County Officers Envolved Manhunt

A number of Eastland County law enforcement officers were involved in the manhunt in the STephenville area of the three Colorado State Penitentiary escapees this past weekend, and continuing until Monday night, with the capture of two of the three convicts late Monday night, and the killing of the third escapee.

Two Cisco officers--the constable and a police department dispatcher; three officers of the Eastland County Sheriff's Department; a Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission Officer from Eastland; an Eastland game warden; an Eastland police officer; five county Department of Public Safety Officers; and three area DPS men all took part in the dragnet of law enforcement men attempting to capture the escaped trio. The three convicts were Dalton Williams, 29, formerly of Snyder; Richard Magnum, 22, of Denver, Colorado; and Jerry Ulmer, 22, formerly of the

Trail, who said he had never participated in killing anyone before, although he had fired a weapon in Vietnam combat. said three of the officers fired rifles and the other a shotgun from a range of 130 to 170 feet.

County Projects Are Being Re-Considered

Re-evaluation and consideration is underway of the projects now on file in Eastland County for development under the Resource Conservation and

Development Project of Texas At a county board of directors meeting Tuesday, directors heard Charles Halnisch of Stephenville, RC&D Project Coordinator, outline the work of the Leon-Bosque RC&D pro-

The program is a systematic plan for the development and wise use of all natural resour-

Many projects for the county are on the books including the park plans for Eastland, Ranger and Cisco, and other worthwhile programs being considered.

Each community will review the status of their individual programs, accept proposals for new ideas, and strike out those projects which are no longer considered necessary or which have been accomplished.

The county directors will meet quarterly, and report on

the local interest and projects

which can be tried. Ronald Bailey of Eastland, representing the Soil Conservation Service, presided and pledged himself to help and

assist with the programs.

Purpose of the plan is to direct projects which can be helped through the some 1,000 programs available.

Eastland County is one of five in the Leon-Bosque District, which is third such in the state. Local meetings will be called to consider the projects and

Patrolman Trail Is Key Man In **Convict Capture**

Efficient lawmen and faithful watch dogs are responsible for sounder sleep and peace of

mind for residents of this area. Capture Monday night of three escaped convicts who had been causing a reign of terror in this area for several days, climaxed anxious moments for many, as the trio was rounded up north of Stephenville, just down the road from Lake Leon.

Off-duty Eastland Policeman Richard Trail was a key man in the capture, as the four-man team he had volunteered to join, helped bring the trio of desperados back to confine-

Ironically, it was farm dogs which signaled the alert lawmen that the convicts were moving

and in the area. During their trip of terror after escaping from the Colorado State Prison at Canon City, through New Mexico, West Texas, and into Central Texas. the convicts had killed two people, injured five others and shot several domestic dogs.

The trail touched Snyder, Breckenridge, Graham, Mingus, Strawn and southward to north of Stephenville. Reportedly the trio had been in the Lake Leon area Sunday afternoon and local law enforcement officers, Volunteer Firemen and Citizen Band Radio personnel provided search and observe

tactics in that area. Sunday night the trio was bottled up into a five square mile area north of Stephenville, and nerves were on edge throughout this area as reports of their having slipped the net

continued.\$ Involved in the giant manhunt were FBI agents, Texas Rangers, Department of Public Safety personnel, sheriff's departments and policemen. Drizzling rain and ultra-rough terrain made the search effort difficult.

Eastland Policeman Trail joined the search effort Monday afternoon, volunteering like many others on his days off.

He reported to the Search Command Post set up at the Stephenville Police Department at 4 p.m. Monday and was told to report back for a briefing session about 6 when he would

be assigned to a post. men who were assigned a sector them across the southwest. on State Highway 8 about four miles north of Stephenville. The four-man team got set up about 6:30 p.m. and were on the far

side of their primenter. They first checked the area, finding that there were two houses near the highway. One a new brick home, was empty, its occupants having evacuated to safety, leaving two dogs, a large boxer and a collie type dog in the year. In the hother house an older man had announced that he would stay the night. A large fenced roping area sepa rates the two houses and is well lighted by a large mercury

vapor light, Trail reports. The four off-duty policemen sized up the area and decided that if the convicts came up, it would be from the right behind the brick home, from a little draw behind the house. It wasn't known then, but the trio had been flushed into the ravine

area earlier in the day. As the four men talked, they "analyzed" what they would do if they were the fugitives, and guessed that if they came up from the ravine, they'd probably check out an old abandoned pickup behind the brick house, but never under any circum-

stances get into the light area. It had been decided that the old man would give a signal if he heard anything unusual, but for some reason he didn't come out to make the arrangement. The off-duty policemen agreed that if the convicts came into the area, the dogs which they had seen, would probably sound an alert, at which all four men

would come out of the vehicle. At about 9:30 p.m., soon after dark, the dogs began to howl low, and the four did come out at the ready. Nothing could be seen. Again about 10:30, the dogs howled--but nothing was

At 11:05 the dogs really began to bark and raise cain, Trail says, and the four came out. They immediately saw three men, one limping a little, come from back of the brick house, and then all three ran directly into the light where they were silhouetted clearly, with the open roping arena in

the background A spotlight was thrown onto the group and all four lawmen began to yell for the men to halt. They paused, then began to run toward the old house. The lawmen opened fire and one man fell, and the other two hit the ground alongside a hedgerow fence which sepa-

brick house yard.

"We kept the light on that hedge area, and I got on the radio, notifying the headquarters that we had the suspects pinned down and that shots had been fired. We were some 150 yards from the spot when the men fell, and about 300 yards from the nearest next search unit. Other units began to converge on the area immediately, going directly onto the yard with auto headlights and spotlights onto the men." Trail's team remained in its

Williams stood up first near the fence and another man got up, but the third man was pronounced dead at the scene. Some 15 shots in all were fired by the four men. The four men, Trail, Brandenberg, El-

more and Campbell were armed

with a 30-30, 7mm, a shotgun and a .243 rifle. The old man did not come out of the house until the capture was complete. Trail guesses that if the trio had made it to the old man's house where they probably had seen a light burning, they possibly would

might have gotten a ticket to The trio was in bad shape: one had no shoes; their hands were cut and bleeding from barbed wire; and they had brush scratches all over them. They were all armed (one with a 308 with a scope) and their

Trail and the others went back to headquarters for a de-briefing by the officials and then were directed to a giant press conference next door where newsmen questioned them about the event.

"We saw a well-organized manhunt," Trail said, "and it just happened that they came up where we had been assigned. It was a well-coordinated project.

Trail is a little modest in his appraisal, and officials complimented his team, saying that they did exactly what all had been told to do in the event they

confronted the convicts. Murder charges were being drawn up in Erath County He joined a group of three naming the two survivors, and a Mineral Wells off-duty police-string of capital offenses face

By HVO HUCKLEBERRY FINN IN THE PRINT SHOP -- That Huckleberry Finn movie going the rounds nowadays brings to mind the information that Samuel L. Clemens, better known as Mark

Twain, spent part of his youth as an apprentice printer. In 1880 having achieved fame as a writer, Twain became inspired by the principle of the pianoforte. The invention was not a

success, and Twain lost a fortune through his involvement The following has been excerpted from a speech Mark Twain delivered before United Typothetae of America (UTA) members, presumably in the 1880's or early 1890's. The speech presents a picture of a printing shop of the 1850s with the delightfully humorous slant for which the writer is famed. UTA is now known as Printing Industries of America, Inc.

'I am somewhat of an antiquity. All things change in the procession of years, and it may be that I am among strangers. It may be that the printer of today is not the printer of 35 years ago.

'I was no stranger to him. I knew him well., I built his fire for him in the winter mornings: I brought his water from the village pump; I swept up his office: I picked up his type from under his stand, and when he was there to see I put the good type in his case and the broken ones in the hell matter, and if he wasn't there to see, I dumped it all among the pi on the imposing stone- - for that was

the furtive fashion of the cub, and I was the cub. Twetted down the paper Saturdays: I turned it Sundays- - for this was a country weekly: I rolled: I washed the rollers; I washed the forms; I folded the papers: I carried them round at dawn-Thursday mornings. I enveloped the papers that were for the mailwe had a hundred town subscribers and 350 country ones; the town subscribers paid in groceries and the country ones in cabbages and cordwood- when they paid at all, which was merely sometimes, and then we always stated the fact in the paper and gave them a puff; and if we forgot it they stopped the paper

"Every man on the town list helped edit the thing- that is, he gave orders as to how it was to be edited, dictated its opinions, marked out its course for it, and every time the boss failed to connect, he stopped his paper. We were just infested with critics, and we tried

to satisfy them all over. We had one subscriber who paid cash, and he was more trouble to us than all the rest. He bought us, once a year, body and soul, for \$2. He used to modify our politics every which way, and he made us change our religion four times in five years. If we ever tried to reason with him, he would threaten to stop his paper, and, of

course, that meant bankruptcy and destruction. "Life was easy with us; if we pied a form, we suspended till next week, and we suspended every now and then when fishing was good, and explained it by the illness of the editor- a paltry excuse, bacause that kind of a paper was just as well off with a sick editor

as a well one, and better off with a dead one than either of them. 'All this was over 35 years ago, when the man who could set 700 ems an hour could put on as many airs as he wanted to; and if these New York men who recently on a wager set 2,000 an hour solid minion four hours on a stretch had appeared in that old office, they would have been received as accomplishers of the supremely impossible, and drenched with hospitality beer till the brewery

'I can see that printing- office of prehistoric times, yet, with its horse bills on the walls; its 'd' boxes clogged with tallow, because we always stood the candle in the "k' box at night; its towel, which was not considered soiled until it could stand alone, and othersigns and symbols that marked the establishment of that kind in the Mississippi Valley. I can see also the tramping journeyman, who fitted up in the summer and tarried a day, with his wallet stuffed with one shirt and a hatful of handbills; for if he couldn't getany type to set, he would do a temperance lecture. His way of life was simple his needs not complex. All he wanted was plate and bed and

money enough to get drunk on and he was satisfied "But it may be, as I have said, that I am among strangers, and sing the glories of a forgotten age to unfamiliar ears, so I will make

Coming from the nest building in our last article, qw can project the Robins 3- 4 Eggs will incubate in 11 - 14 Days. , while Mr. Robin stands guard in the area. The Parents spend from daybreak until dark gathering food for the young ones, while at the same time ke keeping an eye out for cats, dogs, snakes and hawks. The young robins feature a spotted breast which denotes their real idenity as a Thrust. The Robin's song is not as complete as other Thrushes, but his cheerfuly, cheerily, cheerily is a welcome sound. The Robin's morning and evenings songs are almost like religious observances.

At one time Robins were threatened with rapid reduction in numbers, in certain areas. Audubon reported that when the Robins came south in the summer, and in large numbers, hunters with guns, bows and arrows, and other implements of mayhem to the birds, would hunt the Robins as game birds. waves of flocks arriving dorn south provided Fat, juicy birds, for the tables. Seeing the sad result of such activities, alert persons sponsored laws, and had them passed, against killing robins, which no doubt saved other species also.

Today the amount of insevticide used on lawns, gardens, grassy areas, trees, etc . is said to pose a threat to our Robins. The insecticide after being washed into the ground, shows up in the worms shows up in the worms eaten by the birds. Hopefully this threat will subside with all of our awarness, and not diminish our friends. We must retain for posterity the scene ofRobins cavorting under a sprinkler on the lawn, and for being being noted as harbringers of spring.



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USDA'S Rural Development Tools At Work

Increasingly, people want to live and work in rural America, and rural people and communities are using credit from the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) to improve living conditions and enhance employment opportunities, Will Erwin, assistant secretary of agriculture for rural development said today.

He pointed out that USDA' Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) channeled nearly \$3.6 billion in loans into rural development in fiscal year 1974 to help achieve these national goals:

1. More food and fiber for the nation: In 88,830 loans to help family farmers buy and operate farms, FmHA made more than \$1 billion available to supple-

ment regular commercial credit. 2. Improve rural housing: FmHA made loans of nearly \$1.8 billion to construct, purchase or improve more than 100,000 homes and apartments for rural residents of low or moderate income.

3. Modernize small towns and rural communities: FmHA made 1,326 loans totaling nearly \$470 million to help build water and waste disposal systems. Another 102 loan amounting to \$49.8 million were made for other essential com munity facilities.

4. Provide more and bette rural employment opportuni ties: Under new authorities o the Rural Development Act FmHA made 399 loans totaling nearly \$200 million for busines Department of Agriculture, was and industrial development providing an estimated 19,300 jobs in rural areas. This program was the leader as FmHA began to change fro lenging agent to guarantor of loans made and service by

private, commercial lenders. Varied employment oppor tunities have been provided through the business and industrial loan program -- a building supply and lumber yard, 37 jobs; a plant manufacturing steel wire for tires, 147 jobs; maker of wooden boxes and other wood products, 50 em ployees; pottery making and sales, five workers; and many others--processing plants, retail stores, a laundry, a grain elevator, and a farm supply and equipment store. The diversity of projects shows how readily the program adapts to commu nity needs, Mr. Erwin said.

more low income farmers. Farmers whose production was disrupted by natural disaster received 22,434 loans amounting to \$128.3 million. The agency also made over \$17 million in farmer-program loans for purposes such as grazing associations, soil and water improvements, irrigation, drai-

nage and soil conservation, and Indian Land Acquisition.

Through all FmHA housing programs, the agency provided financing for homes for approximately 390,000 rural residents. More than 94,000 individual home loans were made for \$1.589 billion, and over 6,000 apartment units were financed at \$173.3 million.

Under the expanded community facilities program, a wide range of municipal and civic needs of communities are being met -- an 80-bed hospital in Maine at a cost of \$4.5 million; construction of a county home for 120, \$1.0 million; expansion of city gas lines in an Oklahoma town, \$100,000; a nursing home in Pennsylvania, \$1.9 million; an expanded library serving five counties in Wisconsin, \$200,000 and construction of many community buildings, fire stations and other needed facili-

FmHA's \$470 million of loans for construction of water and waste disposal systems exceeded the previous high under the program, attained in FY 1973, by \$70 mil'ion. About 330,000 families will be served by the new system approved the past year. The agency also provided over \$20 million through 58 loans for watershed development and Resource Conservation and Development area

FmHA conducts its lending operations through more than 1,750 county offices. Most loan funds come from two sources: Sale of certificates of beneficial ownership to investors, or from regular, private lenders with FmHA guaranteeing a portion of the loan against loss.
