Olney Cubs Clip Mavericks, 21-19

The Mighty Mavericks' fourth game of the season which took place Friday night in Cub Stadium in Olney, was one of misfortune, as the Olney Cub offense seemed to roll unmercifully to defeat Eastland in a score of 21 - 19.

The game started with Olney winning the toss and electing to receive.

Both teams maintained an even amount of ball possession time throughout the main part of the first quarter until with 4:38 remaining in the first quarter Olney started with a 45 yard drive which left the first score of the ball game with Olney 7 points.

Eastland's first touchdown drive came with 4:27 left in the second quarter, with the drive plays starting at the Eastland 35. The ball was evenly distributed between Brent Parker and Tony Thomas for the Mavs. With Thomas scoring with a dive from the Olney 4 yard line.

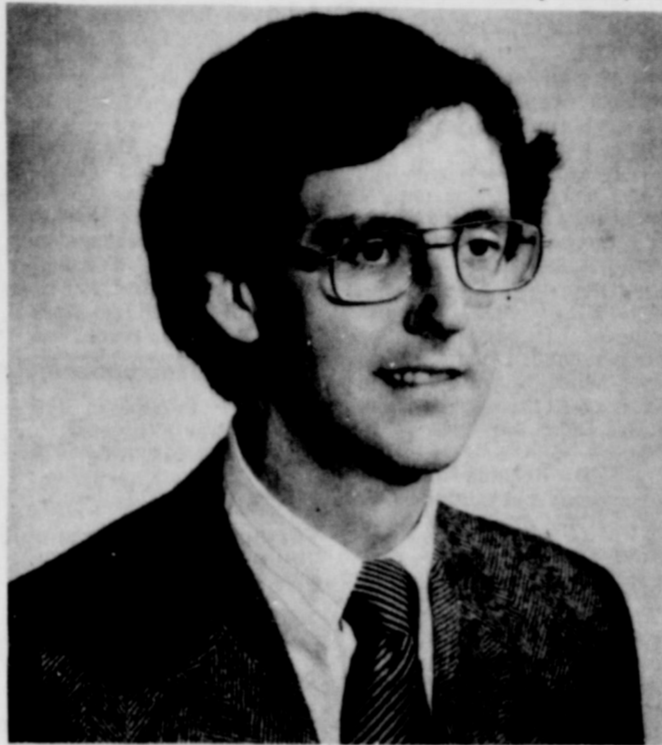
The extra point conversion by Tom Morren was unsuccessful thus leaving the Cubs with a one point edge over the Mavs going into the half. Eastland 6, Olney 7.

Following a punt by Terry Ensor midway in the third quarter which left the Cubs at their own 5 yard line, Olney started their second touchdown drive which led to a pass from Ivert to Pratt of the Cubs for a 65 yard pass run for the Cubs second touchdown of the night. Score Olney 13, Mavs 6.

After the kickoff by Olney to the Mavs Terry Ensor went for a pass, attempt which was picked off by the Cubs putting them on the Mavericks' 36 yard line where Olney started their third and final touchdown drive.

On the second play of the Cubs possession Ickert gave to Sadau for Olney on a 30 yard touchdown run with the two point conversion good. The score stood at Eastland 6, Olney 21.

\$8 1/4 Million Peanut Crop Seen For County

A peanut crop worth eight and one quarter million dollars is expected to be produced in Eastland County this year. Ross Wilson, manager of Southwestern Peanut Growers Association, makes this estimate based on the estimated yield and present price of peanuts.

There are approximately 35,000 acres of peanuts in the county this year according to David Martin, ASC County Director. There is a good chance the average yield will reach an all time high. Last year's average yield was 1462 pounds per acre. This was second only to the 1968 yield of 1474 pounds. This year's crop is expected to exceed 1500 pounds per acre. The price of peanuts as well as the cost of production is up this year.

The weather is ideal in most parts of the county now, but many things can still happen to change the bright outlook. A peanut crop is unlike most other crops. The crop promise the most and in the end produce the least and produce the most of any other crop in this area. For example in August the peanut crop looked like a disappointing failure, but rain came in time to change the outlook.

It now seems that those farmers who planted late peanuts will be the most fortunate ones. Peanuts planted the first half of May matured in August when moisture was short. Many who had irrigation wells ran out of water. The June and early July peanuts began developing a good crop after good rains in early September and should produce high yields. Several producers report that their late dryland peanuts will produce the best yields they have ever made.

This is the year that good leaf

spot control will pay off. If the leaves are green and healthy the plants will mature the large crop that are on the plants now. However, leaf spot is now doing its damage in untreated fields and those peanuts will not mature and produce good grades.

Some of the peanuts that were about mature in August were stressed by the drought and lesser cornstalk borers. This provided an opportunity for aflatoxin mold causing the peanuts to go into Segregation III. This means a \$50 per ton deduction in price.

Dr. Thomas Lee, Extension Plant Pathologist, suggests that growers who have this problem leave their peanuts in the ground until the early damaged peanuts shed from the vines. This will give the later nuts time to develop and produce better yields and grades.

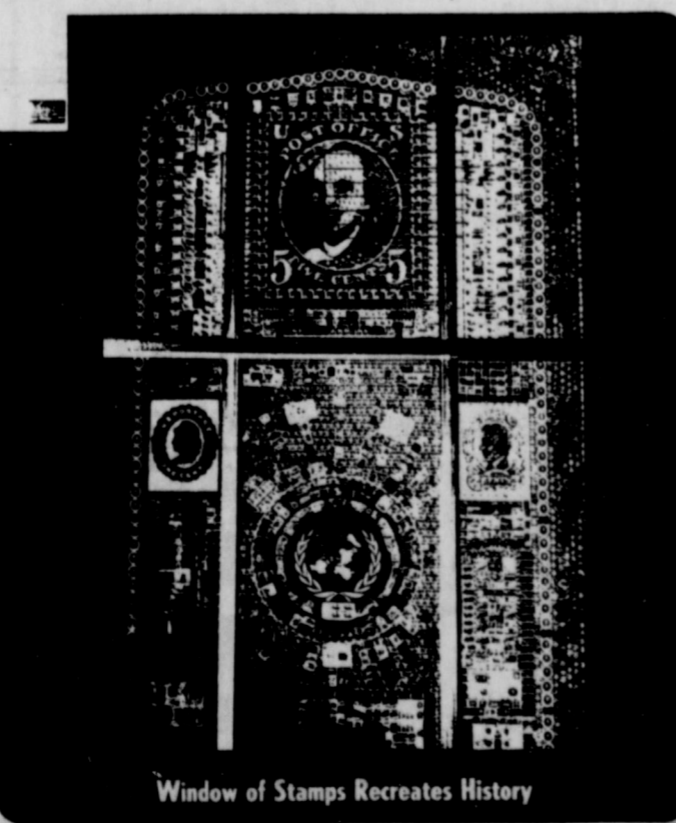

stamping out history
11,217 stamps compose unique, beautiful masterpiece

STAMP WINDOW

Retired Eastland, Texas Postmaster Mrs. Marlene Johnson has stamped out a unique and beautiful philatelic masterpiece in the form of a window mural.

Composed entirely of postage stamps, the window at the post office at Eastland attracts visitors from far away and has been recently added to a listing of tourist attractions in Texas.

When she was postmaster, Mrs. Johnson thought of the idea of replacing a window in the post office with a colorful mural in which the stamps themselves would tell a bit about the history of this country.

One half million stamps were collected, cleaned and sorted. Mrs. Johnson spent many hours in research and design and corresponded with people all over the world who contributed to the project.

All in all, seven years of work during spare time and annual leaves passed before the project was ready. The finished mural measures six by ten feet. The actual time spent in applying the stamps was 982 hours.

Mrs. Johnson relates: "It all began one Christmas. I had been ill and hadn't been able to decorate the Post Office for the children. In town as I had always done.

An Idea Happens

"A little depressed, I walked to the big bare window near the entrance. I happened to have several stamps in my hand and idly held them up to the light. The colors looked so pretty that I thought immediately how beautiful it would be if the entire window were covered with stamps.

"I contacted officials in the Post Office Department and asked permission to create a stamp window, working on my own time and at my own expense. It was soon granted.

"When news got out that I was planning the project and collecting stamps, everyone wanted to help. I had stuck my neck out, and I had to follow through."

And follow through she did. Mrs. Johnson had numerous offers for financial assistance but felt that she could not accept them. Before the mural was finished she had spent \$12,500. She explains that "it is my gift to students interested in world history and geography through philately."

The completed mural is composed of a total of 11,217 stamps.

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Only \$270.00. But, the actual price of the stamps from as high as \$2.00 each to as low as one cent. Zepplin stamps was \$270.00. The oldest stamp she used has a cancellation date of October 20, 1863.

Value is More Than Dollars

The dollar value of the mural has been estimated at one million dollars. However, the actual value is much more. The mural is a masterpiece of philately and a unique historical record. In order to be international, Mrs. Johnson used her favorite U.S. stamps to each representative at the United Nations and asked in return for an autographed national stamp from the ambassador.

These foreign stamps include the UN emblem which denotes a central panel on freedom on the mural. There are also 18 stamps from countries that have lost their freedom.

The central point of interest on the mural is a portrait of Martha Washington as it appeared on the first postal card issued and one of Abraham Lincoln as it appeared on the first postage stamp. The portrait of Lincoln is, diplomatically enough, made of Jefferson stamps.

Other panels of the mural represent different subject matters including statehood, progress through communication and industry, special service for which stamps were issued, the military, and an education.

Being a true Texan, and proud of it, Mrs. Johnson preserved a small area of the mural for her native state. The area is devoted to the history of Texas and a map of the state is outlined with Alamo stamps.

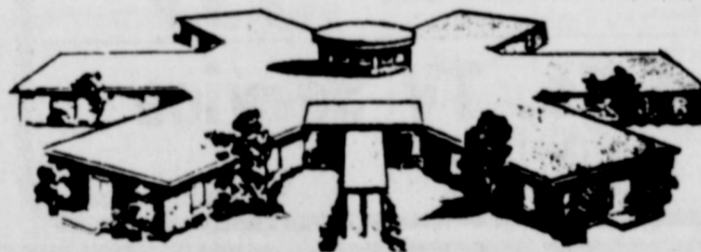

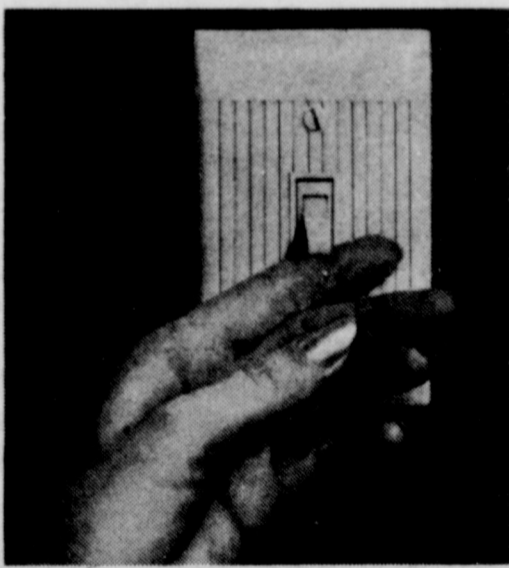

One was exhibited by Glenn Rocky of Cross Plains and the other was exhibited by B.D. Linney of Rising Star. The hay had to grade 85 or above to get a blue ribbon. Red ribbons were given to thirteen producers whose hay graded between 70 and 84. These winners were Johnny Aaron of Eastland, Jeff Harbin of Eastland, Bill Brown of Gorman, Charles Underwood of Eastland, Bill Sanlin of Carbon, Bob Shults of Rising Star, J.E. Cooper of Rising Star, Bill Pope of Cross Plains, R.D. Hart of Eastland, D.J. West of Eastland, Pete Hathcock of Morton Valley, and Howard Ingram of Scranton. D.J. West won two red ribbons. Producers were awarded nine gold ribbons. Gold ribbon hay graded between 50 and 69. These winners were J.D. Griffin Jr. of Carbon, Pete Hathcock, Lummas and Guess of Ranger, Sam Kimmell of Cisco, Vera Blackwell Cooper of Ranger, Charles Little of Eastland, and R.D. Hart, Sam Kimmell and Vera Cooper won two gold ribbons each. Forty five people attended the show and heard Novosad and Chapin discuss hay quality. They told producers that several factors affected hay quality and most of these the producer could control. Three important things the producers can do is to plant thick stands fertilize properly, and cut the hay before it gets too mature. The hay entered in the show ranged from 1.75 percent to 14.75 percent protein. Thirty four bales were entered in the show.

Eastland County know that they have our support.



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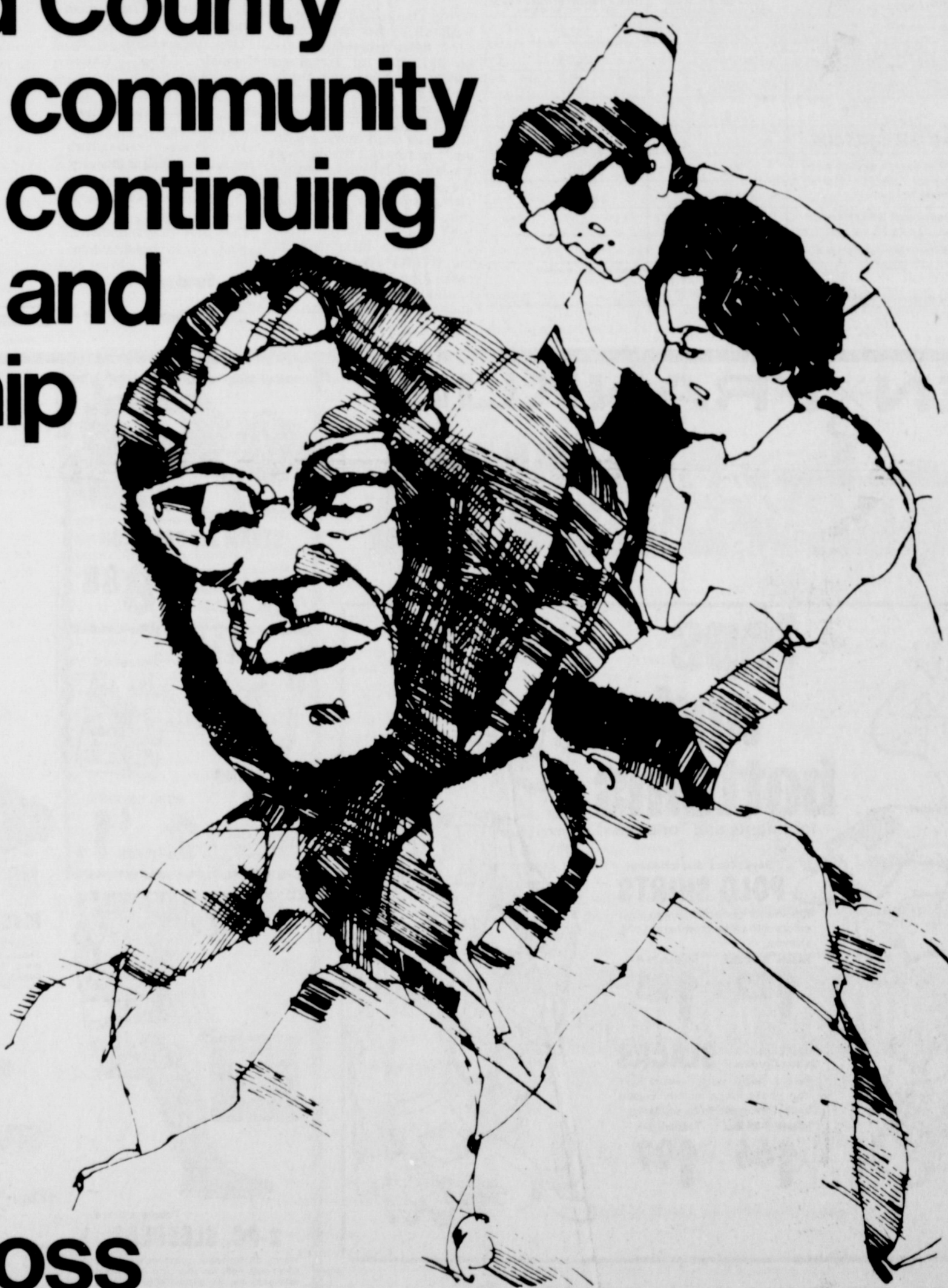
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
