

It's pecan grafting time When the sap begins moving in the tree the bark will slip or easily peel from the wood. This is a signal that it is time to start budding or grafting pecan trees.

The purpose of budding and grafting is to propagate a desired variety onto the root stock of a native or seedling

The inlay graft is one of the best and most popular systems of propagating pecans now in use. Grafting was the original method employed by Antoine, the gardener, in Louisiana in 1845. Heis credited as the first to successfully propagate

The Texas method of inlay grafting initiated in the 1950's follows most b basic fundamentals of the standard inlay graft procedure, but employs an entirely new system of covering the graft and stock. Aluminum foil provides the base cover, reflecting sunlight and reducing temperatures around the inlay. Polyethylene plastic film, the final cover, assures constant high relative humidity around the inlay. This system not only results in a higher percentage of growing grafts, but is easy to use.

Anyone can do inlay grafting by following instructions and

practicing to develop skill in basic techniques. A pecan budding and grafting school will be conducted by the Extension Service and Eastland County Pecan . Growers Association at Cisco Junior College April 19th. This school is an annual event and has taught thousands of people to bud and graft pecan trees. Some folks drive 300 to 400 miles to attend. We usually have participants from about twenty counties. Dr. Earl Puls Extension Horticulturist, will give instructions. After about two hours of instruction and discussion the participants will go to the field and practice the techniques under the supervision of trained people. Men, women, and school students

The growers association will sell budding and grafting supplies and wood of many popular varieties. The Cisco Chamber of Commerce and the Cisco Junior College are hosts for the training.

attend the training.

An important step in getting vegetable gardens off to a good start is to plant the proper varieties. Varieties vary from region to region due to the climate, soil types and other factors. Planting only those adapted to this area will help you to have a more productive garden, and the vegetables will

be of better quality. Although many home gar dens have already been planted in Eastland County, there is still time to plant a number of vegetables. We have lists of vegetables recommended for this area if you need help in chosing varieties.

We also have a good supply of publications on controlling insects in the home garden. One publications titled "Insects - -Attacking Vegetable Crops" helps you identify the insects causing the damage. Another helpful publication is titled 'Garden Insects and Their

Insecticides should not be used unless they are needed. When you do need them be very sure to follow the directions



#### **Eastland's Centennial Memorial Library Makes Preparations For History Of Eastland**

Source material is being assembled at Eastland's Centennial Memorial Library in preparation for a com-prehensive history of Eastland to be prepared during the Centennial Celebration which comes up in 1975.

That's also the year for the Eastland Ex - Students Get -Together so it should be quite a year for the city.

Typical of the accurate data being assembled is the following article written in 1965 by the late Mrs. Samual (Buda) Butler, on the history of the

It is necessary in order to talk about the significance of the 79th anniversary of Eastland as county seat of Eastland County. to remind you of that first election which made Eastland the county seat.

August 2, 1875, 79 years ago, the late C.U. Connellee, affectionately known as the Father of Eastland, decided that Eastland should be the county seat of Eastland County.

In December 1873, the county had been organized and Merriman had been selected as the county seat which was far from the center of the County. Mr. Connellee and his co-partner, Mr. J.S. Daughertys surveyed the present site, which is now Eastland, with the idea of removing the county seat to a place within five miles of the center of the c county. They gave a bond in the sum of \$5,000 and agreed that if the county seat were moved to Eastland they would build a building and furnish the upper story for the courthouse.

Upon that promise an elec-tion was held August 2, 1875. There were 127 votes cast, and this number represented all the voters in the county. Of course Mama did not vote in those days. Eastland received 67 votes, which was a majority. Merriman, McGough Springs and the center of the county were the other places being voted on in this election.

After the County Justices declared Eastland the county seat, Mr. Connellee and Mr. Daugherty immediately commenced the erection of the building they had proposed to erect and this building we know today as the Corner Drug Store on the northwest corner of the square. The upper floor of the building was used as a cour-thouse and district clerk's office until 1883 free of charge to the county In 1883 a rock courthouse was

built on the square. In November 1896 this building was destroyed by fire and a larger courthouse was built at once. It served well until Yes, it has been a far cry

since our first courthouse was upstairs over the Corner Drug Store. As we gaze at the beautiful \$312,000 courthouse build in 1928 in memory of our Eastland County boys of World War I, we realize that our Pioneers wrought well when they came ahead and prepared the way for us.

Today we are not unmindful of our heritage. Because of it we cannot fail to progress. We felt our 77th birthday a most significant year because

Eastland, through the united efforts of its citizens was able to celebrate the opening of The Eastland Memorial Hospital. The first time in the history of our town the citizens owned its own hospital, a non - profit organization that has given lives to the weary and health and comfort to the sick.

Since we cannot live in the past and have a future, there is more significance, if possible, to the 79th anniversary. There is not an early pioneer that will not tell you there has always been an anxiety, through the years, about the water supply. It is true many seeds of hope were planted. First, the wells and cisterns; second, Tully Lake, then Eastland Lake, sounds like the Planter's Charm, "One for the buzzard - One for the crow - - one to rot and one to grow!" In our new lake, completed this year, we

AUSTIN, Tex. - Delegates to the 1974 Constitutional Convention have taken a break in their efforts to rewrite Texas' 1876-model Constitu-

The 181 delegates (Texas House and Senate members) are to spend the next 30 days back home discussing with their constituents the work accomplished thus far on the constitutional rewrite.

Decision to take the recess until May 6 was triggered partially by the desire of some delegates to return to their home districts to concentrate on re-election efforts, stymied for the most part for the last three months by their need to meet a five-day-a week convention schedule in Austin.

Other convention delegates and convention leadership feel the 30-day break will provide opportunity for them to seek citizen comment on the work of the convention so far.

Many convention delegates have complained that the work schedule has been so strenuous they have had little opportunity to touch base with the folks back home.

When they return to Austin in May, delegates will go to work on new Constitutional articles dealing with the Judiciary, General Provisions and Separation.

The recess will also provide Style and Drafting Committee staff members opportunity to review articles which have gained tentative approval to insure that no error has crept into the document during the heat of debate on the convention floor.

Convention leadership is ow talking about submitting he final document to voters at the November, 1974, general election.
DIVIDEND PAYMENT

Allstate Insurance Company has been ordered to pay Texas auto policyholders \$4 million in cancelled dividends.

Allstate attorneys said they "completely disagree" and will appeal Insurance Commissioner Don Odom's order, hoping it will not discourage other companies from "making lower rates available to customers under new law."

Odum said Allstate's Te certificate will be cancelled in Texas if dividends aren't being paid in 30 days.

Allstate stopped paying dividends on policies expiring October 3, the same day it obtained the State Insurance Board's permission to reduce rates for auto coverage.

DEMO CONVENTION FIGHT HEATS - Democratic liberals and conservatives are squaring off for another clash at precinct conventions May 4.

Houston liberal leader Billie Carr claimed Gov. Dolph Briscoe's supporters are trying to take over the Texas Democratic party rather than encouraging wider participa-tion by all elements.

Activities of the Governor's Conventions Committee. headed by Gordon Wynne of Wills Point, is siphoning off money needed for an official Affirmative Action Program to bring in more new convention goers, charged Mrs.

OFFICIAL OPINIONS Prisoners in county jails must be permitted to vote, Atty. Gen. John Hill concluded in a recent opinion. Hill's interpretation which held a portion of the Texas Election Code unconstitutional does not apply to convicted felons since they would not be qualified to vote anyway.

The opinion speaks to persons who are in their home county jails on misdemeanor charges. The Election Code specifically states which persons may vote by mail - and in so doing, disenfranchises county prisoners, the ruling reads.

In another opinion, Hill advised the president of Tyler State College that the school has no legal authority to spend state money for a law-yer to handle the school's

Hill noted a 1973 rider to the appropriations bill re-stricts "outside" legal aid. The rider states no appropriation money may be legally spent by any agency to employ "outside" counsel unless the attorney general has been requested to perform the services and has certified his inability to provide them. Hill said Tyler State College has made no request for his help and has no certification from the attorney general. ELECTION REPORTS FILED - Former Lubbock mayor Jim Granberry's election expense report filed with the Secretary of State indicates his Republican gubernatorial campaign spending outranks both Democratic hope-

Granberry reported expenses of \$171,425 and contributions of \$181,877 from June 14 through March 25.

Governor Briscoe reported expenses during the period October 30 to March 25 of \$129,042 and contributions of \$25,536. His contribution report does not include proceeds of the October 30 appreciation dinner which netted about \$350,000, and is tied up in litigation.

Frances Farenthold, Briscoe's primary challenger for the Democratic nomination, reported contributions of \$40,865 and expenses of \$25,007 during the period February 4 to March 25. COTTON PLANTING DEAD-LINES - Corpus Christi cotton farmers must have all planting completed by midnight April 20, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has announced.

Planting dates are fixed around the state as part of the control program of the Texas Pink Bollworm Act, administered by the Texas Department of Agriculture.

White advised farmers in the Corpus Christi area to concentrate on planting their cotton as soon as possible.





# History With A Capital H

Eastland County certainly

Read for instance this exellent report on Ellison Springs, for which a historical narker has been asked. A dedication is scheduled for this summer.

**ELLISON SPRINGS** 

1. It was named Ellison Springs for the J.M. (James Madison) Ellison family, pioneer residents who settled

J.M. Ellison settled at Ellison Springs in October, 1858. He constructed a log cabin about 100 yards northeast of the springs. He married Eliza McGough Ellison, member of another pioneer Eastland County family. They had three children: a daughter, Lanie Elizabeth Ellison, two sons, John M. Ellison and J.T. Ellison. Several years later, approximately 1885, the resent house was built just a few feet west of the cabin site.

2. The springs flow from a native stone lodge, surrounded by native vegetation. The waters from those perpetual, fresh water springs eventually find their way to the Leon

River. 3. Ellison Springs is located in the southeastern section of Eastland County. It lies approximately 34 mile north of Farm to Market Road 8. It narked the southwesternmost point of settlement at the time of the creation of Eastland County in 1858. After the establishment of the Ellison home at this site, other pioneer families were attracted to the area. Then, Ellison Springs became the center of activities for these families.

4. It was used by various Indian tribes as a watering place before the coming of the white man. The area abounded with wild game.

As the frontiersmen scouted the wilderness areas, there was a natural attraction to areas which provided the necessities of life: fresh water, abundant game and natural protection. 5. There is no recorded evidence of the original discoverer of the Springs; however, J.M. Ellison was the first white settler, coming in October, 1858. He was born in

25, 1840 and died June 6, 1923. 6. This site was the southwesternmost outpost of white settlement in Eastland County in 1853. Subsequently, it led to the coming of additional pioneers in the westward development of the county, state and nation.

Jacksonville, Alabama, March

It served as a center of activities for pioneers of that area. It was a place of worship...camp meetings were held under the brush arbor. ptisms were performed in the branch formed by the springs, and later a Baptist Church was built by J.M. Ellison and Rev. C. Brashears served as minister. Rev. Brashears arrived in the county in 1872, coming from

It served as a social center. There were picnics, family and

nearby Parker County.

community gatherings. The Ellison S Springs Cemetery was the earliest cemetery in the area. It was established in the 1870's. The first marked grave was that of Nancy Ellison who was buried there August 6, 1876. This cemetery is still maintained by escendants of the J.M. Ellison

There are approximately 25 graves there, several unmarked.

7. It was necessary that protection be provided for the pioneers of this area if it was to be held for settlement. At every meeting of the State Legislature laws were passed which would help provide this protection.

The people of Eastland County complied with the spirit of the law (Chapter 36, Section 3. General laws of the Tenth Legislature) which called for the organization of companies for frontier protection. These companies were to be comprised of approximately 40 men. At that time, it took every man between the ages of 18 and 45 in the counties of Eastland, Shackelford, and Callahan to muster the required number. J.M. Ellison served in this company which was commanded by Sing Gilbert.

On August 9, 1864, the bloodiest Indian battle in Eastland County history was fought approximately 300 yards

south of Ellison Springs.

A company of 12 scouts, under the command of Sing Gilbert, encountered a band of Indians and the battle ensued.

T.E. Keith of Curtis was one of the scouts who engaged in the conflict and he furnished this first - hand account of the

"Our captain ordered a charge and led it up to within thirty or forty fee of their line. Think of it! Twelve men, armed with muzzle - loading rifles and shotguns and pistols, charging right up to a line of forty Indians, and most of them on foot and coming to meet us!

Captain Gilbert ordered a halt. We fired on them, but they kept coming. Our Captain ordered us to fall back. We turned in their faces, and on that turn is where they got in their deadly work,

The Indians wore shields that would turn our bullets, and were armed with bows and arrows, which, at short range were more accurate and deadly than rifles and six shooters.

On that turn (Mr. Keith was unmounted in this direful retreat and separated from his party a few awful minutes, but recovered his horse and escaped unhurt) our Captain was shot in the neck with an arrow and died in less than two hours. Button Keith's horse fell. and they killed him right there. Jim Ellison received a deep arrow wound in his hip, which disabled him for life. Tom Caddenhead was shot through the thigh just below the hip joint and pinned to the saddle, and Tim Gilbert was shot twice through the arms. Two men killed and three disabled in less time than it takes to make the statement Five out of twelve knocked out and not a load left

in a gun or pistol! Well, there was nothing left for us to do except to outrun them to Ellison's house, which we did in grand shape, the Indians following us to within eighty yards of the house.

Runners were then sent to the Gabe Keith Ranch, fifteen miles away, to the Gilbert Ranch, twelve miles, and to Mansker's, eight miles, to let them know of the trouble. About nine o'clock that night my father, J.J. Keith, started to Stephenville to have graves prepared for the two dead men

- that being the nearest graveyard. The distance was thirty - five miles, and not a settler at that time between the

He arrived at Stephenville at daybreak, and heard bells, and horses running on the hill east of town. Believing that Indians were stealing the horses, he alarmed the town. Joel Dodson and another man, however, had heard the bells and running horses, and, taking their guns, had gone to investigate. While crossing the Bosque they heard a noise in the bed of the creek above them. Listening and sky lighting they decided there were Indians near and fired. whereupon the savages ran off. leaving five bloody pallets and two guns they had picked up on the battle ground the day before at Ellison's Springs, proving that they were the same Indians and at least five of them were wounded.

On the eleventh of August, Captain Gilbert and Button Keith were consigned to their last resting places at Stephenville, and the curtain was dropped on the bloodiest battle with Indians ever fought



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


