It's pecan grafting time again. When the sap begins moving in the tree the bark will slip or easily peel from the wood. This is a signal that it is time to start budding or grafting pecan trees.

The purpose of budding and grafting is to propagate a desired variety onto the root stock of a native or seedling pecan.

The inlay graft is one of the best and most popular systems of propagating pecans now in use. Grafting was the original method employed by Antoine, the gardener, in Louisiana in 1845. He is credited as the first to successfully propagate

pecans. The Texas method of inlay grafting initiated in the 1950's follows most basic fundamentals of the standard inlay graft procedure, but employs an entirely new system of covering the graft and stock. Aluminum foil provides the base cover, reflecting sunlight and reducing temperatures around the inlay. Polyethylene plastic film, the final cover, assures constant high relative humidity around the inlay. This system not only results in a higher percentage of growing grafts, but is easy to use.

Anyone can do inlay grafting by following instructions and

practicing to develop skill in basic techniques. A pecan budding and grafting school will be conducted by the Extension Service and Eastland County Pecan Growers Association at Cisco Junior College April 19th. This school is an annual event and has taught thousands of people to bud and graft pecan trees. Some folks drive 300 to 400 miles to attend. We usually have participants from about twenty counties. Dr. Earl Puls, Extension Horticulturist, will give instructions. After about two hours of instruction and discussion the participants will go to the field and practice the techniques under the supervision of trained people. Men, women, and school students attend the training.

The growers association will sell budding and grafting supplies and wood of many popular varieties. The Cisco Chamber of Commerce and the Cisco Junior College are hosts for the training.

An important step in getting vegetable gardens off to a good start is to plant the proper varieties. Varieties vary from region to region due to the climate, soil types and other factors. Planting only those adapted to this area will help you to have a more productive garden, and the vegetables will be of better quality.

Although many home gardens have already been planted in Eastland County, there is still time to plant a number of vegetables. We have lists of vegetables recommended for this area if you need help in choosing varieties.

We also have a good supply of publications on controlling insects in the home garden. One publication titled "Insects - Attacking Vegetable Crops" helps you identify the insects causing the damage. Another helpful publication is titled "Garden Insects and Their Control".

Insecticides should not be used unless they are needed. When you do need them be very sure to follow the directions.

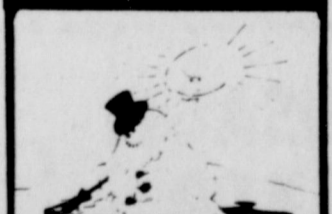

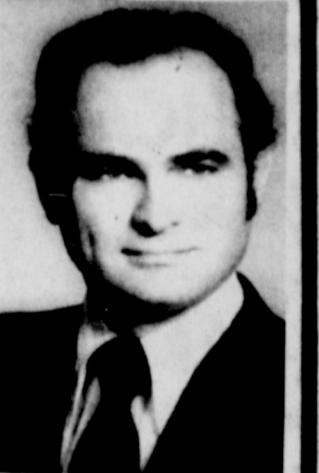

Dress Revue in June. Training for 4-H clothing leaders and parents will be held on April 9 and April 16 at 7:30 p.m. in the Eastland National Bank Meeting Room.

The first session on the 9th will be on basic clothing construction. Pattern selection, fabric selection, straightening fabric, seam finishes, hems, and other construction details will be discussed.

On April 16, topics for discussion will include using 4-H clothing project guides, completing project records, accessories, modeling, and the 4-H Dress Revue rules and requirements.

Not only are 4-H leaders urged to attend, but parents are also urged to attend so that they may assist their child if he or she plans to carry a clothing project this year.

The training will be given by County Extension Agent, Janet Thomas and Assistant County Extension Agent, Arleen Atkins.

Thomas, Eastland County Extension agent, the new series, "You Can Do It!" is a 13-part, educational series on home care and repairs.

"It is designed to teach viewers simple, money-saving care and maintenance techniques", she said.

Locally, the half hour programs each Friday will be sponsored by the Eastland County Family Living Committee.

The series also will include a lesson on care and maintenance of ranges and refrigerators and a lesson on how to make storage space.

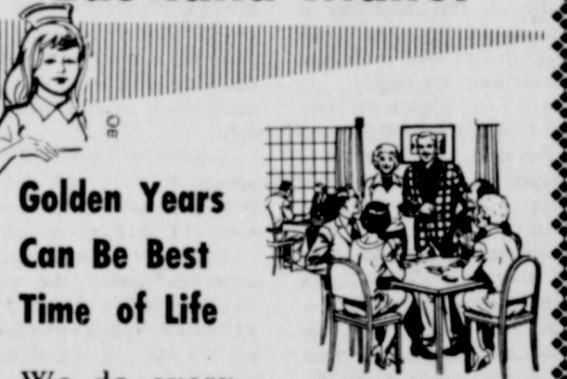
