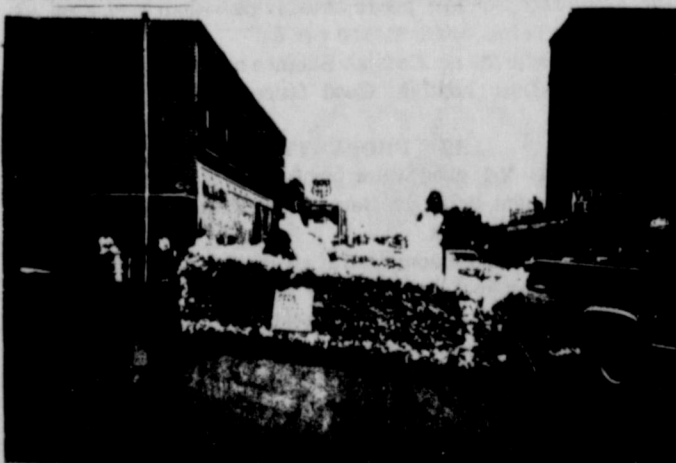

Bishop McCrea To Preach Here Sept. 19

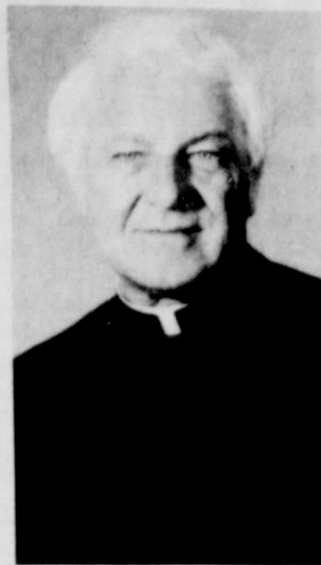

FARM NEWS

Producing a high quality product can be more profitable to a peanut producer than just aiming for higher yields.

Why? "The value of the crop is based on quality as determined

Chicago, Nov. 25 - 29, 1973. The 4-H winners from across the country and Puerto Rico, will be accompanied by some 250 4-H leaders and greeted by over 300 representatives

by a grading procedure," explains James Denton, area economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, who is located at Stephenville. "And, since many peanut producers depend on their crop as their main source of cash income, emphasis on a quality product is all-important."

According to Denton, the grade of the crop depends on

the percent of sound mature kernels, sound splits, damage, hulls, foreign material, moisture, loose shelled kernels and extra large kernels.

"Often a ton of peanuts with a good quality grade can bring \$100 or more than a ton of poor quality peanuts," notes the Texas A&M University specialist.

What makes a high quality peanut crop?

Denton lists these factors: - Good seed bed preparation.

- High quality planting seed.

- Proper fertilization. - Proper weed and grass control.

- Proper insect and disease control. - Irrigation where possible.

"However, proper harvesting is most crucial for a good quality peanut crop," emphasizes Denton.

"Don't dig the crop before it is mature.

"Make sure the crop has

cured properly before combining.

"Adjust the combine properly and combine at the proper speed.

"Assure for proper drying of the crop after harvesting."

The economist urges peanut producers to always keep an eye on the quality of their crop. High quality is an essential ingredient of profitable peanut production, he adds.

Soil Conservation News

THE AGRICULTURE AND CONSUMER PROTECTION ACT OF 1973 provides for a four year program for Upland

Cotton, Feed Grain and Wheat. New with this Act is the "target" price concept for the three commodities. Target prices will not be paid if the average market prices remain above the target price. The target price for wheat is \$2.05 per bushel, corn is \$1.38 per bushel, grain sorghum is \$1.31 per bushel and cotton is \$3.88 per pound.

The Act also provides that there will be no set aside requirements for 1974 and no conserving base requirements for 1974 through 1977.

Since there are restrictions only on Marketing Quota crops (rice, peanuts and tobacco) farmers will be free to go all out to produce feed grains, cotton and soybeans and wheat.

The total payment for a person under the wheat, feed grain and Upland cotton program is limited to \$20,000.

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1973

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 8)
Article III, Sections 5, 24 and 49a and Article VIII, Section 6 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:
Provide for regular annual sessions of the Legislature. The regular session in each odd-numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 180 days. The regular session in each even numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 60 days and would be limited to consideration of fiscal matters and any emergency matters submitted by the Governor. The 60 day session could be extended by the Governor for a period not to exceed 30 days.
Provide an annual salary for members of the Legislature not exceeding \$15,000 per year and a per diem not exceeding \$18 per day for each day of each regular session or special session.
Provide that no appropriation of money shall be made for a longer term than one year and direct the Comptroller to make annual estimates of anticipated revenue rather than biennial estimates.
The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to provide for annual regular sessions of the legislature; and to provide an annual salary of \$15,000 and per diem for the members of the legislature, effective in January, 1975."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 7)
Article XVI, Sections 50 and 51 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:
Include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property; and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses.
Presently a single adult person is not entitled to claim a homestead exemption and a married man can abandon a family homestead without the consent of his wife.
The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property; and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses."

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)
Article VIII, Sections 1-a and 1-b of the Texas Constitution are amended to:
Extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the residential homesteads of unmarried adults.
The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the homesteads of unmarried adults."

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 1)
Article XVI, Section 59, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Subsection (e) which:
Provides that no law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless a copy of the proposed law is delivered to the commissioners court of each county and to the governing body of each incorporated city or town in whose jurisdiction said district or any part thereof is or will be located. Each such commissioners court and governing body may file its written consent or opposition to the proposed law with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives. Each special law creating such a district must comply with general laws then in effect relating to consent by political subdivisions to the creation of such districts.
The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws creating certain conservation and reclamation districts."

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 12)
Article XI, Section 7 of the Texas Constitution is amended to:
Provide that all counties and cities bordering on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico are authorized to levy a tax to pay for bonds issued for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a majority vote of the resident property tax-payers. Counties and cities are presently authorized to levy such taxes and this amendment only changes the required vote from a two-thirds majority to a simple majority.
The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional amendment authorizing counties and cities bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to issue bonds

for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a vote of the resident property tax-payers."

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 26)
Article V, Section 8 of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new paragraph which:
Provides that the district court, concurrently with the county court, shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court and in a probate proceeding shall also have the jurisdiction otherwise conferred on it by law. It also provides that the legislature may increase, diminish, or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, may adopt rules governing the filing, distribution, or transfer of cases and proceedings as between the courts having jurisdiction of probate matters, and may provide that all appeals in probate matters shall be to the courts of civil appeals.
The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional amendment stating that the district court concurrently with the county court shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court, and providing the jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that in any probate proceeding the district court shall also have jurisdiction otherwise conferred upon it by law, and further providing that the legislature may increase, diminish or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, and further providing that the legislature shall have power to adopt rules governing the filing, distribution and transfer of all such cases and proceedings as between district courts, county courts, and other courts having jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that the legislature may provide that all appeals in such matters shall be to the courts of (civil) appeals."

NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 6)
Article III, Section 49-b of the Texas Constitution is amended to:
Provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund. This amendment increases the present \$400 million authorization to \$500 million.
Remove the present provision which permits buying of land only by those veterans who served between September 16, 1940 and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the armed conflict in Viet Nam. This amendment would allow all veterans who serve after September 16, 1940 to buy land from the Veterans' Land Fund, provided they are otherwise qualified.
Provide that, in the event of the death of an eligible

Texas veteran after the veteran has filed with the Board an application and contract of sale to purchase through the Board the tract selected by him or her and before the purchase has been completed, then the surviving spouse may complete the transaction.
The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund."

NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 29)
Article XI, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 5(a) which:
Authorizes and requires incorporated cities, towns, and villages, regardless of population and notwithstanding the constitutional limitations on total tax rates, to levy such annual ad valorem taxes on the taxable property in the city, town or village as are necessary to pay the principal of and interest on, when due, the general obligations hereinafter issued by the city, town, or village. The legislature is empowered to limit by general or special law the total principal amount of general obligations which may be issued, but unless and until the legislature acts to do so, the limitations established by statute with respect to the total principal amount of bonds which may be issued by independent school districts shall apply as the rate limitation on cities, towns, and villages.
The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it appears on the ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and villages to levy such ad valorem taxes as are sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on their general obligations hereafter issued subject to the restrictions provided by law."

NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 25)
Article VIII of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 2C which:
Allows the Legislature, by general law, to exempt all real and personal property used by non-profit water supply corporations or cooperatives from the property taxes. The exemption would apply only to such property as is reasonably necessary to conduct the business of a non-profit water supply corporation or cooperative.
The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from property taxes certain property used by a non-profit water supply corporation or a non-profit water supply cooperative."

Another 'Good Year' Seen For Agriculture

The year upcoming will be a good year for agriculture, but below the unparalleled peaks of 1973 an A&M Economist predicted in Eastland this week.

Speaking for the Eastland Lions Club, Extension Service Agricultural Economist James Denton, presented a favorable picture for the future, seeing no shortages, and lower prices for the consumers, but continued demand and good prices for agriculture products.

County Agent De Gordon was program chairman and introduced Mr. Denton. Gordon called 1973 an unusual year, remarking that consumers were boycotting markets in April because of high prices, and lining up in August to buy even at higher prices.

Mr. Denton showed that estimated net farm income is going to be up \$4 billion at the end of 1973. He sees beef average prices declining with the 10-year cycle to peak again in 1976. He sees a similar decline on pork average prices, as well as lamb and poultry and eggs.

The average price on milk will be up he predicts with production down some. He expects the price on wool to decline but hesitates to guess on mohair, because of the fashion world's use of the product.

Even though the man-made fibers continue to compete, he guesses cotton prices will be good for the next two or three years with expanded production with wheat and feed grain crops competing for acreage.

President Darwin Miller presided and guests were Dale King and Buster Burrow. Mrs. Beverley Nicholson made a short comment on the availability of trees and shrubs in a Civic League Beautification Project. Dick Johnson has the program next week.

Demand for wheat will remain high Mr. Denton said, with the average price remaining good and very little carry-over foreseen. The average price for food grains will remain strong because of the world market.

Soybean prices will remain strong especially since the loss of the fish meal protein.

Eastland Countians are concerned about the peanut situation, and even though the new farm program did very little changing, the average price will trend upward under the present program, he said. Export and domestic use are strong, and acreage will in-

crease. Consumers are moved to know that the commodities prices on seven items are down

since Mid-August. "I work with farmers and I'm happy to see good prices," Mr. Denton said, "as I'm sure you

are, being closely associated with the agriculture economy here."

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'73 Cadillacs On Display At Pipkin Motor Co.

The 1974 Cadillac, on display at Bruce Pipkin Motor Co., restyled in front and rear, features an exclusive look to the new Coupe de Ville, a dramatic change in the interior of all models and engineering innovations adding customer value benefits in fuel economy and safety.

"Nine models offered in three series, Calais, De Ville and Fleetwood, went on sale at the Cadillac dealer showroom Wednesday" according to Bruce Pipkin.

"In size, overall length for all models is increased 2.2 inches as a result of the new rear bumper system," Mr. Pipkin said.

He pointed out that the new bumpers meet all federal and state mandatory requirements and in addition, the front bumper guards are wider and lower. The standard bumper impact strips are a unique silver gray color to blend into the chrome bumper.

The new rear bumpers on all models utilize Delco energy absorbers and telescope into the rear fender extensions and tail lamp bezels upon impact. Mr. Pipkin added, "The top surface of the rear bumper has been lowered, and the horizontal stop, backup and tail lamps have been relocated in a tough urethane body colored bezel for increased protection. The flexible bezel is easily removable for servicing of tail lamps and bulbs.

"A striking change to the Coupe de Ville and Calais Coupe upper has been accomplished by the new design of a fixed rear quarter window," he said.

In the standard Cadillac a new front-end appearance is enhanced by the relocation of parking lamps and head lamps. Cornering lamps, located in the lower portion of the fender, serve a dual function with the front side markers and reflex lenses.

"The familiar cross-hatch grille in the standard Cadillac has been designed with a bold motif, the square grille openings highlighted above and below the bumper," he reported. As in 1973 the grille on

all models is mounted to the bumper, telescoping under hood and fenders on impact.

The side view features all new rear quarter panels which have a lower profile at the top of the fender. The body moldings are extended front and rear and the wheel discs are redesigned.

In describing the Fleetwood Eldorado series which again includes the coupe and convertible, Mr. Pipkin said, "This model also has a newly styled front end, the focal point being the uniquely styled fine mesh grille.

"The grille again extends down below the center bumper bar and is protected against impact by two short guards.

"The side appearance is accentuated by a narrow body molding which protects the side of the car from parking lot damage. In addition, bolder striping and new wheel discs highlight the classic Eldorado lines," he said.

"The rear of the Eldorado has been restyled to provide improved protection. New bumper outers extend vertically and incorporate the rear side marker and reflectors."

Turning to the significant improvements in the interior of the 1974 Cadillac, he explained, "All models have a redesigned wood grained instrument panel which extends in one continuous sweep from one side of the car to the other." He said, "Immediate functional information for driving is separated from conditional information. A color coded fuel gauge and warning lights are contained in a horizontal 'strip' across the upper portion of the panel.

Mr. Pipkin reviewed engineering innovations in the 1974 models. These include refinements to the 472 cubic inch engine used in the standard Cadillac and the 500 cubic inch engine in the front-wheel-drive Eldorado.

"New engineering developments for 1974 include a new faster burn combustion chamber, lower overlap camshaft, more highly damped engine mounts, a new clutch fan and a new inlet air silencer including cold air intake.

"For improved starting at moderate temperatures, a vacuum reindexing feature has been added to the choke.

"Further advancements include additional body sealing and insulation. Also important is a new air conditioning system with improved air distribution and control as well as a provision for improved fuel economy under moderate temperature conditions."

On the Eldorado a stabilizer bar has been added at the rear to improve the ride.

"Other engineering highlights for 1974 include greater seat comfort, and a mechanical lockout starter system. A new polymer material known as 'Fiber B' is being used in radiator hoses for improved life and greater durability."

In the trunk lock option the pull down feature will be electric rather than spring powered.

Other options offered include a new high-energy electronic ignition system, a space-saver spare tire for more luggage compartment capacity, and a new pulse-action wiper control which adds an adjustable intermittent

delay action to the wiper system. All radio options have a power-operated mast-type antenna as standard equipment.

In summary, Mr. Pipkin noted, "The 1974 Cadillac adds new dimensions of safety in addition to fulfilling the needs of our customers for improved fuel economy, comfort and convenience."

AUSTIN - Although the bag limit for white-tailed deer in many parts of Texas is three, few hunters (approximately seven percent) harvested that many last year.

Only 37 percent of deer hunters killed two or more deer, according to a deer and turkey harvest survey for the 1972-73 hunting season conducted by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. The bulk of whitetail deer hunters, 62 percent, killed only one deer during the entire season.

The information from the survey came from responses to 38,774 questionnaires mailed to a random sampling of hunting license holders.

According to the survey, an estimated 516,900 hunters accounted for approximately 362,000 whitetails while 37,000 hunters killed an estimated 14,400 mule deer. Turkey hunters numbered 102,800 and they killed an estimated 35,700 birds.

Department officials found, among other things, that 20 percent of the deer harvested were killed the first weekend of the season and the kill on weekends was two to three times as heavy as the kill on weekdays.

The Edwards Plateau Regulatory District accounted for 46 percent of the statewide whitetailed deer harvest, while the South Central Regulatory District was second with 20 percent of the total kill.

The average whitetail hunter spent approximately six days afield, and mule deer hunters spent approximately four days. Some 46 percent of the whitetail hunters were successful, while 36 percent of mule deer hunters bagged a deer.
