Drilling Near Desdemona Tops County Oil News

Oil activity in the Eastland County area continue to look favorable this week.

Jarbo Oil Company's W. H. Davis drilling, three miles northeast of Desdemona in Eastland County, was reported at 1758 feet in shale. It is slated for 1850 feet.

Tamehill Petroleum Co. of Abilene has staked well number 8A, R. J. Maberly Jr., 400 feet from the north line and 150 from the east line of Section 12, Block 11, Texas and Pacific survey. It is located three miles west of Albany and schedule to go 1200 feet with rotary.

Texxon Oil Co. of Dallas has received a permit to drill their number 1 S. Horne, which spots 500 feet from the south line and 950 feet from the east line of the Robinson Survey 56, one mile west of Coleman in Coleman County, which is a step out from discovery well in Gardner by H. A. Birdwell and Son Drilling Co., which was drilled in January.

Kewanee Oil Company has received permit to drill a salt water disposal well on their Hawkins lease near Ovalo in Taylor County.

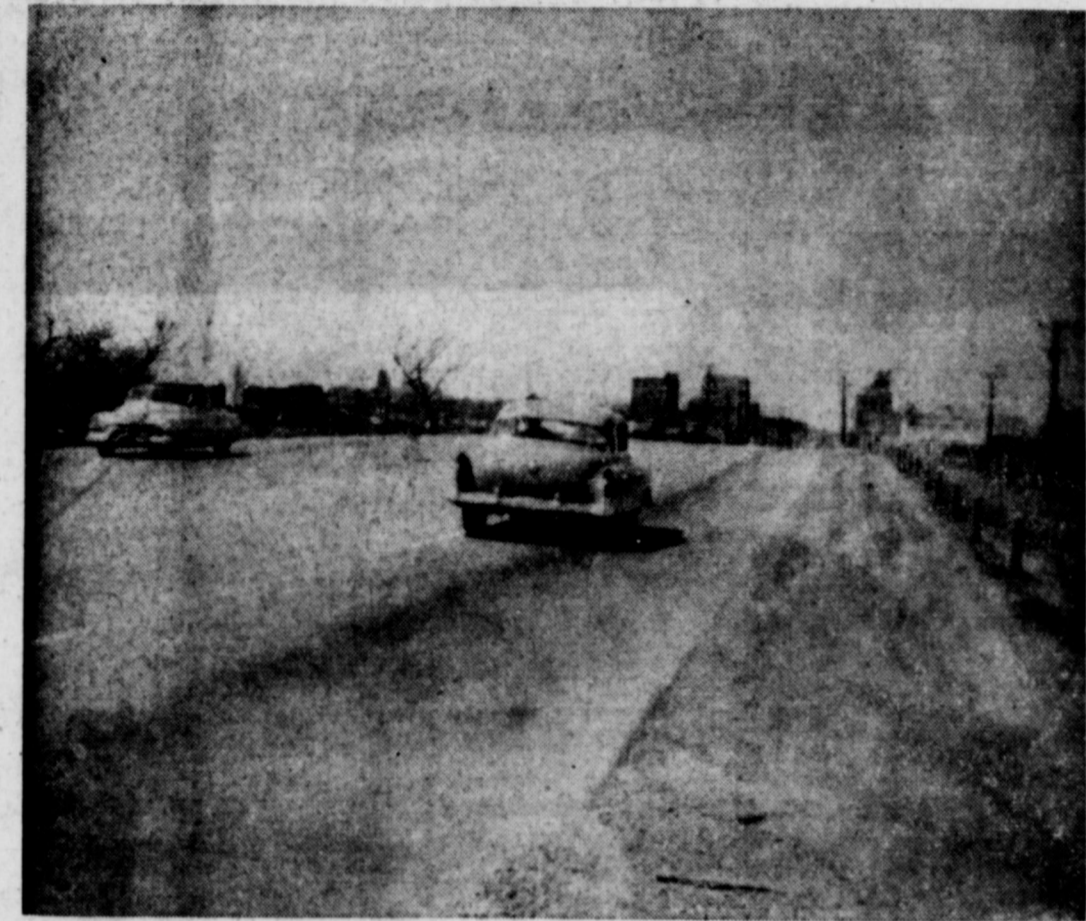
Local Service Reduces Military Service Period

The importance of basic training for a young man in the National Guard was emphasized today by Capt. Cecil C. Carr, commanding officer of the Ranger unit of the Texas National Guard, in which he urged young men of the Eastland County area to join the National Guard and take the six months of basic training with the active army provided by the Reserve Forces Act of 1955.

A man who enlists in the National Guard before he is 18½ will be deferred from induction into federal service until age 28 so long as he performs satisfactory Guard service and he is not required to take active duty training. However, he may volunteer for the six months of basic training and thus reduce the time he must serve in the National Guard from "until age 28" to a total of eight years of service.

What this means, Capt. Carr explained, is that a young man who enlists when he is 17 years old will finish his period of reserve military service at age 25. In other words, stated Capt. Carr, this young man can chop three years off his total military obligation.

County 4-H Club boys will send a livestock judging team, a dairy judging team and one entry in the speaking contest, while 4-H Club girls from this county will enter the safety, vegetable, shrub

Members of the livestock judging team are Clinton Humphreys of Eastland, and Bob Leveridge and Ronnie and Robert Bostick, all three of Cisco. Assistant County Agent Rufus Higgins is in charge of the team.

County Agent J. M. Cooper will have three Carbon boys on his dairy judging team. They are Bill

Charles Caraway, Gerry May and Jimmy Burleson.

Dan Jobe of Scranton will compete in the speech contests.

Sandra Auld and Letha Luster, 4-H girls from Scranton, will enter their safety team demonstration in the contests. The title of the demonstration is "Safety In The Home." The demonstration covers the cause and remedies for the six leading causes of home accidents: burns, falls, poisons, firearms, mechanical suffocation and poisonous gases, Miss LaFaye Mason, assistant Home Demonstration agent, stated.

Rosemary Berry and Kathleen Zehr, members of the Cisco "Cheerful Tailors" 4-H Club, will enter in the vegetable preparation contest. The girls will prepare savory canned carrots and vegetable tossed salad, Miss Mason stated. Miss Mason and Mrs. Walter Tonne, 4-H adult leader of Scranton, will accompany the girls to Stephenville.

Approximately 300 4-H members from a 20-county area of West and Central Texas are expected to attend.

Overall directors of the contest will be District Agents R. G. Burwell and Miss Annie Lucy Lane, both of Stephenville.

Events will get underway at 9:30 a.m. at the Tarleton Livestock Farm, the Poultry Farm and Agriculture Building. Other events which will be held in the Home Economics Building will start at 10 a.m.

First place teams will participate in the State 4-H Roundup at College Station June 12-15.

Eastland Makes Run-A-Way Of Meet To Win By Large Margin

The Eastland High School Mavericks, who weren't supposed to have much in the way of a track team this year, "ran" completely away with the District 30-B track and field meet at Gorman Tuesday and won the District Championship for the first time since 1948.

The Mavericks wound up the meet with 56½ points. Gorman was second with 39½. Wylie was third with 20½. Rising Star was fourth with 20, and Cross Plains was fifth with 16½. Ranger, the other member of the district, didn't compete.

Eastland won first in six events and was in a four-way tie for first in another event. Gorman took four places, Rising Star two and Wylie one. Cross Plains failed to win a single first place.

Bill Upchurch won first place in the pole vault with 9-9; Don Smith was winner of the high hurdles in 15.7, and also winner in the low hurdles at 21.2; Durdward Turner was winner of the broad jump at 18-1½; Norman Owen won the mile run in 5:00.5, and Eastland won the mile relay with a team consisting of Turner, Upchurch, Evatt and Cox.

The high jump event was a four-way tie between Don Smith and Clyde Young of Eastland, Leo Harrison of Gorman, and Vernon Allen of Wylie. Height was 5-6.

Coach Carrol Shelton said that all winners of either first, second or third places in the District Meet were eligible to compete in the Regional H-B Meet to be held at Brownwood April 21, and he was "pretty sure" that every eligible Maverick would take part in the Regional.

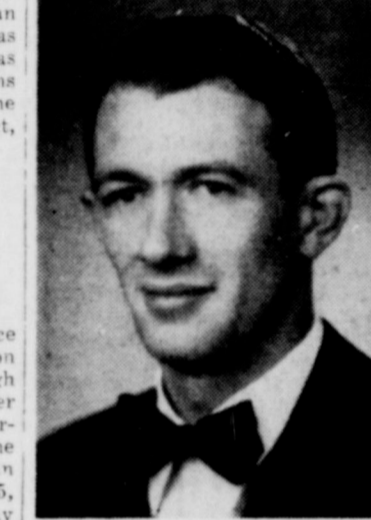

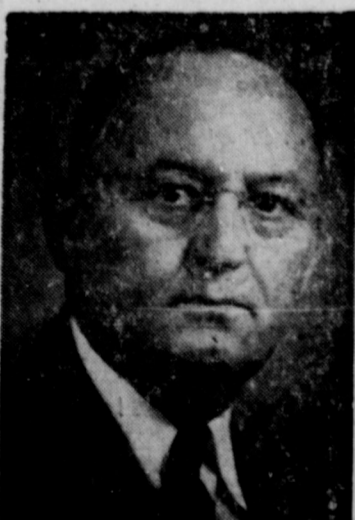
Doug Chitsey placed first in the 880-yard run.

The First Christian Church will honor the seniors of Eastland High School with a Chuck Wagon Supper Friday night in the church annex.


