Haste May Waste In Crop Harvest

COLLEGE STATION -- "Don't be in a hurry when it comes time to harvest this year's peanut crop", advises James Denton, area economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "After all, the profit you leave behind is your own."

According to Denton, the worst culprits during harvest are speed and improper equipment adjustments. He offers these suggestions to reduce field losses while harvesting peanuts:

- Adjust equipment properly
- Dig slowly - less than three miles per hour.
- Cure the crop three to four days before combining.

-- Combine slowly - less than two - and - a half miles per hour.

"Peanut harvest losses which have been studied extensively in Oklahoma show that such losses average about 8.1 percent of the total production," points out Denton. "This means eight bushels left in the field where the yield potential is 3,000 pounds per acre. At the present price, this is a loss of \$35 to \$40 per acre."

Although some harvest loss is normal, care and concern during the harvest operation can reduce losses drastically, believes the Texas A&M University System economist.

"One way to look at field losses is this: After harvest, producers always pay their production expenses first, and what's left is profit."



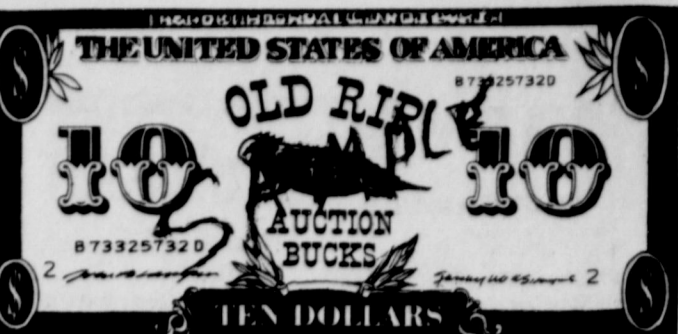

The president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau, Jack Cozart of Cisco, said today that if controls are imposed on agricultural exports, the result will be financial disaster for many farmers.

Mr. Cozart made the comment in reference to legislation currently pending in Congress that would impose export restrictions.

The U.S. House of Representatives passed a bill (H.R. 8547) on September 6 to increase the President's authority to control exports of materials and agricultural commodities. The U.S. Senate is holding hearings on similar bills (S. 2053 and S. 2411).

Mr. Cozart stated that the Eastland County Farm Bureau solidly supports the expansion of exports of agricultural commodities and the development of mutually advantageous trade with other nations.

He added that the legislation aimed at limiting exports are much like price controls in that they divert attention from the need for a direct attack on our economic problems through effective action to reduce government spending.

Mr. Cozart said consumers who are crying for export controls just don't understand the consequences of such action. "The intensity that we are involved in exports is not common knowledge to the consumer", he said.

According to the United States Department of Agriculture the 1973 fiscal year exports sales, which were 60 percent higher than a year earlier, required the output of 85 million acres of U.S. cropland - or the production of one of every four acres harvested.

The sharp rise in exports is contributing significantly to the expected increase in farm income from the record of \$20 billion in the calendar year 1972 to an estimated \$24 billion in 1973.

Mr. Cozart said advocates of the export controls should be aware of the consequences of the current Senate hearings. "Can you imagine", he said, "what the results would be to farm incomes if the U.S. were suddenly not able to continue export of three fourths of its wheat production, two thirds of its rice output, around half of the soybean crop and cattle hides, and nearly two fifths of the U.S. output of tobacco, cotton, tallow, and almonds."

Texas farmers' and ranchers' share of the 1973 fiscal year export sales amounted to almost \$800 million.

Yields Seen As Lower

AUSTIN - Early reports from Central Texas peanut harvest indicate that yields will be slightly below the 1972 crop, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has announced.

Peanut harvest for the state has reached 31 percent completion and is on schedule with last year, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Harvest of the early crop is near completion in South Texas and is gaining momentum in the Cross Timbers and Blacklands.

"This season's lower yields are attributable to diseases and insects in Central Texas," Commissioner White reported.

In some locations peanut fields have extensive damage from ground diseases, such as pythium and southern blight. Southern blight can usually be controlled by a timely application of a fungicide, provided the disease is detected in time and has not spread throughout the field.

"Some of the new chemicals being tested by the Texas Department of Agriculture research laboratory at DeLeon show promise for the control of late infestations of ground diseases," Commissioner White stated.

However, until these experimental chemicals are thoroughly tested, the best defense against ground diseases is nematocides containing chloropicrin applied before planting.

A recent outbreak of the two-spotted red spider mites has been observed in scattered peanut fields. "Control measures should be applied as soon as red spider mites appear to be building in populations", Commissioner White advised. Many fields now being surveyed by the DeLeon Research Laboratory show that high infestations of lesser cornstalk borers are still present in fields of late planted peanuts.

"Last year production in the six-county area of Brown, Callahan, Comanche, Eastland, Erath, and Hood totaled over 190 million pounds. We should do all we can to keep the yields as high as possible," Commissioner White said. He advised farmers to continue to check for the presence of ground diseases, leaf spot, and lesser cornstalk borers in peanut fields twenty or more days from harvest and to take appropriate control measures.

Lone Star Gas Announces Major West Texas Gas Buy

Lone Star Gas Company today announced agreements with several West Texas producers to purchase approximately 70 percent of the gas reserves underlying a six-section drilling unit in the Warwink area of Ward County, Texas. The field discovery well, the University 10-18 Well No. 1 located on one of the sections in the unit, flowed at rates of 33 and 6.5 million cubic feet per day respectively from the Fusselman and Ellenburger formations.

Lone Star Gas Supply Vice President, George Loch, termed the discovery "a potentially major discovery."

Proved gas reserves in the University 10-18 Well, under contract to Lone Star as a result of these agreements, are estimated to exceed 50 billion cubic feet. Initial takes from the well are scheduled to begin by November 15, 1973.

The first development well, the University 9-18, is now drilling on an adjacent section of the unit.

Construction has already begun on a sulphur plant in the field and a 30-mile, 18-inch pipeline into the Warwink area, with a total cost estimated at \$5.6 million. The pipeline will connect the discovery area with Lone Star's recently completed 36-inch, 400-mile pipeline from Pecos County to the hub of the company's utility operations near Dallas-Fort Worth.

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

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Re-Construction Of Highway 183 To Begin In November

Reconstruction of Highway 183 from May to Rising Star is expected to get underway some time in November.

So Charles W. Heald, Brown County resident State Highway Engineer, told members of the

City Council in a brief visit to the council meeting Monday night.

The section is 7 1/2 miles in length.

Heald will be in charge of the project, which includes one mile of highway from the Brown county line to the southern limits of Rising Star in Eastland County. The new construction will link up with the completed section in Brown County from May, or the junction of FM 597, to Owen, 11 miles south of Brownwood.

The contract, Heald told

Mayor Mutt Carroll and Councilmen Robert Butler, Fred Cook, Elgie Crisp, Harry Sone, and Lane Wells, is due to be let in October 17 at Austin. It will allow 300 working days, which stretches out to a calendar period of approximately two years.

"Is If things go as we hope", he said, "we expect to start some preliminaries of construction about the middle of November. And if we get a 'good' contractor we hope the job can be completed within a year and a half."

By 'good', he indicated an aggressive contractor who will push the work.

Specifications call for a 44 foot pavement width, consisting of two 13 foot lanes flanked by two 9 foot shoulders, similar to pavement completed from Cisco to Romeny north of Rising Star, and from May to Owen.

A section from Rising Star to Romney is now in planning. It is not expected to be ready for construction before two years.

The May to Rising Star project will employ approximately 45 workers for two years, Heald said, a work force that will require local housing. He suggested that trailer park owners and people with houses or apartments to rent list them with the City or Chamber of Commerce.

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Leaf drop of oak trees has been a problem all over Eastland County this summer. Usually the falling leaves have small spots on them.

We mailed several samples of these leaves to disease and insect specialists. It has been difficult for them to find the cause of the problem. They have found some mildew spores on the leaves.

Dr. Thomas Lee, Extension Plant Pathologist, suggests that homeowners spray their trees with Maneb, a fungicide to help reduce leaf shed. If insects seem to be a problem, you might add Malathion or

Diazinon to the spray solution.

The old complaint that you cannot have shade trees and an attractive lawn is not necessarily true. The keys to maintaining both a good lawn and good shade trees are adequate moisture, soil fertility and proper pruning.

Proper pruning methods can provide the light and ventilation needed for the growth of healthy - disease - resistant turf and plants. Even St. Augustine, our most shade tolerant grass needs some light, which can be provided by judicious pruning to open up

heavy canopies and by removing some low hanging branches.

Careful pruning, as well as the removal of a few unnecessary trees or shrubs, will also improve air circulation and help eliminate conditions to the spread of disease.

As far as moisture and fertility are concerned, it is usually the shallow rooted "surface feeders" that cause most of the problems with lawns. Siberian elm, hack-

berry, silver or soft maple, and willow, all planted for quick shade, are the worst offenders. These plants compete with the lawn for soil nutrients and in late summer and fall use enormous quantities of water at the expense of the lawn.

We suggest thinning or even replacing these shallow-rooted trees with better species where lawn maintenance has become a problem.

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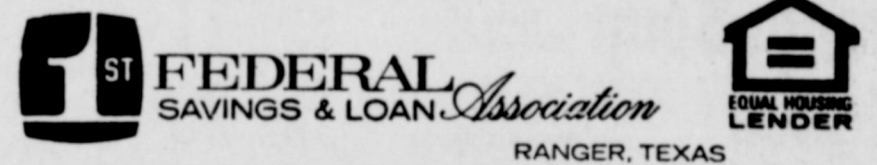
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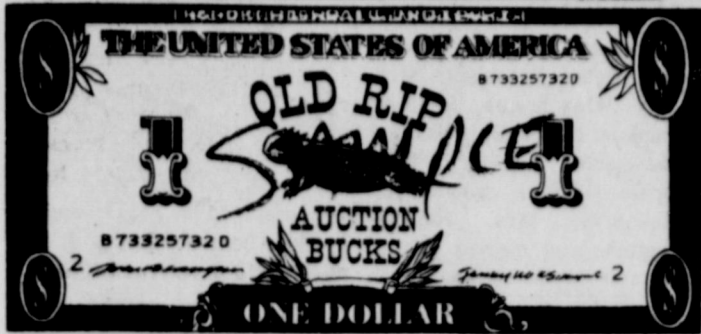

It Was Cooler

Temperatures generally were cooler in September, 1973, than in the previous year for the same month. Also, the month just past produced more than twice as much rainfall, according to National Weather Service records in Eastland.

Highest temperature for September, 1973, was 98 degrees on the second day of the month. During the same period last year, this same temperature was reached, and exceeded four times.

Lowest reading for September was 51 degrees on the 29th. However, during the same period last year, a low of 44 degrees was recorded on Sept. 30th.

In the rainfall department, two cool fronts, one which arrived on Sept. 5, brought 1.12 inches of rain, and an additional 1.48 inches on the following day.

The second front arrived on Sept. 23, bringing 1.23 inches of rain, and another 1.46 inches on the 26th, with lesser amounts falling at other times throughout the month.

A&M Testing New Water Purifying System

Clean, pure water for millions of rural Americans may be close to reality, thanks to a discovery by scientists of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

The need is great. There are still about five million Americans who don't have piped running water in their homes. And of other millions who do, many get their water from wells or ponds with little or no purification. Tests show that many of these sources are highly contaminated.

In this period of shortages, it may come as no surprise to hear that many cities are presently scrambling for chlorine, an essential for present water purification plants. Chlorine is also essential for manufacturing plastic and hundreds of other items and is in very short supply.

So it's doubly welcome to hear that scientists at Texas A&M University have developed a system for purifying rural water supplies that uses electricity and the chlorine already present in salt in most water.

Researchers with the Department of Agricultural Engineering have been experimenting for several years with an electrochemical water purification system. The clear and cloudy appearance of most water is caused by clay particles, algae and bacteria suspended in the water. And these very small particles don't normally settle because of their small size and the small negative electrical charge on their surface. This negative charge causes them to repel each other instead of gathering in clusters and settling. The system uses electricity that (1) causes them to settle and (2) frees chlorine from salts and kills bacteria.

Water treated with this system passes the U.S. Public Health Drinking Water Standards. There are significant reductions in hardness, turbidity, color, iron and other minerals.

Speaking of this discovery, TAES Director, Dr. Jarvis E. Miller said: "I'm especially pleased with this research. It's obviously in line with our responsibility to help improve living conditions in rural areas and our continuing concern for the well-being of all our citizens. Clean, pure water should be available to all our people."

"For many years, much of the research of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has been concerned with providing a better environment for all. This work, of course, has been in addition to research helping our producers of food and fiber."

"This experimental prototype for water purification is perhaps two or three years from manufacture and your local store," Miller added. "But it is of such long-range importance that we're announcing it now so that we can perhaps shorten the interval between discovery and home use."
