Purpose thought for the sidewalk on the south side of Sadosa St. is to hopefully keep the majority of the walking Elementary School youngsters off the street.

Johnson and O'Brien, assisted by Brian Lund, Kevin Johnson and Vance O'Brien, surveyed off the Sadosa route Monday evening, and figures are being considered. It was learned that 2,200 feet is involved from existing walkway just short of S. Daugherty St. to the walkway built by B Valley View Lodge adjoining the school property. Some 200 or so feet of this would come off for driveways, streets and other interruptions in the walk.

Figured on a three- foot wide estimates are that some 821/2 vards of concrete at \$20.20 a yard would be needed for the

There are a lot of telephone poles, trees and other obstructions along the route, and guesses are that it cannot follow a straight line.

Some ask should a walk be built at the curb or be indented some for further safety.

The proposal has been offered that perhaps a 20 mile per hour speed limit, adopted and enforced on Sadosa would preclude the need for a sidewalk
