DARK OR LIGHT FRUIT-CAKES

Choices range from dark to light types of fruitcake, with both kinds full of fruits and nuts or for families who like just a hint, the fruit and nuts may be lightly scattered through the cake.

Unshelled nuts are often, but not always, less expensive than shelled nuts.

Compare costs: two pounds of unshelled tree nuts make one pound (three to four cups) of nutmeats.

"The small, recipe - size packages are generally more expensive than the "holiday baking" size (one pound) packages," the specialist pointed out.

BAKING, GLAZING AND DECORATING

'Bake fruitcakes in foil pans, - size glass individual casseroles, or even in tiny muffin tins. Glaze and decorate them after they've cooled. You can bake them in clean, well washed coffee cans for unusual shapes," she added.

WURSTFEST IS gemuetlichkeit ... good fellowship in the German manner. That's sort of he slogan for the annual Wurstfest at New Braunfels, and we enjoyed looking in on the big event last weekend.

A visit to their Wursthalle and Markplatz is something that you'll find unique and very entertaining. The hall is about three times as big as Cisco's community gym. Assorted booths allow you to feast on all kinds of sausage, smoked and crisp or hot and juicy, wrapped in homemade bread. They have strudels and numerous dishes in German style.

"You can expect two and a half servings from one pound of ham with bone in, but three servings from a pound of boneless ham.

'One pound of whole fresh turkey yields two servings per pounds, while one pound of turkey breast or boneless turkey roast gives three servings,' Miss Reasonover pointed out.

Peanuts Respond To Fertilizer

College Station-Peanut vields in Texas Agricultural Experiment Station trials showed responses to fertilizer applications under both dryland and irrigated conditions in 1973, the fourth year in a row that the crop was planted on the same ocations and received the same fertility rates.

The tests were conducted at the Texas A&M University-Tarleton Experiment Station at Stephenville under the direction of James S. Newman, associate professor in charge.

Maximum yields in most tests resulted from 25 pounds of nitrogen per acre applied alone or in combination with phosphorus and potassium. Best yield increases from fertilizer ranged from 115 to 980 pounds per acre compared to untreated peanuts. Increased gross returns per acre were \$19.75 to \$167.75, according to Newman.

A 25-pound-per-acre nitrogen application, with or without phosphorus, gave the five highest yields 14 out of 25 times at a given location. Phosphorus and potassium without nitrogen had similar yield responses.

A 50-pound-per-acre nitrogen application generally depressed crop output, said Newman.

Micronutrients also boosted vields, but not significantly. This implies that none of the test sites had serious micronutrient shortages, noted the Experiment Station scientist.

The four years of fertilizer testing indicate that plant nutrients will produce different effects on different soils. It is not known if yields will declind under conditions where no fertilizer is applied over a long period or at what intervals application would be most economical. Continued fertilizer research with more soil testing should be helpful in answering such questions, said Newman.



TESCO Honors QCentury Members

Burl B. Hulsey Jr., president of Texas Electric Service Co., told company employees at a meeting here last night honoring Quarter Century Club members that TESCO is in a strong position today and although it has solid, longrange plans for the future, carrying out those plans will be a big. tough job.

Hulsey said that TESCO is just beginning a major transition from using natural gas for virtually all its generating plants to using lignite coal and nuclear fuels.

'This transition is the most far-reaching and most expensive in the company's history", that are adequate to attract and to pay the cost of this additional

TESCO sold \$70 million in new securities at a rate of about 81/2 % in April, he said, and plans to sell \$60 million of new bonds in December, expecting to pay about 10% for this

Hulsey said that several major utilities recently had been unable to find buyers for their bonds and stocks which forced them to make major cutbacks in their construction plans.

'It won't take long for these cutbacks to result in poorer service to customers," he said. There is one basic reason why these companies are faced with serious financial crises and a deterioration of their service. They have not been allowed sufficient earnings to stay financially strong and to keep a good credit rating.

TESCO has a strong financial position and an excellent credit rating at this time, he stated. The only way we can keep this strong position, so that we can get the money we need, is through rate increases like the one approved earlier this year."

Hulsey said that directly related to the company's financial strength is the effect the proposed state utility commission would have.

'Many of the problems faced by electric utilities in other states have been caused by oppressive, over-regulation by state utility commissions. Utilianalysts now recognize that most state utility regulatory laws and methods are out of date, archaic and simply not

utilities in other parts of the country--when you look at the record -- it's obvious there's something wrong with their system of regulation and

something right with ours. 'Our present system of local, close-to-home regulation of our rates and service is working and is working well for our customers. It has resulted in quality service at some of the lowest rates in the country.

'Local regulation is more responsive to local needs and problems because local people. who are themselves customers, can best judge the quality and value of our service.

"The increasing costs we face must be included in the price of electricity. A state utility commission cannot reduce these costs or solve any of the problems we face. It can't make new supplies of fuel available. It can't reduce construction costs. It can't make more capital available, and it can't reduce

Light On **Falling** Cattle Prices

College Station - - Are high imports and low exports the cause of current falling cattle prices?

Dr. Ed Uvacek, livestock marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, shed some light on this

question with a few facts. "During January to June of 1974, imports of beef, veal and pork into the U.S. Were down three per cent from last year's levels, while imports of cattle were down 21 per cent," says the Texas A&M University System specialist. "Hog imports, however, wer up 184 per

cent over last year's levels.' Uvacek went on to say that beef and veal exports were down eight per cent over last year's levels, while pork exports were down 77 per cent. However, cattle exports have gone up 87 per cent, with a 231 per cent increase inc cattle exports to Canada.

'Despite these low import levels, except for hogs, and higher cattle exports, the price per hundredweight of slaughter steers, lambs, and barros and gilts has shown a marked decrease during 1974 compared to 1974 levels," he adds. "This should empasize the fact that current low cattle prices have a much deeper domestic root than foreign trade in livestock would explain.
