

EASTLAND MAN Information on William Pike Tindall, who fought in the San Jacinto battle April 21, 1836, in which Texas won i in-dependence from Mexico, and whose body is buried in the Eastland Cemetery, was related Thursday by Ed. T. Cox, Sr., Eastland County pioneer and historian.

Cox stated: There lies in the cemetery at Eastland the remains of William Pike Tindall, a native of Alabama who came to Texas to help in the winning of its independence.

"Texas Under Many by Clarence R. Flags' Wharton, it is stated that Tindall was born in Alabama on March 4, 1818, and was one of the young men from the states east of the Mississippi who volunteered to help the Texans win their independence from the Mexicans in the Revolution of 1836 fighting under General Sam Houston.

In "Thrall's History of Texas" in connection with the siege and capture of San Antonio from the Mexicans in 1835, we have this statement "The Texan force was not more than 800, including the GREYS, Captain Peacock's company from the Mississippi, it is




