Season of Successful Stock Show Coming To Close 6 p.m. Sale

Officials of Show Are Delighted With Size and Quality

The season of the outstandingly successful 1956 Eastland County Livestock Show comes to a close tonight with a sale opening at 6 o'clock at the Sig Faircloth Auction Barn on Highway 80 east of Eastland.

The show was the biggest in the history of this affair, with such a sturging of entries totaling 406 that the judges were busy from 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.

The junior breeders and feeders competed for around \$1,800 in prize money and the adults competed for ribbons only. The show was sponsored by the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association. Clinton M. McCain, superintendent, said that if next year's entries run as high that some provisions will be made either to do part of the judging the first day, or shift out some of the animals.

Attendance of spectators was also near an all-time high, according to show officials. In the fat calf, fat lamb and fat swine divisions the animals were placed according to grade. In the dairy cattle division the animals were rated on a classification basis.

Jimmy Kehoe of Armour & Co. Fort Worth, graded the fat lambs; J. Coffey of Cassidy Commission Co., Fort Worth, graded the fat barrows; Jack Bourland of Swift & Co., Fort Worth, graded the fat steers; A. D. Pettit, Santa Anna VA teacher, judged the breeding sheep and goats; T. C. Blankinship, Hamlin VA teacher, judged the breeding swine, breeding beef and dairy cattle.

Mark Kurkin, 10, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Kurkin, Cisco, showed a Southdown cross from his father's own flock to the champion of the fat lamb division. His 11-year-old brother, Richard, had the champion doe of the Angora show.

This is Mark's third year to feed lambs. His first year, 1954, he had the Eastland champion lamb. The reserve fat lamb title Saturday went to Jerry Gaswell, Cisco FFA. There were 166 lambs in the division and 58 graded prime, 62 choice, 24 good and the remainder medium.

Another past winner to come through Saturday was 16-year-old Jonell Penney, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D. L. Penney of Ranger. Jonell showed a registered Rambouillet ram and ewe from the flock of her grandfather, H. C. Wilkinson of Ranger, to the grand championship in both classes. The reserve champion breeding ewe belongs to Ben Gailey, Ranger FFA. Last year was one of the few Eastland County shows Jonell has taken part in that she has not made the winner's circle.

Nicky Arther, showing a barrow of the Eastland FFA Chapter, won the purple rosette and cash for his chapter when he pushed the barrow to the grand championship.

The grand champion barrow was shown by Ed Blackwell of the Ranger FFA chapter. Nicky Arther, showing a pig belonging to the Eastland FFA chapter, guided the barrow into the reserve title.

There were 101 entries in the fat swine division, with 42 graded prime, 35 choice, and three good.

The Rising Star FFA Chapter-owned gilt was named grand champion female of breeding swine and Rodney Stephens, Gorman 4-H, had the reserve female. A total of 21 breeding females were entered.

The Bostick twins, Robert and Ronnie, sons of Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Bostick of Nimrod, staged a highly competitive race for the grand champion of the rising star, Gorman 4-H had the reserve female. A total of 21 breeding females were entered.

With money each of the twins earned in the Houston show "calf scramble" the pair added some of their own funds to buy two beautiful heifers from Jay Pumphrey, Old Glory Hereford breeder. Judge Blankinship examined them carefully for several minutes before he selected Robert's heifer over Ronnie's. The boys are identical twins and their two heifers looked almost identical. Both heifers are of TR Royal Triumph breeding.

There was no competition for the reserve champion beef female title.

The champion bull of the Hereford breed was shown by D. V. Rodgers of Gorman, TR Zato Heir 40, which went on to beat the champion bull of the Angus breed, belonging to Charles Rutherford of Rising Star, for the grand (Continued on Page Two)

Resident of Eastland Hurt; Another Killed

A 31-year-old Abilene man was killed and an Eastland man injured Saturday when the driver apparently lost control of a 1956 Pontiac about 13 miles north of Bronte on highway 277.

Harold Joe Curry, Abilene, was killed in the accident and Bill Bagley from Eastland was hospitalized with lacerations. They were traveling south, toward Bronte.

The Highway Patrol said Curry apparently lost control of the car, with the vehicle overturning two or three times and catching fire. Curry was thrown from the auto. A passing truck driver pulled Bagley from the blazing auto.

Leroy Sikes of Eastland Hurt In Breck Wreck

Both legs of Leroy Sikes, 49, Eastland service station operator, were crushed when his loaded gasoline truck collided with a parked transport truck at Breckenridge about 5:30 p.m. Monday, it was reported here.

Sikes was given emergency treatment at Stevens Memorial Hospital and then transferred to Hendricks Memorial Hospital at Abilene.

Sikes was pinned in the cab of his truck for about 30 minutes after a tire blew out as he was going down a hill on Walker street. The truck crashed into an unoccupied transport truck owned by City Motor Co. of Breckenridge, it was reported.

Heavy trucks of J. E. Cox and Sons pulled the cab of the gasoline truck apart to release Sikes. The Breckenridge Fire Department stood by in case a fire broke out from the leaking gas tank of Sikes truck.

The gasoline truck was a total loss. The transport truck had only minor damage.

The Browns have three children, two sons — Parker Brown of Los Angeles and Jack Warren Brown of Dallas — and a daughter, Mrs. Thomas Ayres of Bowie, and seven grandchildren.

The couple will live in a hospital-furnished house at the site of the institution, three miles southeast of Abilene.

Funeral services for Mrs. Mary Ann Thomas Ford, long-time Cisco resident, mother of Mrs. E. K. Henderson of Eastland, were conducted at the First Christian Church Friday at 3 p.m. with the Rev. Burleson's Unit To Try to Curb Waste

WASHINGTON, D.C.—A committee of the House of Representatives recently reported that the United States Government owned property around the world valued at \$208 billion. Ordinarily, we conclude that, if an individual or a corporation can balance its books, it is solvent. Counting this \$208 billion in property, the Federal Government could easily balance its assets against the public debt. This, of course, is only theoretical.

Even supposing the Government could theoretically liquidate its holdings, its values are somewhat in question.

The House administration committee, on which I have the honor to serve as chairman, is trying its best to reduce the tremendous printing bill which the government incurs each year. The printing bill of the United States has been running near \$250 million annually. There are 18 million different government forms in use. It has found that literally thousands have become obsolete, and some were out of date immediately after they were printed. Every time the Congress passes any new law,

or the President issues an Executive Order, there follows hundreds and thousands of forms related to it.

A form for a veteran may want to know whether his wife is left-handed or right, and then it is decided the information is not sufficient and another is produced.

In addition to all these forms which are many times harassing to businessmen and others, there are thousands of publications stored in numerous places, which are as useless as anything could be. There are books and publications in storage rooms in the bowels of the Capitol that no one knows what they are or how long they have been there. Some of them are stacked so high that no one knows what is behind them, but yet the Government continues to publish more and add to the volume of useless material.

My committee is trying to determine just what is absolutely useless and dispose of it, and, more than that, we will attempt to reduce the production of these useless publications and materials to the minimum. The Government has the largest printing establishment in the world, and it likely will continue, but there is no need for it to spend \$250 million a year for the purpose. It reminds me of the story of the little boy with the magic salt machine. You remember he turned it on, but did not know how to turn it off, and hence the reason for the salt water in the oceans.

Youthful Ball Players Urged Apply At Once

Candidates for Junior Teen-Age and Senior Teen-Age baseball teams are urged to get their application blanks as soon as possible and fill them out immediately if they expect to play ball this summer.

The blanks are available from James Smith at Perry Bros., store in Eastland.

The Junior Teen-Age team is for 13 and 14 year old boys, and the Senior Teen-Age team is for 15 year old boys only.

Regardless of how much Little League and other type of baseball the teen-agers might have played previously, they are required to fill out these blanks if they expect to play this year. A birth certificate, or other proof of age, must also accompany each application, according to state regulations.

Any delay in filling out the application blanks might result in a boy not getting to play.

"Every householder and every business firm is urgently requested to check around properties of which they have charge and tidy them up carefully," the chairman said, "in the interest of attractiveness, public health and fire prevention."

Dan Jobe Entry Is Again Dairy Champ

The grand champion female of the Eastland County junior dairy show, at the County Livestock Show, held in Eastland, an animal owned by Dan Jobe of Scranton 4-H, has a habit of winning.

In fact, it was her sixth or seventh title, Dan wasn't sure which.

She was Simply Janice Belle, one of the original heifers secured from the Frank Tooke Jersey Farm in East Texas when the dairy program was launched. If it was her seventh grand championship it means she has been undefeated in Eastland competition.

The Ranger Youth Dairy Program which started several years ago after the county-wide program has also supplemented the high quality dairy animals in the county.

Virgil Blackwell, 18, a freshman in Ranger High School under the supervision of B. S. Dudley, had the reserve champion female of

the dairy division. She was Malsy Sunshine Nellie, a Ranger youth dairy program animal that was a blue ribbon winner in the 2-3 year-old cow class.

The Eastland County Dairy Association, of which Marshall Berry is secretary-treasurer and also dairy department superintendent, supplied the cash awards to exhibitors of the champion and reserve champion females.

Of the 29 females entered, six were classified as blue ribbon animals and most of the remainder fell in the red ribbon class.

Owners of animals classified for blue ribbons were Richard William, Ranger FFA, six months to a year old; Jimmy Wells, Ranger FFA, and Phillip Harrelson, Cisco 4-H, animals one to two years old; Virgil Blackwell, Ranger FFA, and Tracy Burkhalter, Rising Star FFA, females two and under three years old; Jobe, Scranton 4-H, cows three years old and over.

Jobe's twin brother, Don, is also in the dairy cattle business but Don's heifer failed to make the blue classification. Both lads, long active in Eastland County 4-H Club work, are sophomores in (Continued on Page Five)

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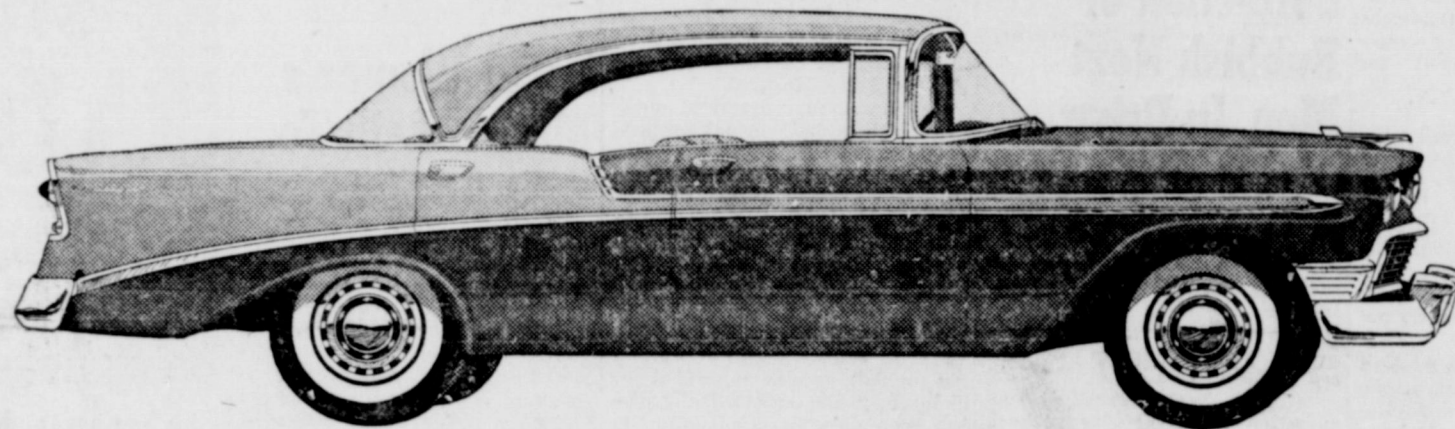
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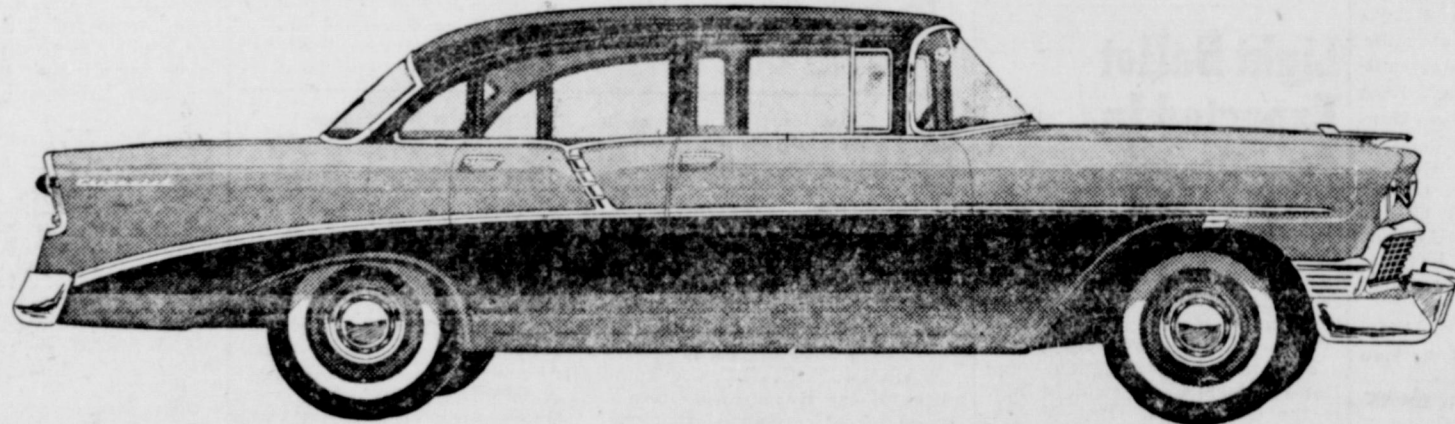
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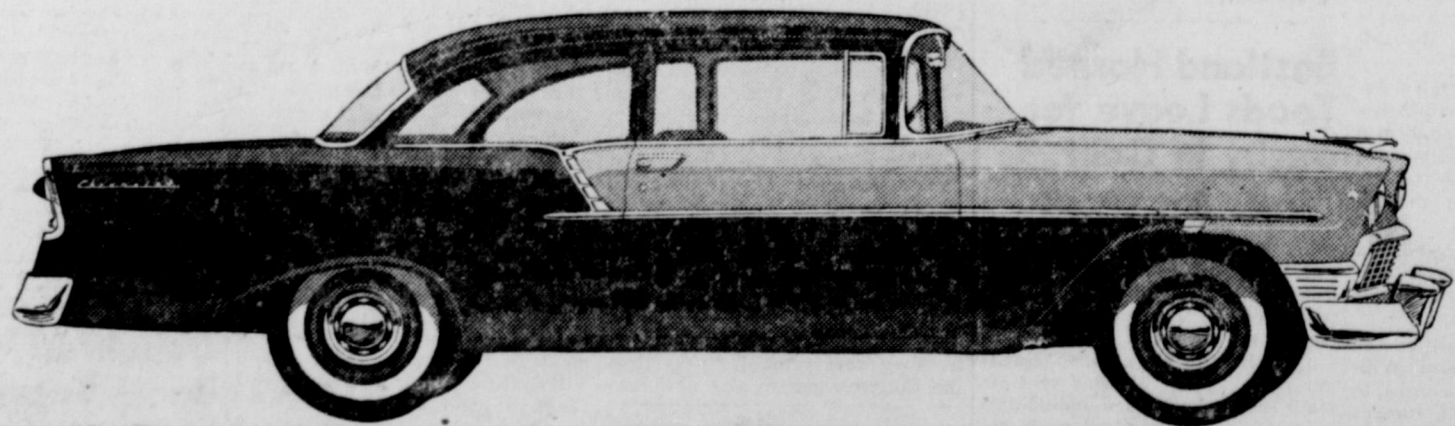

- 3/4 cup water
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 3 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 3 tablespoons flour
- 1 1/2 cups milk
- 2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 2 egg yolks
- 3/4 cup grated American cheese
- 3/4 cup dry bread crumbs
- 3/4 cup melted butter or margarine

Place cauliflower and one-half cup water in saucepan. Season with 1 teaspoon salt. Cover and boil 15 to 20 minutes, or until tender. Drain. To make sauce, melt 3 tablespoons butter, add flour and blend. Add milk and cook on medium heat until thick. Add Parmesan cheese, lemon juice, salt and pepper, and blend thoroughly. Beat egg yolks and gradually add several spoonfuls of sauce, then combine with remaining sauce. Divide cauliflower into flowerets and place in buttered 1 1/2 quart casserole. Add sauce. Sprinkle with American cheese, then mixture of crumbs and melted butter. Bake uncovered in moderate oven (350° F.) for 30 minutes. 6 servings.

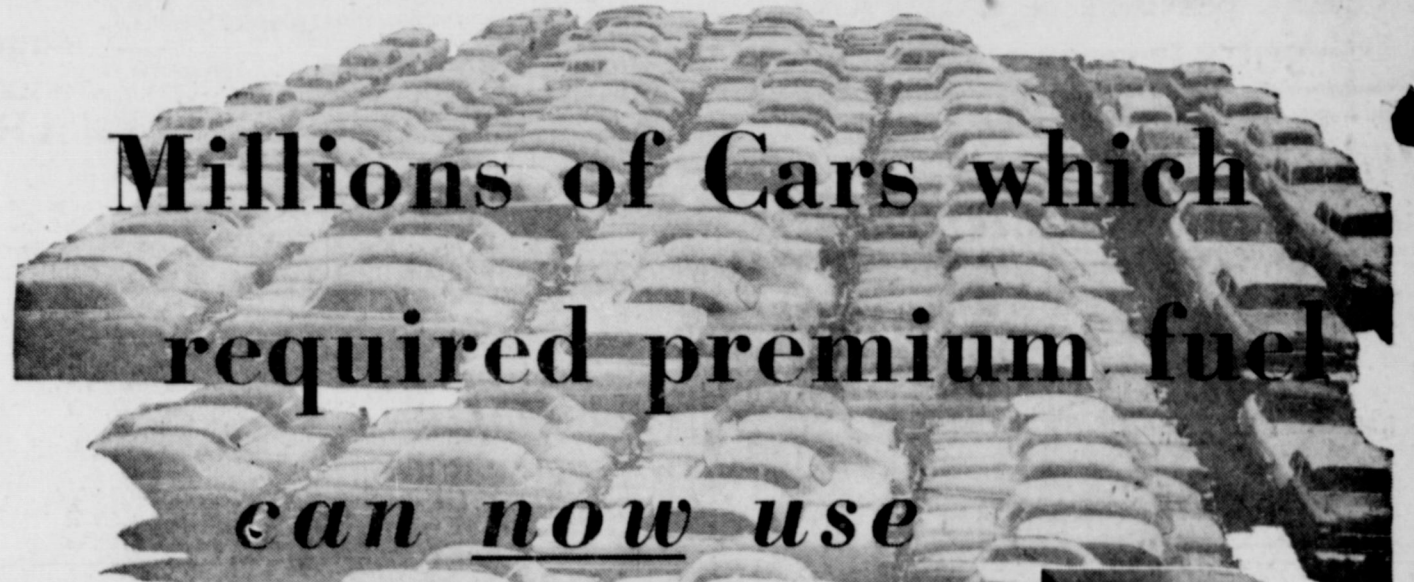

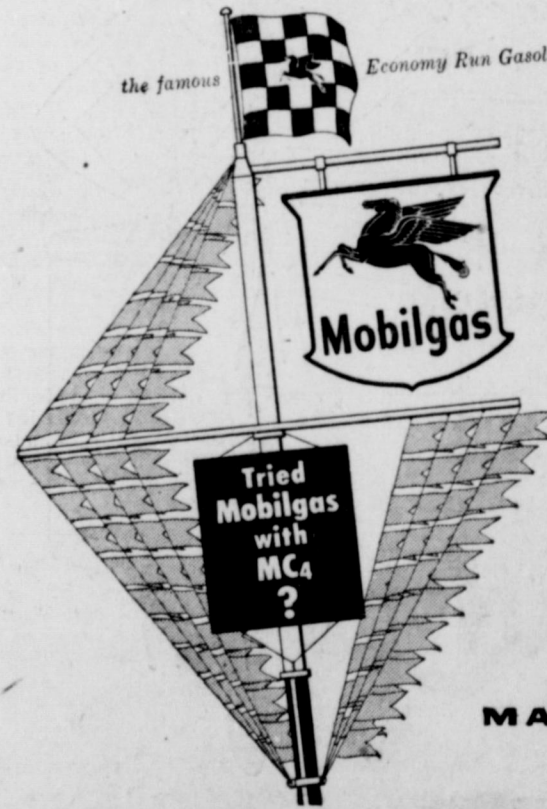

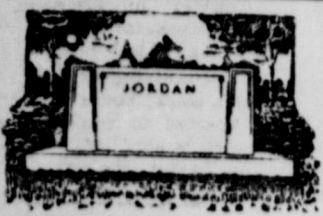
