Commissioners agreed to buy a new 18 cubic foot Garwood packer on a bid of \$7,475. with a \$2,750 trade in for the existing G.A. Kinsey 1 share and virtually worn out 1965 16 foot rig now in operation.

> The new packing - hauling unit will be installed on a new International Harvester truck, bought on bids opened at the Friday meeting from Eastland

> City Garage's bid of \$5,539 was low bid for furnishing the truck on specifications. Total cost to the city for the packer hauler and truck will be \$10,264. In the Friday meeting, Commissioners also agreed to send 'Eastland Firemen to firemen's training in Abilene.

The truck will be sent by I - H to the Garwood Alabama factory for installation of the equipment, and Garwood will deliver the new unit here and pick up the trade in.

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

first round of Constitutional Convention floor debate opened - on the education article of the proposed new state constitution.

Convention President Price Daniel Jr. maintained delegates were sticking with their 90-day completion schedule, however, as they neared completion of action on the article in three half-day working periods.

The education article as approved by the delegates tentatively insures "equal educational opportunities" for all, but permits special local district program enrichment. It also retains for The University of Texas and Texas A&M income from the \$680 million Permanent University Fund.

Permanent and Available school funds are left intact, and the legislature is charged with providing for "first class" higher education.

LAW "DISCOVERED" -The Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles only last November discovered a law requiring it to recommend to the governor whether prisoners should have full citizenship rights restored on completion of sen-

"Until our present board membership was made aware of this provision very recently, it has been ignored," said Charles G. Shandera, a member of the Board, in a letter to Sen. A. R. Schwartz of Galveston. Schwartz is chairman of the Constitutional Convention Rights and Suffrage Com-

Shandera said he does not think the oversight has worked any great hardship on exconvicts deprived of civil rights, because they can make requests for full pardon.

Rights include voting, running for public office, jury service, entry into licensed professions and eligibility for

ALLOWABLE AT 100 PER CENT AGAIN - The Railroad Commission set the statewide oil allowable at 100 percent for March - the 24th straight month of such production.

Commissioner Ben Ramsey said crude oil stocks, estimated at 85.8 million barrels, are 3.4 million less than the 1973 level. He said crude stocks for the nation are 24 million barrels below preferred levels and gasoline 50 million barrels below.

Exceptions to the 100 per cent allowable are Kelly-Sny-

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der and East Texas Fields (86 per cent) and a dozen others set at 80 per cent.

COURTS SPEAK - The Court of Criminal Appeals overturned a marijuana conviction by a Greenville jury following a search without

The Court also reversed another marijuana conviction in Dallas on similar grounds. It ordered a new trial for a Wichita County man on incest charges after finding his 13 year-old daughter "participated willingly.

A Rockwall County man won a second reversal on robbery-by-assault sentence of 40 years.

The Third Court of Civil Appeals ordered Hays County commissioners to pay \$22,800 as the county's share of adult probation costs in a district shared with Caldwell and Comal counties.

AG OPINIONS - A strong anti-discrimination provision in a new state constitution may prevent minority recruitment and bilingual educational programs, Atty. Gen. John Hill held.

Hill also concluded in other recent opinions:

· Children may be placed for adoption by a natural parent, by a relative with other relatives, or by a licensed agency.

· Minors over 14, and under 17 can be prosecuted for driving while intoxicated, although the law is not constitutionally enforceable against those 17 to 18.

· The open records act and its exceptions have no bearing on scope of testimony of a witness taken in a civil proceeding pursuant to a notice and subpoena issued under rules of civil procedure.

· Whether or not the property of a fraternal lodge is exempt from taxation depends on a determination of whether the lodge is a purely public charity and its property is used for purely public charitable purposes.

· If courts and not juries grant probation in felony cases, problem drinkers-drivers involved may be required to pay for the expense of treatment. Ability to pay expenses of treatment may not be a grounds for denying probation and failure to pay the expense of treatment because of financial inability may not be a ground for revocation of pro-

· A Texas Youth Council member is entitled to reimbursement for reasonable expenses incurred in meetings in city where he resides.

The moisture that came in the form of rain and snow last week was about the best thing that has happened recently. Most of Eastland County seems to have gotten about one to one and a half inches.

With this good moisture people are busy getting the vegetable garden ready. Using a mulch in the home garden will go a long way toward insuring high yields of fresh, nutritious and tasty vegetables.

Mulches can be composed of many materials, including straw, leaves, hay, sawdust, wood shavings, compost, paper and plastic sheeting. If organic mulches such as hay or compost are used, , apply the material around the base of growing plants to a depth of two to three inches. Apply mulches such as black plastic of paper

before planting but after fertilizing and watering. Do not use mulches on dry or cold soils, the agent warns.

Properly used mulches have many benefits. They will conserve moisture by reducing the evaporation rate from the soil. They also provide for a more uniform soil temperature which will result in more rapid and healthy plant growth.

One of the most important advantage of mulching is that it helps control most weeds. This reduces the time and labor involved in weeding the garden plot. However, use care to make sure that the mulch material you use is itself weed

Another important advantage of mulching is that it will reduce losses caused from fruit rot. A considerable

amount of good food is lost because fruit such as tomatoes and cucumbers are allowed to come in contact with the bare ground

Materials such as cedar chips and wood chips add to the beauty of the landscape along with serving as a mulch. Mulches also improve the soil by protecting it from compaction. Organic mulches worked into the ground will increase the organic matter content of the soil.

When working organic mulches into the ground for your garden, be sure to apply additional nitrogen fertilizer to aid in the decomposition of the additional organic matter.

Now is the time to inspect woody ornamentals for needed

Prune only if you can justify removing a limb or branch. Don't prune just because it's the correct season and you need some exercise.

Diseased or insect - injured wood, dead wood and storm or

accident - damaged wood should be removed as soon as possible. Older shrubs can be rejuvenated by removing the older branches at the base.

Pruning can also help develop a desired shape or size as well as aid in producing better flowers and fruit.

When setting out new plants, pruning can help balance the top with the root system, continues the agent.

Severe pruning should be avoided if possible. It is better to prune lightly and more often to prevent sunscald to the sensitive inner branches. Never leave stubs that invite

insects and disease. Be sure to paint all cuts over three quarters of an inch in diameter with a wound dressing. Wound dressings can be obtained from any nursery or garden center. Common orange shellac makes a good temporary dressing when a regular dressing is not

Plants that bloom in early spring with the appearance of new leaves should be pruned

after they flower while those blooming later should be pruned during dormancy.



Crop Saving Snow And Rain

Eastland County Agent DeMarquis Gordon has referred to Wednesday's and Thursday's rain, and two-inch snow fall as "crop saving".

An official .63 of an inch was recorded Wednesday night with an additional .71 inch of moisture from rain and snow recorded by 2 p.m. Thursday, bringing total moisture from the unexpected mid - winter storm to 1.34 inches.

Gordon said the moisture was just in time to save the county's wheat crop. Rye, which is planted as a winter cover crop. also received moisture "just in time", according to Gordon.

"If the dry spell had lasted through the first two weeks in March the gran crops would in all likelihood have been lost." Gordon added

The last rain of any consequence in Eastland County was on Nov. 24, 1973, when .48 inches was recorded. Prior to the latest rainfall .12 inch was measured in January, bringing the year's total so far to 1.46

Through the same period of time in 1973 an official 4.43 inches had fallen.

Eastland reported an all time high temperature Wednesday afternoon just ahead of the front when the mercury rose to 83 degrees.

Thursday morning's unexpected heavy snow fall left a blanket of snow two inches deep, however. As the temperature rose from a low of 31 degrees at 11 a.m. to 48 degrees the snow had disappeared.
