As of August 16, there were 1,297 officially designated Bicentennial communities throughout the United States, with the number growing rapidly.

The Bicentennial Communities Program is sponsored by the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration (ARBA) and formally endorsed by the Conference of Mayors, League of Cities and the Organization of County osficials.

The aim of the program is to encourage communities of all sizes and geo - political structure to help plan and carry out projects and events which, taken together, will be the major portion of the nation's Bicentennial commemoration.

There are four simple steps a community must take to receive

Bicentennial Community status:

(1) Organize a Bicentennial planning and coordinating committee which represents all segments of the community. (2) Plan a program which will have at least one eminder of the special effort the community undertook for ne Bicentennial

commemoration.

(3). Obtain approval of the program from he Chief Executive Officer or governing body of the community (4) Submit an application with planning etails o TO THE ARBA

through the appropriate State peentennial agency.

Examples of wide - ranging, vigoror plans to join wholeheartedly in the commemoration can be graned from five recent ap-

plications for official recognition.

The communities are: Osceol. Nebraska, population 900;
Lennox, South Dakota, populatic 1,400; Prince Edward County,
Virginia, population 14,000; Mofgomery, Alabama, population
150,000; and Macob County, Michigan, population 650,000.







AUSTIN--The annual report of the Texas Civil Judicial Council, released today in Austin, shows that the number of cases filed in the district court of Eastland County during 1973 was 15 percent more than the number filed in 1972.

Cases filed during the last calendar year totaled 393, including 132 criminal and 261

Judge Earl Conner, Jr., of the 91st DistrictCourt has jurisdiction in Eastland County.

The local district court disposed of 392 cases during 1973, 47 percent of the cases filed during the year or carried over from 1972. At the end of the year, 434 cases were pending on the docket.

According to the Texas Civil Judicial Council report for 1973, statewide the 254 district, domestic relations and special juvenile courts experienced a 6 percent increase in filings during 1973--to 296,548 cases from 280,971 in 1972. Twenty six percent of these were criminal cases.


WASHINGTON, D.C. 'Law and order" has been a favorite theme of politicians for the last several years. Until recently, the claim was made that there had been a considerable reduction in the crime rate across this Nation but reports now show crime on the rise at an alarming rate.

On all the reasons for crime increase, one is pretty obvious. In the more serious offenses, almost three - fourths of those arrested are repeaters. Imprisonment can be for only two purposes. One, of course, is for punishment and the other is rehabilitation but it seems the latter is, in most instances, woefully lacking. All sorts of studies are going on for prison reform but whatever has been done shows little result.

The dockets of both Federal and State Courts are terribly overcrowded. In most instances, both State and Federal Courts are overwhelmed by a growing backlog of untried criminal cases. The old adage appliesj; "Justice delayed is justice denied." If a person

RJC Receives Grant For Senior Citizens Program

Ranger Junior College has received a grant to provide a center for Senior Citizens. The center will provide opportunity charged in a criminal case is guilty, society demands that he be tried, convicted and sentenced. If he is not, he deserves to have the charges removed from his head as quickly as possible. Those people who are victims of crime are forced to watch the guilty go unpunished for long periods of time. In many cases, the criminal is

never brought to trial. One reason the Federal 1dockets are crowded in both civil and criminal cases is the many laws passed by Congress, which at one time, was in the jurisdiction of State Couurts. The Congress itself has placed a burden on the Courts and since it has, it is up to Congress

to do something about it.

A bill in the United States Senate requires that all criminal cases in Federal Courts be tried within sixty days of indictment. It permits an additional thirty days between the time of arrent and action by a Grand Jury. The measure provides a phase - in over a seven year period and when fully effected. charges are mandatorily dismissed if a trial is not held within these time limits.

Whether this is the answer is questionable but it does have a good intent and places a burden on the Courts and prosecutors to act or explain their lact of action

This alone is not the total answer by any means. For ten years efforts have been in progress to reform our State and Federal criminal justice systems. Many prisons are overcrowded and proper help for rehabilitation must be neglected out of sheer inability to even apply the theories of reform

Chief Justice Burger of the Supreme Court, along with other jurists, has made certain recommendations for Court reform. The study is now out for critiques by judges and the bar associations. Hopefully better answers can be found for our Courts to better guarantee the American people and those accused of crime the right to a speedy trial.
