Mr. and Mrs. Glen Hubbard are getting ready for an Angus bull sale scheduled for January 19, 1974. The sale will be held at the Eastland Livestock Auction. They have had 37 bulls on a gain performance test for 140 days. The bulls have been gain tested by James Ratliff at Ranger.

They averaged about 600 pounds each when weighed in

on August 22. The test will end January 9th when all the bulls will be weighed again. By sale time the bulls will be 12 to 14 months of age.

Small grains in Eastland County got off to a good start, but growth has been hampered by cold, dry weather.

Insects have caused damage to some fields, especially green

bugs. There is only way to determine if greenbugs should be controlled in small grains. This is to inspect your field once or twice each week depending on how active greenbugs are and how the population is growing.

When small grains are three to six inches tall, as is the case in most fields, populations of 100 to 300 greenbugs per linear foot of row can be tolerated before chemical controls will be needed. Plants that are growing vigorously can support larger populations of greenbugs without an economic loss than plants that are suffering

from lack of fertility, moisture or from moderate to heavy levels of leaf rust infection.

By not controlling greenbugs until populations reach levels that can cause economic damage, producers give beneficial populations of nabids, parasitic wasps, spiders and others an opportunity to increase their numbers and bring greenbugs populations do not build up until there are many greenbugs or other aphids in the field. Once populations of beneficials begin to increase, it is not uncommon to find that 25 to 50 percent of the greenbugs have

fallen prey to the beneficials. Therefore, chemical controls should be reserved for those cases where beneficials do not bring damaging greenbugs populations under control.

Larger wheat plants can tolerate heavier populations of greenbugs without suffering economic losses. Information on population levels that various size plants can tolerate and on how to inspect your field is presented in MP - 339 "Suggestions for Controlling Insects and Mites on Corn, Sorghums and Small Grains". This publication is available at our office.

Livestockmen that have cattle grazing on Coastal bermuda grass should watch these animals closely for "shakes" or "staggers".

Recent cases have been reported in counties southeast of us.

Symptoms of affected cattle include severe muscle tremors, incoordination, weaving or bobbing of the head, a wild-eyed expression and an inability to rise when down. Salivation and stiffness or weakness of hind legs may also be evident.

Animals may die from drowning, dehydration or a

direct effect of the toxic principle. The number of animals affected in a herd can vary from 10 to 100 percent.

What can be done once animals are affected?

We suggest handling them with care and driving them slowly off the bermuda grass onto green oats or other small grain or into a pen. The cattle should be fed all the hay they can eat plus a feed high in carbohydrates, such as a low protein grain cube.

As a preventive measure mowing the bermuda grass may help.

Sun Is Out And Ice Is Gone

"We are sure glad to see the sun come and the ice go; it's a relief", said Texas Highway Maintenance Supervisor Owen D. Finley.

Approximately 23 men and six trucks used some 250 yards of manufactured sand to keep overpasses, bridges, and roads driveable and clear during the year's first bad spell of weather.

Some crews worked 12 to 20 hour shifts on the ice control work.

"We started work at 8 a.m. Wednesday, worked all night and ended our ice control work about 4 p.m. Thursday, he said.

At that time all sections of I-20 were clear of ice. However, at 5 p.m. Thursday some

stretches of farm roads still had ice, but most were graveled well.

The biggest problems were the bridges and underpasses on I-20. Most of them were iced badly and there was some difficulty on the steeper hills.

The worst section was from State Highway 6 west on I-20, for here the ice lasted longer, said Finley.

"I feel more than a little relief that the Cisco viaduct is now gone", agreed the maintenance supervisor for Eastland County. "However with all the new overpasses and bridges on I-20, we have just about twice as much work".

He hopes this is all the ice storms that Eastland County

experiences this year. Others agree.

According to Finley, traffic was running almost bumper to bumper Wednesday on I-20, which made the highway department's job even more difficult. "Many times we'd have to wait to break in the stream of traffic to sand and gravel".

Luckily Wednesday's slick ice seemed to evaporate overnight. "Usually such a small amount as we had Wednesday disappears rapidly", Finley indicated. "Perhaps it was because it is so dry now anyhow".

The Maintenance supervisor on the road most of the time Wednesday and Thursday. "You don't cover much ground at 30 miles an hour", he admitted. "So I spent most of the time behind the wheel.

Anywhere there's paved road in the county, it's the responsibility of the Eastland area highway department maintenance shop.

business have a choice in filing tax returns. An individual may make a declaration of his essential income tax by January 15, then file a return by April 15, the usual filing date.

If he doesn't follow this procedure, then a farmer must file his income tax form by March 1, almost a month and a half before most must file.

Gordon admits that the farmer's income tax is more difficult to figure than most, for being a business it is more complicated. Here farm expenses and depreciation must be figured.

He believes most farmers, even though they have their taxes figured by an accountant, will benefit from attending the income tax meeting. The class will give them a better idea of what to furnish their accountants, and a better idea of what's taxable, depreciable, and deductible.

A small percentage do their own taxes.

Whether hiring an accountant or doing their own taxes, it is necessary for a farmer to keep a good set of record of all income, expenses and business transactions, the county agent believes.

This will help: (1) make income tax reports more accurate and less trouble. (2) point out weak spots in farm management (3). Help the farmer in credit and loan transactions at the bank, in borrowing for next year's crops and livestock.

One type of record keeping system may be picked up at the county agent's office free of charge.

County Treasurer Mrs. Helen Justice says that money-wise the county looks as good or better than years past.

For December of 1973 there were \$465,836.92 in funds as compared to \$308,000 in 1970, \$337,000 in 1971 and \$405,000 in 1972.

The jump in funds is not due to a rise in taxes. "Revenue sharing has helped us the most", she stated. For in 1972 there was \$55,591.00 left over from revenue sharing funds. And in 1973 left over revenue sharing funds accounted for \$43,997.28.

According to County Auditor C.H. O'Brien, revenue sharing funds are used in various ways by the county. They are placed in the county's general fund and used for Fiscal Administration, Capitol Outlay,

Fire Protection, and Law Enforcement. And each of the County Commissioners are allocated equal road and bridge funds.

The federal government requires that the funds be spent in specific areas. Under the designation of law enforcement, the constable's salaries are paid. Under the designation of Transportation a major portion of employee wages and load maintenance costs of commissioner's precincts are paid.

Since 1972 when the revenue sharing program began, the county has received a total of \$226,934 in funds.

The total in 1972 was \$108,934. In April '73, the county received \$32,013 for the first quarter payment and in July, \$31,014 for the 2nd quarter.

Eastland County has not received their third quarter payment. However, O'Brien called the Texas Coordinator for revenue sharing in Washington, who said no disbursements would be made until after the first of the year. Thus the county auditor figures that the third and fourth quarter payments of \$29,000 each will be paid in one lump sum.

The County auditor has set up a separate account in the bank for revenue sharing funds. He figures the cost in the county's books and takes revenue sharing payments out of the county funds. Then he reimburses the county from the revenue sharing account, which requires only one simple check for total expenditures.

Under the capital outlay designation, the funds have been used to buy a new boiler for the courthouse and to provide for major repairs to the Courthouse building, that are now going on.

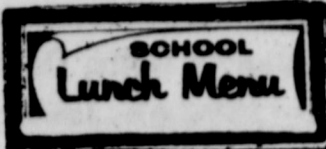

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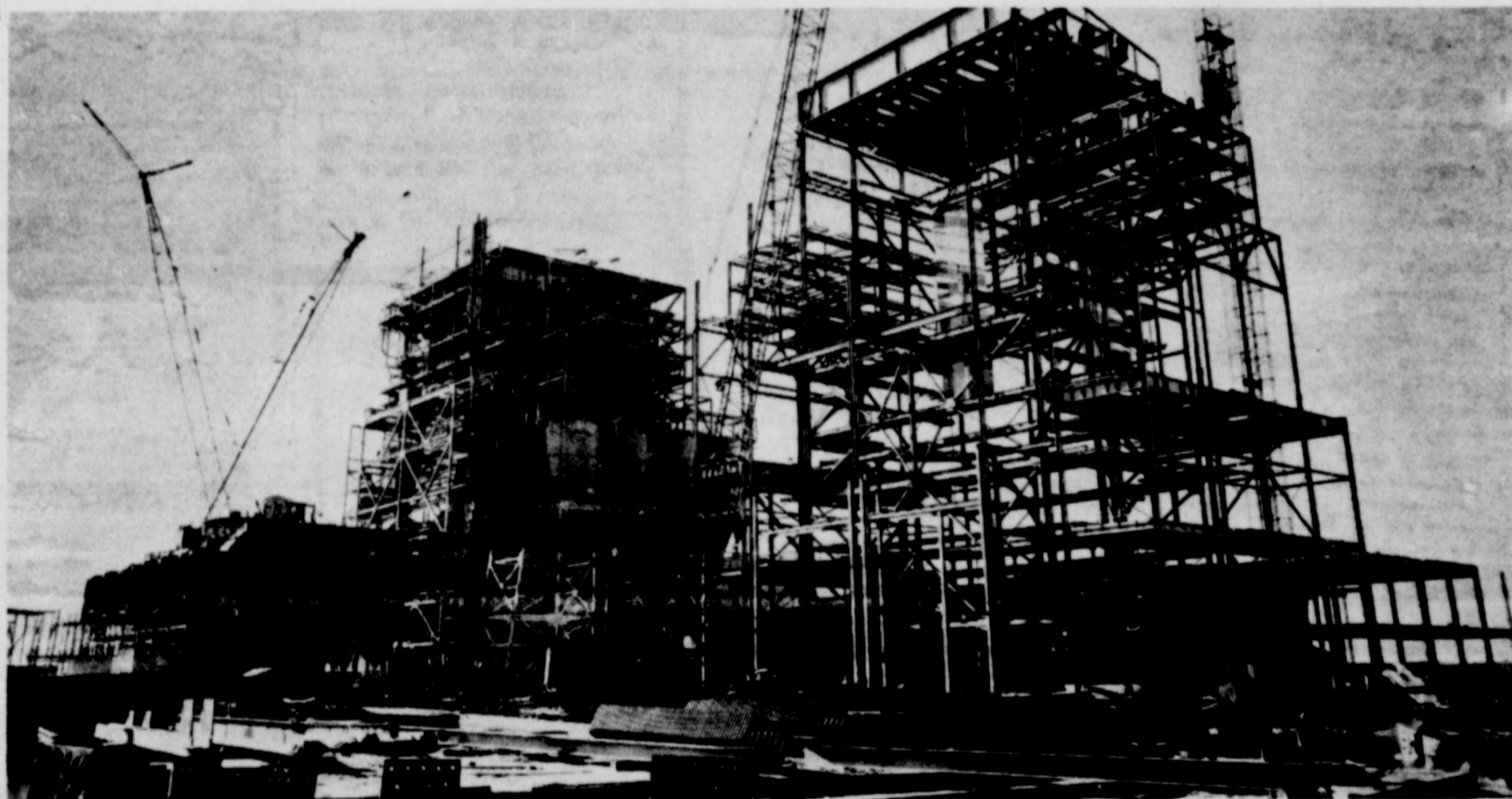
