## Group To Study Peanuts Here Friday

Quo Vadis, peanut raiser? That's the "Which way, now" question that will be asked, and hopefully answered, when a delegation meets at noon Friday at the Ramada Inn in Eastland for an all-important peanut discussion session. Hosts will be the Texas Peanut Producers Board and

the question will be: what can and should be done to stay off anticipated action in Washington which could kill the peanut industry.

That industry represents some \$6 million in Eastland County and is of much concern to one and all.

In addition to Board officials, other peanut organization officials, raisers, representatives from the following areas are being invited: bankers, newspaper editors, chamber of commerce officials, Farmers Union and Farm Bureau officials and others.

A six county area will converge in Eastland Friday. Invitations went out this week to leaders in Eastland, Erath, Comanche, Hood, Brown and Callahan counties.

At stake are peanut support programs and the allied programs which are presently to important to the peanut raisers throughout the South.

Alternate proposals will be made and avenues of communications will be established to stave off sudden and drastic changes which could spell doom for the peanut farmer. One avenue which will be suggested and which can be joined by one and all right now, is the sending immediately of personal letters expressing concern to key government leaders including Secretary of Agriculture Butz, Texas Senators John Tower and Lloyd Benson, and United States Representatives Omar

Burleson and Rep. Pogue of Waco.

It is believed that the Eastern Establishment leaders are responsible for the sudden national clamor against the peanut industry.

NBC Commentator David Brinkley recently in one of his "capsule" reports cited the peanut subsidy as one of the nation's prime examples of federal money waste.

## Rates Going Up

It looks as though Eastland property owners may be looking at up to a five percent rate increase in fire insurance protection as the result of a recent State Board of Insurance inspection here.

The deficiencies signalled by the inspectors are well-known to city officials and could be corrected if such capitol funds were available.

The insurance board reportedly was requested by a local resident to make the Eastland inspection.

Cited specifically are the older water pipes and a recommendation is made that all four-inch pipe be replaced with six-inch or larger pipe and that all two-way fire hydrants be replaced with the three-way type.

A bond issue of considerable magnitude would be required to accomplish these improvements, it is understood by most.

The report by the Insurance Board Chief Engineer to City Manager Lewis Tiner is as follows:

Dear Mr. Tiner: We appreciate the cooperation of the city officials during our recent key rate inspection. For purposes of our rate setting standards, we are estimating Eastland's population at 3,200.

Eastland's water supply and pumping ability continues to be very good, but we must report that the distribution system is suffering badly from age, tuberculation and rust. Hydrant flow tests demonstrate clearly that your city should initiate a program of replacing the older water pipe. A 5c charge is now in order for lack of proper hydrant flows, and we urge that your city take action on this problem. We also recommend that all 4-inch pipe in fire service be replaced with 6-inch or larger pipe, and that all 2-way fire hydrants be replaced with the modern three-way type.

Enclosed herewith is a copy of our distribution map of your city, showing the results of flow tests and our recommendations. Also enclosed are copies of our memoranda regarding water works standards.

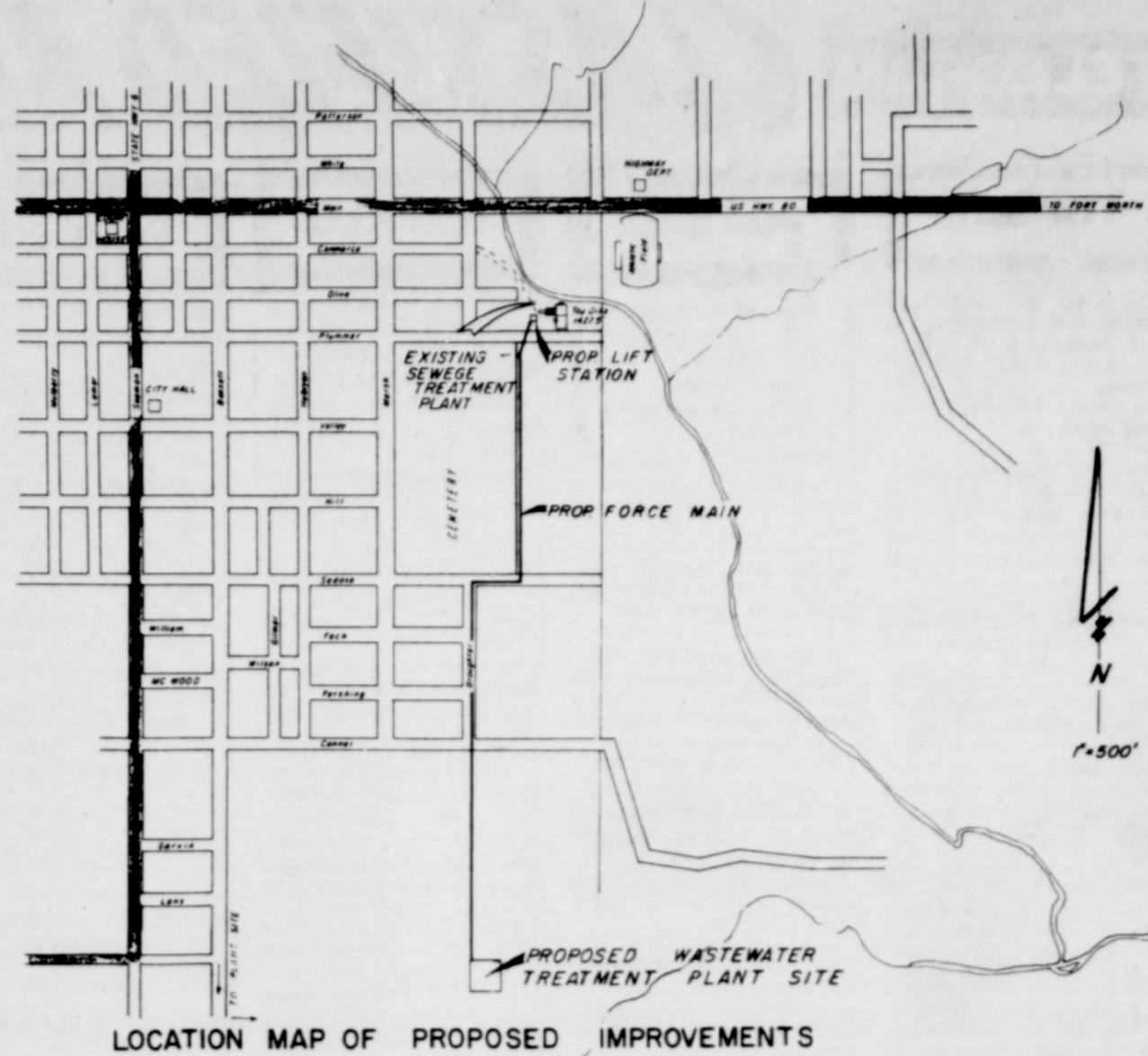
Eastland's fire department organization appears adequate, however, we recommend that your paid firemen work toward full certification. The older pumper (the 1951 Ford American La France) did not come near to passing its tests. The 1963 model engine in it has not increased its performance nearly enough. This equipment has never passed its tests, and

## Industrial Team Set For Training

All the good that's going for Eastland - and if there's any bad, that too - will be carefully examined and catalogued by a team of some 26 men who will become Eastland's first line of industrial offense.

Eastland's Chamber of Commerce's Industrial Team, captained by M.H. Perry, met at noon Tuesday for the first session of what will be a month long training seminar which will arm each with the necessary credentials to be qualified to first, learn how to work with industrial prospects and secondly, to search and seek new prospects.

Eastland is presently enjoying the benefits of an active industrial prospecting program lead by the Eastland Industrial Foundation, and a similar training program was held several years ago.

Sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce in cooperation with Texas Electric Service Co., which does full-time prospecting for communities it a 2c charge is in order, therefore, we suggest the pump and engine be repaired by a qualified person to bring the truck up to standard.

Billy Jacobs of the engineering firm of Yeatts and Decker presented the final plans at a called meeting, and commissioners were enthusiastic in their approval. The plans now go to the Environmental Protection Agency for their final approval and this step is "hoped" to be a short one, moving the plans toward an advertisement for bids in January.

The engineering firm will ask for a 300-day construction period and completion by next fall.

The site for the new plant will be on property already owned by the city and formerly used for the city dump grounds in the extreme southeast part of town. A lift station will be installed at the present site and a 10-inch force line will carry material for treatment to the new plant.

The new facility will be surrounded by chain link fence, and a small sampling laboratory with equipment is included in the specifications. The improvements include the construction of a lift station, grit chamber, Parshall flume, oxidation ditch, clarifier, miscellaneous appurtenances, piping and electrical work and force main.

The city voted and has sold \$92,000 in revenue bonds to help pay for the facility. Federal grant money has also been allocated for the project, therefore all specifications are in compliance with all recommended procedures.

## Food Stamps To Be Distributed

those persons who have been certified by the Department of Public Welfare, and who have been issued an Authorization to Purchase Card (ATP) which will show the amount each person is to pay. Each recipient will also be issued an identification card and if that person is not physically able to go to the post office for the stamps, the Department of Welfare will have entered the name of an authorized representative on the card, Mr. O'Dell said.

The post office has been authorized to accept only cash and will accept no checks.

Each individual case will be evaluated by the Welfare Dept. and the amount to be paid will be determined by that department and not the post office.

Beginning Thursday, Nov. 1, the Eastland Post Office will begin distributing food stamps under the new assistance program in cooperation with the Texas Department of Public Welfare.

The stamps will be on sale from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. only, Monday through Friday, except holidays. Postmaster Marcus O'Dell reports.

Stamps will be sold only to office department. The cards

must not be mutilated or disfigured in any way, and are not to be signed except in the presence of a postal official when the stamps are purchased.

The authorization cards will be issued monthly, and the recipients may buy their food stamps anytime during the authorization month, but the stamps may be used at any time with no expiration date.

Estimates are there will be from 450 to 500 households in Eastland County eligible for the food stamps.

The food stamps may be spent "just like money" at any of the authorized food stores throughout Eastland County.

It is being emphasized that the eligibility is determined by the Texas Department of Welfare and not the Postal Service.

Food coupons are available in three denominations: 50c (orange); \$2.00 (Blue); and \$5.00 (maroon).

## Apprehended

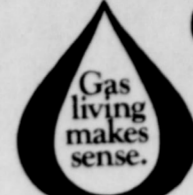

## FARM NEWS

WASHINGTON - Secretary of Agriculture Earl L. Butz announced the 1974 crop peanut program with administrative changes aimed at reducing the program's cost.

Secretary Butz said legal provisions require the continued imposition of marketing controls through quotas, an acreage allotment at the legal minimum of 1,610,000 acres, and price support also at the legal minimum of 75 percent of parity as of August 1, 1974.

Secretary Butz said that the cost of the peanut price support program for 1974 under program provisions announced today will be as high as or higher than the \$70 million estimated cost of the 1973 program. Losses from 1967 through 1971 have totalled \$237 million. Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) acquires peanuts when farmers are unable to obtain a price higher than the effective loan support.

He said the following administrative changes being made in the 1974 program should lower costs by an estimated \$6.6 million:

- No price support for peanuts found to contain aflatoxin.

- Elimination of transfers by lease, sale or by owner privileges now permitted for acreage allotments, resulting in reduced peanut acreage.

- An increase of \$2 per ton in storage, handling and inspection charges (from \$15 to \$17 per ton) assumed by producers in order to recover more of Commodity Credit Corporation's outlay for these charges.

- No tolerance will be allowed in program compliance determinations relating to measured acreages.

The CCC's minimum sales policy for acquired peanuts is being revised to provide a minimum resale level of 115 percent of the loan rate on both domestic edible and diversion sales. (A diversion sale is one made for crushing into oil and meal or for export). Most of CCC sales are on a bid basis at prices below the loan rate. Field and supervisory price support functions will be transferred from grower associations to Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service State and County Offices.

For the 1973 crop, the combination of acreage locked into past production patterns and of fixed minimum support prices is resulting in the acquisition and disposal by the Government of the production from some 600,000 acres, or more than a third of the national allotment, at a loss.

The Secretary pointed out that current legislation provides for acreage allotments for marketing quotas when approved in a referendum. The growers in a referendum held in December 1971 approved marketing quotas for the 1972, 1973, and 1974 peanut crops.

Legislation provides that a marketing quota be established at the higher of either (1) the average quantity of peanuts harvested for nuts during the five years preceding the year in which the quota is proclaimed, adjusted for current trends and prospective demand conditions, or (2) that quantity sufficient to provide a national acreage allotment of 1,610,000 acres.

On the basis of the prospective need for peanuts for food uses (salint, peanut

butter, candy manufacturing and related uses) the national marketing quota would be 984,000 tons which would result in a national acreage allotment of 886,486 acres for 1974. The Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938, as amended, however, requires a minimum national allotment of 1,610,000 acres.

Growers who comply with their allotments will be eligible for loan and purchase support. The preliminary rate will be announced early in 1974. The national peanut acreage allotment is apportioned to States, and the State allotments are apportioned among individual peanut producing farms within each State. State allotments will also be announced later. Noncompliance farmers (those who plant in excess of allotments or without allotments) will receive no loan and purchase support and will incur substantial marketing penalties for any excess peanuts produced.

Peanut marketing quotas have been in effect each year since 1949.

## FARM BUREAU

Farm Bureau has definite positions on two of the nine proposed amendments to be voted on in the Nov. 6 general election, according to Jack Cozart of Cisco, president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau.

These are propositions No. 1 and No. 9, the county leader said.

Amendment No. 1 provides for annual regular sessions of the Legislature and provides for an annual salary of \$15,000 and a per diem allowance of \$18 for members of the Legislature.

Farm Bureau policy is against annual regular sessions, Mr. Cozart said. He added that the organization has no policy regarding legislators' salaries.

Amendment No. 9 authorizes the Legislature to exempt certain water supply corporations and cooperatives from the property tax on certain facilities.

Farm Bureau favors this amendment, the County Farm Bureau president said.

Farm Bureau state policy is adopted each year in Texas Farm Bureau annual meetings, the local farm leader said. Voting delegates from counties



My three readers may think I should head the column this week: "I FORGOT". We have had quite an ordeal in our home the past few weeks. First, Johnnie Kay, my wife, fell and broke her knee - cap. She was barely out of the hospital when it was found she had serious eye trouble. Another, and very delicate operation. Now, thank the Good Lord, she is at home and seems to be on her way to complete recovery.

I remember in the early days of Eastland county there was not a real hospital in the whole territory. Doctors had to go, usually in a buggy or horseback to the homes to treat those who were ailing. The neighbors did the nursing and the doctor was frequently paid in butter and eggs. We called it "Setting up

with the sick". And it was a pretty dreary task. The "fore part of the night" was not too bad; but if you happened to draw the "after part", you were in for a dreary few hours. One case being a mother and child buried in the same casket. God was so good to us, as we did not, with all that exposure, have the Flu until ten years later.
