Fellowship Of Christian Athletes Heard

Eighteen high school athletes came together recently to indicate their common bond in sports and their uncommon bond in faith. He didn't say so in so many words, but you get the distinct impression that Dr. Norman Wallace, president of Cisco Junior College, would prefer that the word "Junior" were dropped from the name. Speaking for members of the Eastland Lions Club at the Ramada Inn, he explained that the expanding role of the college certainly lends itself well to the "Community College" designation - and went on to add that the school's "Community" includes a large area, certainly including Eastland. One of 47 junior colleges in the state which are serving over two million people on 53 campuses, CJC, of course began in the traditional junior college role, preparing students with their first two years, then sending them on to senior colleges and universities, but now serves many other functions as well. Of course, the school is still fulfilling that first two-year need with up-to-date guidance and counseling which helps youngsters find program to which they are suited. The school is academically accredited so that courses transfer readily. The NEW approach is the addition of technical - vocational training which can help all ages, and of particular interest is the continuing education program for adults who need special training or re-training for other fields. "We've got a comprehensive community college," he explained, and can tailor courses to the needs of groups, regardless of the skills required. CJC gets only five per cent of its budget from the college tax district. The remainder comes from the state and student fees and tuitions.

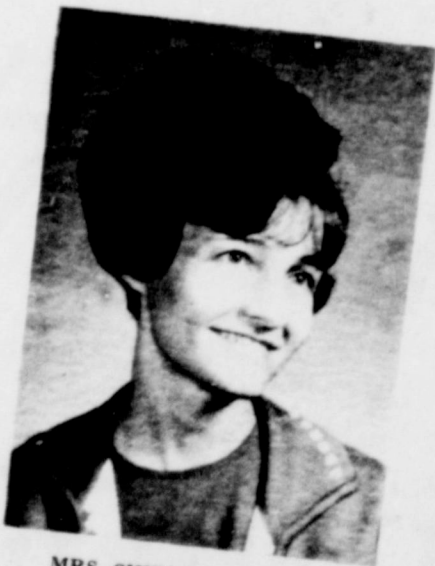

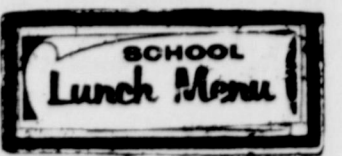

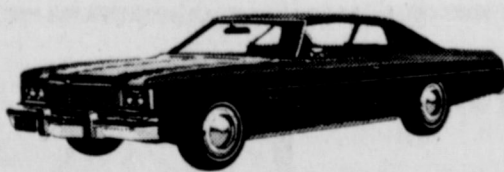

Accent on Health

AUSTIN--The Texas Medical Association's aims and activities, designed to "enable physicians to render the highest quality of medical care for their patients", were cited in an in-depth article published this month in *Texas Medicine*, the Association's scientific journal.

Entitled, "Is TMA a scientific group? You Bet!", the article presents an inside view into the abundant services, programs, and activities supported by TMA to enable its members to extend their medical knowledge and advance medical science.

The Texas Medical Association, headquartered in Austin, is a private, non-profit organization comprised of over 12,500 Texas physicians and is supported primarily through membership dues.

Programs, services, and activities supported by TMA include: a medical library; a statewide annual meeting; a scientific journal; a medical-education program; a physician community placement service; and a public information service.

Designed to assist physicians, medical students, and allied health personnel, the TMA Memorial Library supplies members of the Association with an abundance of medical information. Meeting more than 12,000 references requests annually and built upon a collection of over 50,000 bound volumes, it is considered to be one of the leading medical libraries in the country.

The Library's newest service is the "Medline", a computer hookup between the National Library of Medicine in Bethesda, Md., and the TMA Library. Medline functions to select and print out all bibliographical references on a medical subject published within the last two years.

In addition to its stacks and Medlines, TMA's Memorial Library also has a room full of cassettes, tapes, and films on medical subjects.

Each year, TMA presents a statewide meeting for members to share new technical and scientific insights in the field of medicine. These are presented through a variety of scientific sessions, educational symposiums, guest speakers, and both scientific and technical exhibits. This year's scientific sessions featured over 450 medical authorities who discussed new or improved surgical techniques, diagnostic and treatment methods, scientific studies and their results.

Scientific information useful to practicing physicians is published and distributed to TMA members each month by its scientific journal, *Texas Medicine*. Besides this primary function, the journal also offers special sections to inform doctors of upcoming meetings, new advances in medicine, and

continuing educational opportunities.

One of the primary interests of TMA members is to provide the best possible medical education and training opportunities for students. In 1974, through various funds, the TMA Board of Trustees is in a position to loan up to \$160,000 to medical students. Most of these loans are granted to those who have difficulty meeting the considerable expenses involved in attending a medical school.

While urging more ample support for Texas' six medical schools, the TMA is also involved in developing and effecting programs designed to increase the number of physicians in the state. As a result of these efforts, medical schools in Texas graduated 599 doctors of medicine in June, 1974. This is almost double the 318 that graduated in 1969.

To encourage young doctors to practice in the areas of greatest need, TMA offers a placement service for doctors seeking places to practice, and for communities seeking doctors. This service is also utilized by physicians seeking associates.

As a public service, TMA meets hundreds of requests from students, teachers and the general public for health information. TMA's public information service also includes the distribution of health and safety information through news releases, public service radio and television announcements, pamphlets, and outdoor billboards.

All the programs, services, and activities of TMA as cited in the *Texas Medicine* article, work toward the Association's primary objective: "To provide the best medical care possible for all Texans."

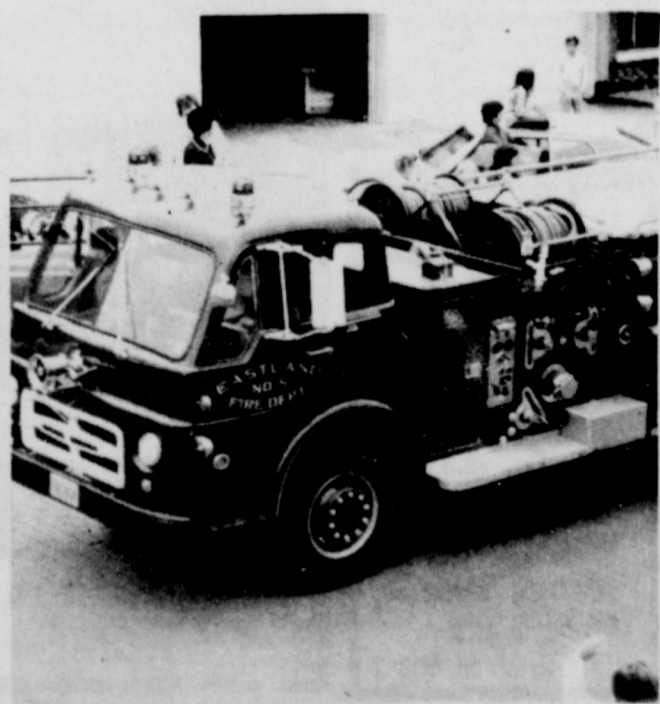

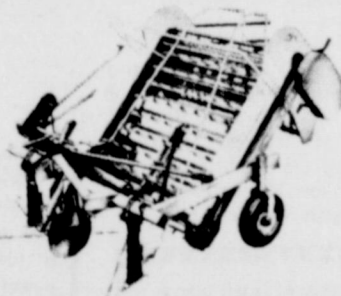

Mr. And Mrs. Charlie High Home Suffers Heavy Loss In Fire Sunday

Fire, which erupted shortly before 7 a.m. Sunday, did an estimated \$30,000 in damages to the home of Mr. and Mrs.

Charlie High, 405 S. Walnut St., in Eastland. The loss was one of the heaviest in several years to be suffered by an Eastland residence.

Mrs. C.W. Newnham, a neighbor at 409 S. Walnut Street, said she noticed the fire and smelled smoke at about 7 o'clock and turned in the alarm.

Both Mr. and Mrs. High were away from the home at the time. Mrs. High was in Odessa on a weekend trip and High was fishing at Lake Leon. Lake patrolman James Johnson located High at the lake and told him about the fire.

When asked what he estimated his loss to be, High replied, "a total loss". Eastland insurance man, Richard Rossander, who was on the scene most of the day, said that High had \$17,000 coverage on the house, and another \$8,800 on the contents. The house, an older structure, had only recently been completely remodeled. The remodeling job included new vinyl siding, which buckled, burned and dripped under the extreme heat. The house also had been recently air conditioned throughout and completely carpeted.

Insulation in the walls and ceiling, although not burning itself, caused firemen trouble as it hindered their efforts in

reaching burning ceilings and inner walls.

The Eastland fire department which dispatched three trucks to the scene, was on the job from 7 a.m. until shortly after 11 a.m., and pumped an estimated 270,000 gallons of water on the blaze from pumpers located at S. Walnut and W. Valley Streets, and S. Walnut and W. Plummer Streets. Local fireman D.J. Walker, who acted as a fire police at the W. Plummer location said the fire was "one of the most stubborn ones I've ever seen...and I have been a volunteer fireman for many years."

At the height of the fire, blaze from the rear of the residence caught a 40 ft. elm tree on fire, and intense heat caused vinyl siding on the north side of a garage building owned by the Newnham's to buckle and peel as water was played on the structure temporarily to keep it from catching fire. The garage was some 35 feet south of the High residence.

Firemen were able to save some furniture and personal belongings, which were stored

The Center has served more than 21,000 individuals since it began operations on August 15, 1953. All donations are tax deductible.

Veteran Population Upward

Average age of the nation's veteran population is moving upward, but ages of benefits counselors at Veterans Administration offices across the country are getting younger. Jack Coker, VA Regional Director, pointed out today.

Mr. Average among the 29.2 million living veterans is 45.5 years of age. Some 1,300 Spanish-American War veterans - with an average age of 94.5 - are offset by more than 7 million Vietnam-era veterans with an average age of 27.7.

VA employs more than 2,800 benefits counselors to serve the veteran population and its eligible dependents. This is an increase of more than 1,500 counselors in the past two years. Counselors are located in 38 regional offices in the United States, Puerto Rico and Republic of the Philippines. They also visit patients in 171 VA hospitals.

More than 56 per cent of today's counselors are under 35 years of age. This contrasts to only 17.6 per cent of 1,338 counselors under 35 two years ago.

Matching the growing number of Vietnam-era

veterans, VA has tailored its staff of benefits counselors with peer strength. More than 1,800 counselors - 65 per cent - are Vietnam-era veterans. Another 23 per cent served in the military during World War II and Korea.

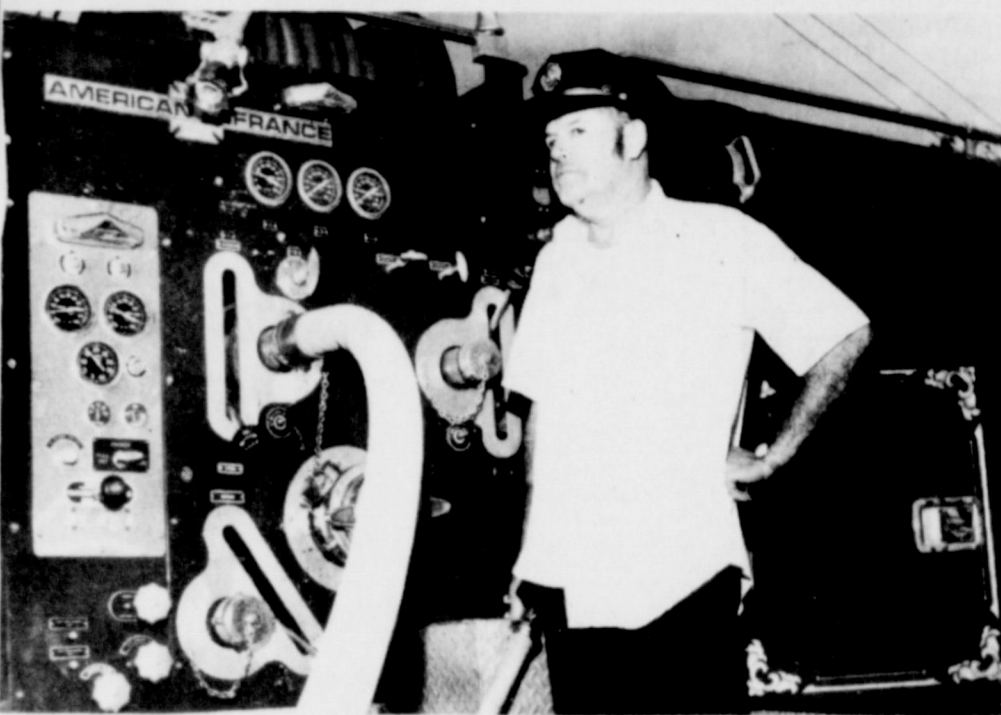
The trend toward Vietnam-era counselors was particularly evident in hiring 1,327 Vet Reps for VA's new campus program this fall. The new group includes 1,307 Vietnam-era veterans. Average age of the Vet Reps is 28 and there are 1 women among the counselors.
