This is the finding of Associate Justices William Pierson and Special Justices A. H. Britain and C. S. Bradley on the Ferguson application for a mandamus to compele the state democratic executive committee to place his name on the primary ballot as a candidate for governor. There is said to be no appeal from the decesion to a higher court of last resort, it is held by the special tribunal that the high court of impeachment tracked the constitution, and the only possible way for the former governor to nullify its penalty is an amendment to the venerable document adopted almost 60 years ago.

Mr. Ferguson has stated in print and in private conversation that the name of Mrs. Ferguson, also a former governor for a single term, will appear on the official ballot as the vindication candidate of the House of Ferguson, subject to the action of the democratic primary in July. Hoover electors, has been given a place on the official ballot by court action.

Ferguson is barred from the ballot by court action, but not for bolting. He is held ineligible because of his disqualification by a high court of impeachment as provided by the organic law of the commonwealth. This clarifies the political atmosphere. Early in June the state committee will hold a session as provided by law and place the names eligible on the ballot to be voted at the July primary. Now the preliminary campaigning for the nomination will open in earnest and the battle lines will stretch from the Gulf of Mexico amost to the foothills of the Rocky range.
