

Mavs Annihilate Albany Lions 42-0

The Eastland Mavericks did a super job in Maverick Stadium Friday night, rattling the Albany Lions 42-0.

The Mavs looked good all the way around after rebounding from a score of 20-26 in favor of the DeLeon Bearcats the previous week in Maverick Stadium.

The Mavs lost the toss at the opening and Albany chose to receive from the north end of the field. The first quarter of play saw no scoring drives for the Mavs, and only one play that was of any real significance and that stemming from a pass from Eastland Quarterback Gary Wheat to End Brent Parker for a twenty-seven yard gainer but failed to develop after three downs.

The first two of three minutes of the second quarter went without any real drives. The first scoring drive came when the Mavs took possession on the fifty yard line and started moving toward the Albany goal line on short scampers from Eastland's Tommy Morren - "who was also having a good night and had a total of 30 points which kept his standing as the 9-AA conference leading scorer", and from scrambles from Quarterback Wheat, which finally set up the scoring haul at the Albany 5 yard line when Morren leapt in. After the touchdown Morren missed a kick which was something most Maverick fans were not used to seeing, but later in the game saw improvement. The touchdown left with Eastland 6, Albany 0.

On the kick from Morren to Albany following the Maverick touchdown the Lions took the ball at their 30 yard line but were unable to move, and were forced to punt.

On the punt the Mavs took possession of the ball at their 25 yard line and after two downs Mav quarterback Wheat made another handoff connection to Morren who danced through the Albany line and broke for a 75 yard touchdown run, and with the extra point good by Morren the Mavs lead at the half with a score of 13-0 over the Lions of Albany.

The Albany marching band gave a wonderful performance during half time, followed by a spectacular presentation from the Maverick Marching Band with lights out in Maverick Stadium featuring the fire from the batons from twirlers Jill Price and Gale Swift.

The second half was dominated by the Mavs.

The Mavs next score came from a 42 yard field goal by Tommy Morren in the dawning minutes of the third quarter, preceded minutes later by a punt from Morren which boomed down to the Lions 7 yard line where the ball was fumbled and recovered by Eastland and on the first down Wheat once again handed to Morren who pushed in for the score, extra point good and the Mavs went farther into the lead with a 22-0 score.

With three minutes left in the third quarter Eastland turned over the ball to the Lions at the Lion 35 yard line, but three downs later Albany fumbled and Eastland's Charles Harvey recovered and the Mavs took the ball at the Lions 48 yard line.

On the first down from the Mavs following the turnover Wheat handed off to Brent Parker who ran 48 yards for another Mav touchdown. Another extra point good and the third quarter closed with Eastland 29, Albany 0.

At the opening of the fourth quarter Eastland kicked to Albany but after three plays Albany was forced to punt. Eastland's Billy Daniels blocked the punt and the Mavs had a first and ten at their 45 yard line.

A couple of downs after the Mavs took the ball Wheat again handed off to Morren who broke away from would-be tacklers and went for 49 yards to give the Mavs 35-0 over Albany.

After the kick from Eastland the Lions got two downs before Lions quarterback K.C. Jones is trapped behind his line, making it hard for the Lion pack to gain enough ground for a first down, and they turn over the ball.

The last scoring drive by the Mavs was guided by Maverick back up Quarterback Rex Morgan, whose different signal calling cadence showed up with 5 yard penalties here and there from offsidies jumps by the

Lions front line. With the clock showing one minute left to play in the game Morgan had brought the Mavs down to the Albany 5 yard line, where a simple handoff from Morgan to John Marshall was all it took for the Mavs final touchdown for the Mavs. Morren's kick was once again good and the score board showed 42-0 Mavericks.

High Band Radio System Takes Another Forward Step

Eastland County Law Enforcement High Band Radio System took another forward step toward reality this week as details are continuing to be worked out.

The ultra-modern system will link the police departments of the cities in the county, the sheriff's office and Department of Public Safety with sophisticated equipment bringing the county into a total statewide network which should provide unexcelled communications in the continuing fight against crime.

The program is being set up in participation with the Region Communications System, cooperating with the West Central Texas Council of Governments, where in the Texas Criminal Justice Council will assist in the total cost of the expensive equipment.

In a planning session Friday it was decided, based on recommendations of the planning engineer's over-all plan, that the tower would be located on county property alongside Highway 6, near the center of the county. This land was offered by the County Commissioners Court for the system. It is the site of the old county poor farm, and is judged best location by the engineers.

The cities and the county are participating and will share the cost of certain "common" equipment including the mobile relay-base station, intercity base station, tower, and other auxiliary equipment necessary to set up the base station; coming to a total cost of some \$15,434.60, plus an engineering fee of some \$1,858.00. The CJC will fund three-fourths of this amount, leaving only 25%, \$4,323.15 to be shared by the participants in the county.

Then each unit will have equipment judged necessary for their participation in the total hookup. The CJC will also fund 75% of these costs too, bringing the overall costs to each participating body to a low figure. For instance, the sheriff's department is scheduled for three mobile units, one portable unit, a single charger, console, encoder and decoder, for a total cost of \$7,979.00. The county's one-fourth cost would be something like \$1,994.75 for this, plus the shared equipment cost.

The Eastland Police Dept. is scheduled for two mobile units, one portable unit, a single charger, a single charger, a console encoder and decoder for a total cost of \$7,348.00; one fourth of which is \$1,837, plus the city's share of the shared equipment.

The Cisco Police Dept. is seen to need two mobile units, one control station, one transmission line, antenna, encoder, decoder, mounting clamps and wood pole, for a total cost of \$5,270; or at one-fourth, \$1,317.50, plus the shared cost.

Ranger Police are scheduled for one mobile unit, one control station, one transmission line, antenna, galvanized pipe with floor flanges for a total cost of \$1,925.80; or one fourth figure of \$482.45, plus shared cost.

The new telephone company free dialing service between Ranger and Eastland and between Cisco and Eastland is an important factor in the new radio system too, it's reported.

Rising Star and Gorman are each asking for one mobile unit at a cost of \$631.00; one fourth of which would be \$157.75.

Many details are still being worked out, but all in all it's held to be a decided asset for the entire area in law enforcement procedures.

PRESIDENT FORD SUPPORTS UNITED WAY CAMPAIGNS

President Gerald R. Ford appeared three times on nationwide television in the last few days to support the local United Way campaigns in the United States.

James R. Kerr, chairman of the UWA Board of Governors, introduced the Chief Executive.

"I am speaking as one who has worked as a United Way volunteer in my own hometown," the President said, "as one who knows what the United Way can do.

"The United Way symbolizes the best in each of us and in each of our communities. It brings together men and women from every part of the community - all working together to help those who need help."

President Ford told the nation that the countrywide goal for the United Way campaign this year is more than one billion dollars, noting that last year's pledges helped 34 million families.

"But we can't help that many families this year with the amount of money we pledged last year. I think you know the reason why," the President said.

"The same problem that put the squeeze on your family budget, and which is the number one concern of this administration, has hit the United Way, too. Inflation has taken its toll in the voluntary sector as well.

"Last year, for example, in the typical community, the United Way could provide professional care for a retarded child for a little more than \$6 a day. This year, it costs \$10 a day to provide the same professional care for the same child.

"The difference is - where inflation costs you to cut back, for the sick and aged and the dependent young there is nothing left to cut. They cannot afford to lose the help they are now receiving.

"Your pledge to the United Way in your community provides the most effective, economical, and efficient way to provide that help."

Sen. Creighton 'Guesses' Tax Cut

Senator Tom Creighton talked on state tax reduction before the Eastland County Law Enforcers Association Friday at a noon meeting held in the Ramada Inn Restaurant.

Sen. Creighton delivered an informal talk with a question and answer period following.

In the main portion of his speech, Senator Creighton stated that politicians are now advocating a reduction of taxes. The reason for this is the energy phenomena. Gas and crude oil are now generating so much tax money, and the sales tax is so affected by inflation, that there will be a certifiable surplus of \$1.5 billion in the state budget during the next two to three years, he said. One - third of this is already cash in the bank and the state government will finish the year with a \$5 million surplus. A tax reduction for two years would still leave the state government, and the people of Texas, with plenty of money and it would give the people a break for a couple of years. Even taking a tax reduction into account, the budget would still be able to include a 24 per cent raise for state employees and emergency funds for the schools.

Texas is unique in its position of surplus funds. It ranks 43rd

in America in the lowest per capita tax paid and the lowest in the Southwest.

The question and answer period which followed Senator Creighton's speech ranged over a wide field. One question asked was could the cities take some of the sales tax for use?

Senator Creighton and State Representative Joe Hanna responded by saying that, while it had not been decided what action to take on the surplus money, the schools and counties had also asked for the money and it was generally felt that the cities would not receive it due to the 1 cent tax they already have.

Senator Creighton and Representative Hanna both recognized the fact that no one, especially bodies of government, has enough money.

Another question asked concerned the criminal code and Senator Creighton replied that he felt it had been fairly well accepted. Along these same lines was a question on capital murder and it was noted that legal action will have to determine exactly what constitutes capital murder under the present provision of the law.

According to Senator Creighton, the changes made in the juvenile law has led to confusion and has almost emptied the state's detention

centers and juvenile homes.

Another major question asked was if there would be another major constitutional drive next year. Both Senator Creighton and Representative Hanna felt that such a drive would be unlikely, thought some Articles, such as the Article of Local Government, would be submitted to the people of Texas for vote.

Following the question and answer period, was some informal talk among the men present.

Firm Renews Water Source Hunt In Area

The inability of Lake Leon to supply all water needed by 333 subscribers to a new rural water corporation has not ended the firm's efforts to achieve their goal, officials reported Friday following a membership meeting and work by committees.

The membership meeting was held last Tuesday night at Cisco Junior College, and President Ronnie White of the corporation told of his visit with Eastland city commissioners. It was brought out at the Eastland meeting that they had never been consulted about serving the water needs of a 35 mile pipeline system.

Following suggestions by members, committees met with officials in Cisco and Baird as well as Eastland. This developed information that the water district might be able to secure pipeline connections for customers near Eastland from Lake Leon, for customers near Cisco, from Lake Cisco, and from the Baird lake for customers in the Putnam area.

Engineers Yeatts and Decker, Abilene firm engaged to work on the project, were contacted by Doug Fry and David Kerr of Cisco, and the engineers confirmed that it would be feasible to operate with water from several sources. Their preliminary survey is continuing.

Secretary Charles Clark of the corporation reported that none of the 333 members has asked for a refund of the \$100 subscription paid in. This fact was regarded as evidence that the subscribers want the water service from whatever source it can be obtained, he said.

Mr. Clark reported that the organization's official name is West Ben Water Corporation. The state had already issued a charter in the name of Desert Water Corporation as had been originally asked.

Passes 1000 Mark

Cisco Junior College's enrollment for the current fall semester has well surpassed the 1000 mark, as earlier predicted by college officials, and the school is currently serving an all-time record number of people with several new community service programs added to the college's regular semester-length courses, Dean Carroll Scott has announced.

The enrollment figures were released following the Cisco college's final extension registration in Merkel Monday evening, Sept. 24. The totals show 1047 students taking degrees or vocational certificates in Cisco and its five extension locations, 373 people signed up for continuing education programs under the headings of adult education and community service, and 93 area high school students taking technical-vocational programs in a contract program whereby CJC provides facilities and teachers for prep school juniors and seniors. Students in the three areas of service combine to make a grand total of 1513 persons currently being served by the college, an increase of some 40 percent over the total head count of the fall semester of 1973, Mr. Scott said.

The dean pointed out that the 373 figure for continuing education programs should grow substantially throughout the school year as various programs are made available to specific interest groups as opportunities arise. Continuing education programs have not been figured in past enrollment counts, Dean Scott added.

Dr. Norman E. Wallace Jr., president of the college, expressed satisfaction at the growth reflected in the enrollment figures. "When we're growing we are serving more people of the Big Country-and that's why we're here", Wallace said.

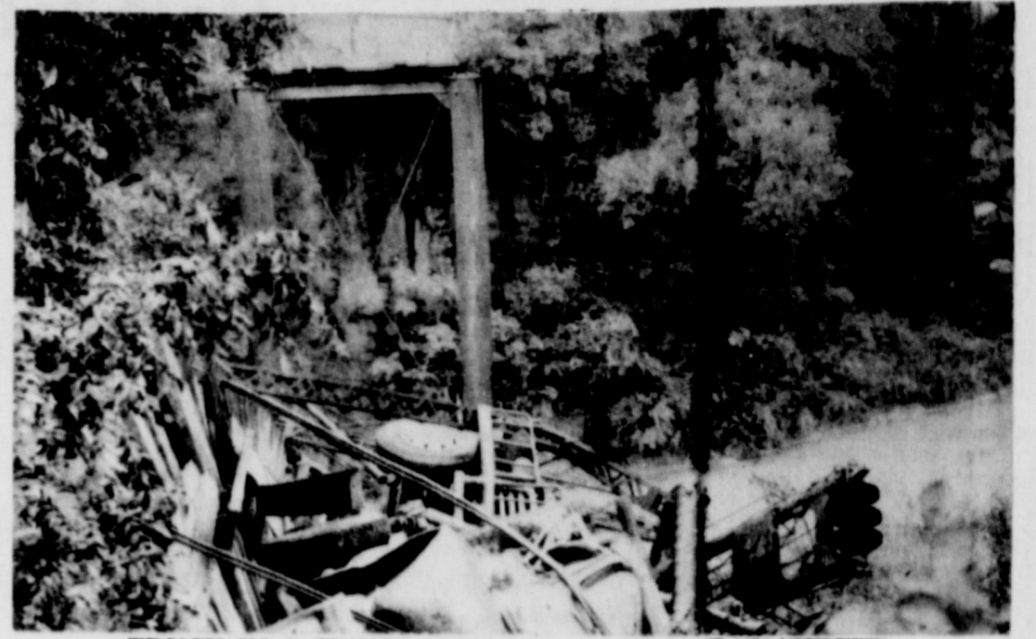
Most Ponds Caught Water

The construction of ponds for livestock water has been a familiar practice through out the upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation District during the recent drought. And now with the early fall rains most of these ponds have already caught alot of water and are ready to be stocked with fish.

Stocking new ponds with the right kinds, numbers and combinations of fish is the most important step in developing a good fish pond. The most desirable fish used in stocking include largemouth bass, channel catfish, redear sunfish and green - redear hybrid sunfish. Crappie are not recommended in farm ponds because they overpopulate rapidly resulting in overcrowded, stunted populations. Most sunfish present the same problem however redear and the hybrid mentioned above reproduce at a more manageable rate and may be stocked successfully.

One thing that should be remembered when stocking channel catfish in combinations with bass or other predatory fish, the catfish should be stocked in the fall prior to stocking with bass the next spring. Otherwise, bass stocked in the spring may eat 95 - 100 per cent of the channel catfish stocked the following fall.

Fish may be secured through state hatcheries at no charge. Requests for fish from state hatcheries may be made by applying through an official of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. Also, channel catfish fingerlings may be obtained from commercial catfish farms at a nominal cost. Dumping quantities of fish which have been seined from rivers, streams or other ponds into new ponds is not recommended because you will be transplanting many undesirable including minnows, shiners, bullhead catfish or polliwogs and other rough fish.

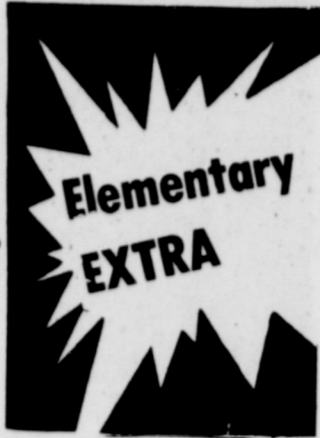

Most of us have learned all of our long and short vowel sounds and have learned to put sounds together so we can read words

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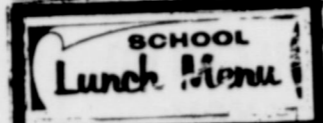
like at, eat, ate, and toe. This week we have learned to write and work addition problems.
