Growers May Be Forced Out

AUSTIN - - Many of Texas' approximately 13,000 peanut growers may be forced out of business if the federal administrative changes announced for the 1974 crop go into effect, Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White

"One farmer forced out of business by a federal program is one too many". White declared.

He criticized especially the elimination of price support for peanuts found to contain aflatoxin and the elimination of transfers by lease, sale, or by owner privileges permitted for acreage allotments.

Peanuts with aflatoxin (a mold over which farmers have

no control) have been used for making oil and for use as a fertulizer in previous years. Such use is valuable, and these peanuts should continue to be Mav's first touchdown and first eligible for price supports, the Texas Agriculture Commissioner said.



COLLEGE STATION - -Predator control in game management is an acceptable practice in Texas if there is enough hunting pressure to remove the resulting surplus of game animals.

There are other "ifs" involved, but this in general sums up the findings of Dr. Sam L. Beasom of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the A&M University Department of Wildlife and Fisheries Scien-

Beacom, who says predator control is one of the hottest ecology issues of the day, described his research during a recent meeting of the Wildlife Subcommittee of the Texas Legislative Committee on Environmental Affairs.

He told the subcommittee that the phenomenon of predation is a tough ecological problem that is difficult to interpret biologically because there are so many inter acting variables to consider.





figures. Cash receipts from agricultural products totaled \$18,269,000 last year. That's an increase of \$4,218,000 over 1971. Cash receipts from livestock totaled \$10,329,000 in 1972 while total receipts from crops came to \$7,940,000.

Production expenses mushroomed in 1972 by 23 percent over 1971. Due to increased production expenses, realized net income was down in 1972. However, total farm assets increased in 1972 over 1971.

A pasture short course for adult farmers will be held Dec. 17 - 20, under the sponsorship of the Ranger High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Mr. James Clark, Superintendent, and Mr. Beverly Dudley, Jr., teacher of vocational agriculture.
