dangar, in Kokomor, on the Tibetan border. 
