## Kiker, Stahl Feature Humanities Program

Two top television news correspondents from different networks will be featured in the fourth program of Cisco Junior College's 1972-73 Arts and Humanities Series. MR. DOUGLAS KIKER OF NBC AND MISS LESLIE STAHL OF CBS will present a CURRENT AFFAIRS DIALOGUE to the Cisco Audience on Monday evening, February 5, at 8:00 p.m. in the CJC Auditorium.

Miss Stahl will take the place of Cassie Mackin of NBC, who was originally scheduled to appear with Mr. Kiker on the program.

Douglas Kiker is one of the National Broadcasting Company's principal reporters for the NBC Nightly News and special reports produced by the network.

White House correspondent for the New York Herald Tribune prior to joining NBC, and later as NBC's correspondent in Washington, Kiker has witnessed and reported contemporary political events as well as others. He was in Dallas when President Kennedy was assassinated and at the White House during the critical days of the Johnson transition. He extensively covered the presidential campaigns of 1964, 1968, and 1972.

In contrast to the veteran Kiker, Leslie Stahl is a younger and newer member of the electronic journalism fraternity. She joined the Columbia Broadcasting News' Washington bureau as a reporter in April of last year. She had been a reporter and producer for WHDH-TV, the CBS affiliate in Boston, from 1970 to 1972. She began her professional career in 1965 as

an assistant researcher for the Population Council in New York, and in 1966 worked on the staff of Mayor John Lindsay. She worked for NBC News as a writer and researcher between 1968 and 1972, and during that time she was assigned to the London bureau of NBC at intervals. Miss Stahl is a graduate of Wheaton College with high honors in history. She is a native of Swampscott, Massachusetts, and currently resides in the Washington, D.C. area.

Kiker and Miss Stahl are expected to give in-depth reports of the recent fast-breaking events on the national scene - the ending of American military involvement in Indo-China and the uneasy peace in Vietnam our country's peacetime course, return of P.O.W.s, the Watergate trial, and other events of current interest and concern. Miss Stahl has just finished covering the much-publicized Watergate trial in Washington and will have some interesting insights into the entire "political espionage" affair that culminated with the trial.

Tickets for the program are currently on sale at the CJC Business Office at \$2.00 for adults and \$1.00 for all students, with all seats being reserved. CJC officials pointed out, however, that tickets will be available at the door Monday evening.

Dr. Leland Willis, president of Cisco Junior College, called on Big Country area to support the college's Arts and Humanities Series by attending the Monday evening program. "This will be a most interesting presentation," Willis said.

Tomorrow evening (Monday) Cisco Junior College will present another of its Arts and Humanities Series programs with two outstanding television news reporters appearing on the CJC platform.

We commend the college for its efforts in bringing such programs to this area. Mr. Kiker and Miss Stahl should prove to be interesting and informative, according to all we've read and heard about them, and they will certainly bring some first hand insights into some of the many significant news stories of the past year - and past few weeks in particular. We can't think of a period of time in recent years that has seen more significant news happenings than have the past few months - the Nixon trips to China and Russia, Kissinger's diplomatic maneuverings around the globe, the McGovern-Eagleton-Shriver political fiasco and subsequent Nixon-Agnew landslide, the deaths of Presidents Truman and Johnson, the Dow-Jones finally breaking the magical 1000 mark, the ending of the draft, and perhaps most significant of all - the end of American involvement in Vietnam fighting along with an agreement for the return of Prisoners of War. The two news correspondents will surely touch on many of these developments.

We've said all that to say this: Let's support the college in their efforts to bring such programs to us. Dr. Leland Willis, who instituted the series at CJC several years ago, has said that the only way the program can continue past this year is to have better support by way of attendance at the programs. The cost is certainly not prohibitive at \$2.00 for adults and \$1.00 for students. We've seen higher prices charged at movie theaters and athletic events.

This publication for one would hate to see the Arts and Humanities Series discontinued due to lack of community support. If you're also for its continuing, show it with your presence Monday evening!

There are beards growing, long dresses being designed and plans underway for the biggest birthday celebration of a lifetime when Eastland County marks its hundredth year in a special celebration that will climax with an eight-day party beginning May 5th.

Headquarters will open Monday on the South Side of the Square.

And just with any party, there comes a time when somebody has to mix up cake ingredients, buy candles and put up decorations.

And that time is NOW for the Centennial.

You can rate your community - "score" it - on these four essential ingredients to development, says Will Erwin, Deputy Under Secretary of Agriculture for Rural Development.

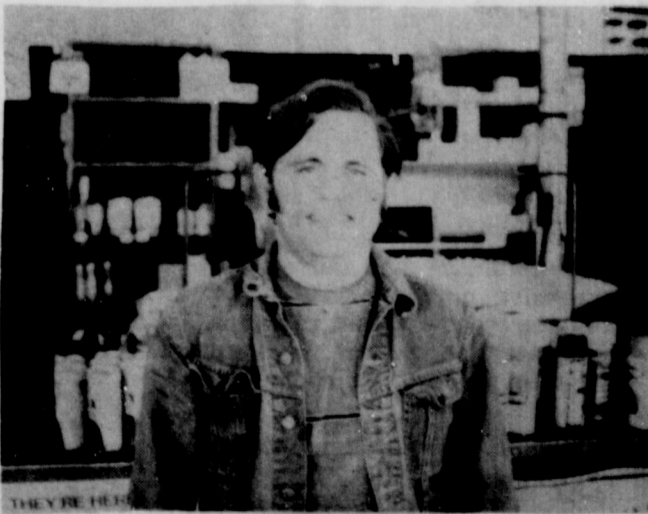
People building includes such things as education, health services, cultural satisfaction, outreach to the disadvantaged and leadership. For instance, score your community on the adequacy and availability to all of schools.

Community facilities include housing, transportation,

utilities and public services. To score your community in housing, for example, consider all sectors in terms of living conditions - crowding, sanitation, upkeep and appearance, availability and costs.

Environmental improvement covers conservation, recreation and community initiative. Economic development deals mostly with jobs, business and industry. But it also considers credit availability and use of natural resources.

After rating your community from poor to good or superior in these four essential areas, ask others if they agree. Get several opinions, Mr. Erwin suggests. Exchange views. If you and others think change is needed, you may wish to form an action group to work toward community goals.

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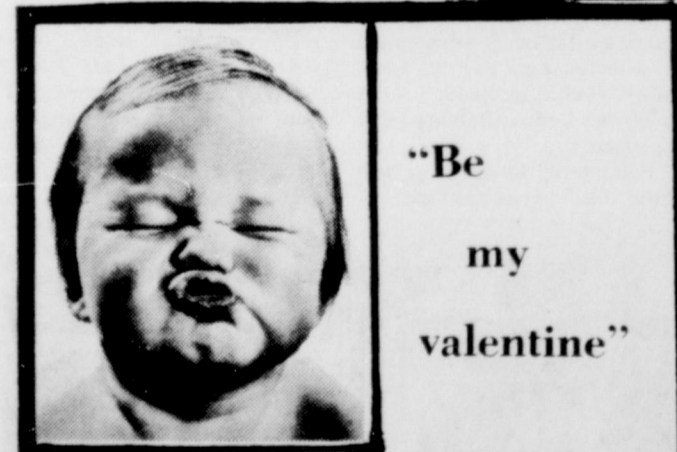

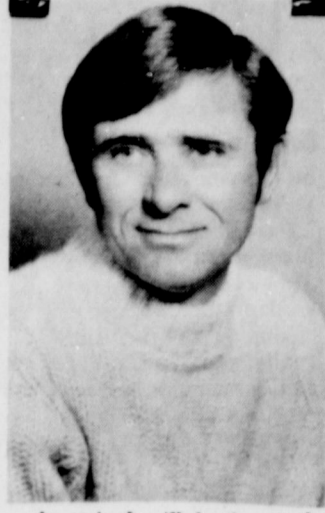

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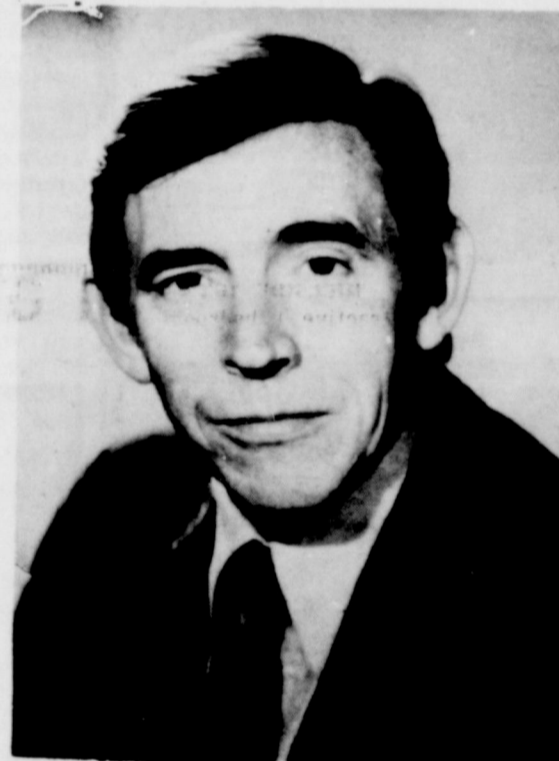

About thirty five men and women attended our farmers' income tax school January 26th. The school is always a popular event and the participants seem to enjoy discussing the unpleasant subject of income tax.

March 1 is drawing near as the deadline for farmers to file their 1972 income tax returns.

To be considered a farmer, two-thirds of your gross income must come from the sale of agricultural products.

Although you may not have to pay income tax this year due to various reasons you must still file a Schedule F if you had any income from farming.

To pay any income tax, a net farm profit must have been realized. If this was the case, the same exemptions and deductions that apply to any other individual can be used in determining income tax.

Married persons filing joint returns for 1972 will not have to pay any tax if their incomes were less than \$2,800. However, they will still need to file a Schedule F.

For Social Security purposes, farmers may need to file a Self-employment return. This return can be filed on either the net or gross farm income if the

net income was less than \$1,600.

More detailed information on filing income tax returns is available at the County Extension office. A copy of the "Farmer's Tax Guide" is available and can be a valuable tool in assisting farmers and ranchers in preparing an accurate and complete return.

Now that it's income tax reporting time and the beginning of a new tax year, some of us are painfully aware of the need for better kept records. If you feel this way, now is the time to start keeping well-organized records for 1973's return.

An orderly record system makes filling out a tax return a matter of coordinating the information that you have kept during the year.

There are many different and suitable record systems available from machinery, chemical and other agricultural supply dealers, printers and office supply firms, and government agency offices including the County Agent's office. No matter what system you choose, it should have sections or columns that correspond to the income tax report forms.

The Extension Service offers a manual record-keeping system that is available at our office.

Business records are required for tax reports, social security or self-employment tax reports, employee information if your employees are covered by the minimum wage law, and occasionally for verification of farm program requirements or special reports. A business record usually includes at least two parts - one for ordinary operating expenses and income and one for capital sales and depreciation of capital assets. Personal records of family expenses are needed if you itemize deductions and for budgeting family living expenses.

A series of file folders for receipts, invoices, deposits, bank statements and other items can be filed in a box or

**New Approach To Brush Control**

A new approach to controlling mesquite regrowth has proven successful in research conducted by Harold Wiedemann, agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Lubbock.

The method, called "low-energy grubbing," is so named because a low energy, highly maneuverable tractor equipped with a specially designed blade is used to cut tree roots below the soil's surface.

"Reinfestation of pastures by mesquite seedlings and other species is a problem following all brush treatments," says Wiedemann, who performed the grubbing research in 1971 and 1972 as a part of a continuing program in brush control. "A low-cost treatment has been needed to maintain control of brush so that benefits of initial brush control treatment would not be lost.

"We wanted to utilize the power grubbing method

because it is highly efficient," Wiedemann declares, "since it positively cuts the tree's tap root below the bud zone and prevents sprouting. The large 100-horsepower crawler tractors normally used have not been practical for small tree grubbing because of their high cost of operation."

The agricultural engineer explains that instead, a John Deere 450-B with about 45 drawbar horsepower was adapted for the small brush jobs by attaching a sharp u-shaped blade to the front c-frame for cutting the roots six to twelve inches below the soil's surface.

"This shift-on-the-go tractor averaged 11.1 acres per hour while grubbing 35 of the 46 trees per acre on a 1,400 acre site at the Pitchfork Ranch near Guthrie," Wiedemann reports. "The mesquite trees, which ranged from one to six feet tall, were reinfestations which followed hand grubbing in the 1940's and oiling in the 1950's. Of the 11 trees per acre

missed, most were less than 18 inches tall and not easily seen by the operator."

Wiedemann says that averages of 14 and 7.7 acres per hour were recorded for two different operators.

"This exemplifies the importance of a good operator," he explains. "At a tractor contract cost of \$12.50 per hour, the brush control practice averaged \$1.13 per acre. Utilizing the more efficient operator the control would have cost only 89 cents per acre."

During the course of the experiment a hydraulic attachment was designed to increase the capacity of the unit. The hydraulic grubber's blade can be adjusted for changes in soil type and moisture condition, and large stumps four to six inches in diameter can be split by activation of the hydraulic cylinders while the blade is engaged in the stump.

The average mesquite root diameter for the research site at point of cut was 2.7 inches with a range from one to six inches, Wiedemann points out. The hydraulic grubber should be advantageous in diameters over three inches, but further testing will be necessary.

Wiedemann says this type of maintenance grubbing could be used effectively and economically to control light reinfestation by mesquite two to five feet tall following root plowing or tree grubbing, or following aerial spraying and chaining on shallow hill sites where the original mesquite stumps were fairly small.

The experiment station researcher points out that this maintenance grubbing also can be used to control cedar reinfestation following double chaining to control algerita, lote and cats claw regrowth following aerial spraying and chaining or root plowing in the Edwards Plateau, and to control twisted acacia regrowth following root plowing in the South Texas Plains.

In addition, he says the versatile, low-energy crawler tractor would lend itself to ranch ownership because of its capabilities in other types of work, such as in building and repairing ranch roads, and in repairing stock tanks.

This on-going research is supported by individual ranchers and the Brush Control and Range Improvement Association of Abilene.

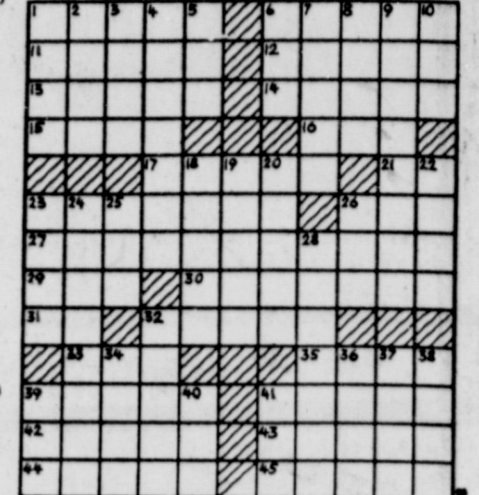

FHA Approves \$124,600 Grant For Area Water

## Jaycee Donor Drive Feb. 18

The Second Annual Eastland Jaycee Blood Donor Drive will be held Sunday, Feb. 18, from 1 to 5 p.m. at Eastland Memorial Hospital, Chairmen Greg Sidello and ale Bakker have announced.

Five Texas organizations have joined together in a public service program to promote the volunteer blood donor concept throughout the state.

Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Texas, Texas Hospital Association, Texas Medical Association, Texas Osteopathic Hospital Association, and Texas Osteopathic Medical Association made the announcement jointly recently.

In order to help highlight the continuing effort being made by these groups, and in support of the National Volunteer Blood Donor Program, Gov. Dolph Briscoe has signed a proclamation naming the week of January 28th as Texas Volunteer Blood Donor Week.

The proclamation states, in part, that "I would respectfully request that all able citizens of the State of Texas consider making voluntary contributions not only during this special week, but also at regular, medically approved intervals throughout the year."

"The volunteer blood donor gives the gift of life," Sidello said. "That's because the only way people who need blood can get blood is from other people."

There is an urgent need for blood in many localities, according to Dr. S. Braswell Locker, president of the Texas Medical Association, "se of whole blood has increased 500 percent in just four years, and the normal life-span of blood is just 21 days. This means that blood is needed day after day in an even flow - not just in time of disaster."

"Our aim is to help Texans to organize volunteer blood donor programs in their communities," Jack Price, president of the Texas Hospital Association, explained. "We're especially interested in companies, clubs, schools, civic and fraternal organizations setting

up their own volunteer blood donor programs."

A number of pre-deposit blood donor plans are available in Texas. These do two things: they assure that blood will be available when members need it, and they provide a reliable source of volunteer blood donors.

"That word volunteer is very

important," said Dr. Robert G. Haman, D.O., president of the Texas Osteopathic Medical Association Franklin E. Wells, president of the Texas Osteopathic Hospital Association, commented that "volunteer blood is low risk blood."

Hepatitis is the most frequently transmitted of all

infectious blood diseases, and whole blood and plasma obtained from non-profit, medically sponsored blood banks have proven 10 to 12 times safer than blood obtained through channels where the donor is paid money for his blood.

"The volunteer blood donor may be an individual, a family



An annual problem for the average rifle hunter is that of sighting in his gun. It's an essential art that must be done before the season actually starts if hunting is to be successful. Most men feel they are just too busy to take an extra hour off and go to the rifle range to fire a few rounds. It is fortunate for them that most guns hold their zero pretty well from one year to the next. And also that ammunition has become so nearly perfect that the bullet impact usually is retained.

But this good luck factor doesn't happen all the time. Neither does it happen for the man who just borrows a friend's gun and spends a couple hundred dollars for a lease and incidentals, only to miss the biggest buck he's ever seen. (That's always the case when you miss a buck. It's never a little one.)

True it is more difficult today to find a place for sighting in rifles than at any other time in history. You just can't go out and find an old gravel pit or crawl over a farmer's fence. But fortunately, there are enough shooting ranges where you can sight in the big bore for a dollar or two. If your gun is in proper form, two or three shots will do it. But if your scope has gotten knocked out of position, then you may shoot up a half-box of ammo before correcting the aim. But what is that compared to what you pay for a place to hunt?

Today's guns, especially those with scopes, are extremely accurate. They just need to be sighted in.

There's a good rule of thumb for sighting in a high-powered rifle. In fact, it works on all rifles.

If it's a .22 long-rifle hi-speed, zero it in at 25 yards. It will hit 1/2 inch high at 50 yards, but drops 4 inches low at 100. At 150 yards it is 16 inches low.

Now move up to the 222 Remington Magnum or the 223 Rem—lightest calibers that should be used on Texas' white tailed deer. This cartridge shoots 1/4 inch low at 25 yards. At 50 it is 1/2 inch high. At 100 yards it is 1 1/2 inches high and the same at 200 yards.

The popular .243 will zero at 25; it is 3/4 inch high at 50; 2 inches high at 100 and drops to 1/2 inch high at 200.

That popular .308 Winchester zeroes at 25; is 1 inch up to 50 and back to 1/2 inch at 200.

The old .30-30 zeroes in 1/4 inch low at 25; 1 1/4 inches high at 50; 2 inches high at 150, but drops to 2 1/2 inches low at 200.

These are just a few figures to indicate what you can expect of your gun, if you hold it right and it shoots a consistent grouping. Lots of guns today still group shot after shot in the X ring, if held right.

This is one thing that adds up to more successful hunts, more kills and fewer cripples. With a good scope and any of the popular calibers, it is almost impossible to not make a killing shot on a deer up to 200 yards. Impact will be within an inch or two of where you aim, if you aim right and don't jerk it off by pulling rather than squeezing the trigger.

So, if you want to be sure, take the old smoke-piece out to the range and test it with a few shots. It will pay off by better shooting in the field.

## City Officials Hear Lone Star Story

Eastland City Officials attended a Lone Star Gas Co. informational meeting in Abilene this week and heard reports from company officials on what appears to be in the future.

Present were officials from throughout the Abilene Regional area and Lone Star President William C. McCord told the group that there definitely is an energy crisis and a natural gas shortage, with present natural gas reserve for some 12 years.

He very pointedly explained that his area is in an inevitable position, and that Lone Star in particular is in a good position within this industry, but that in the future certain things are going to have to be done to maintain this position.

There's going to have to be a faster rate adjustments in the future, if the company is able to continue to supply the service it now does, he explained, referring to the 1972 rate struggles, many of which took long months of negotiations. Asked if new rate increases are seen, he explained that all of 1972 figures are not complete and the company as yet does not know where deficiencies are.

Others from the company participating were Louis B.

Huley, senior vice president; General Counsel W.T. Satterwhite; and Vice President Neal Hall.

Attending from Eastland were Mayor Durel Reid, Commissioners Jay Staggs and H.V. O'Brien, city manager Lewis Tiner and Local Lone Star Manager D.L. May.

Lone Star is one of the few companies in the nation which is still accepting both new industrial and residential customers, it was explained.

## 27 Countians Attend RC&D Annual Meet

Nearly 200 people crowded the Proctor Area Recreation Center at Lake Proctor Thursday evening for the Annual meeting of the Directors of the Leon-Bosque Resource, Conservation and Development Project.

The project covers Bosque, Comanche, Eastland, Erath and Somervell Counties and includes representatives of all units of local government from each.

During the business session, Joe Fambro of Huckaby was re-elected chairman and Jack McCarty, vice chairman.

Marion Porter, project coordinator from Stephenville, brought the program, showing color slides of completed and in progress projects which the RC&D Project has and is accomplishing through the cooperative effort of people in the counties.

"Cooperation" was the key word of his presentation, in which he stressed the importance of working together to better utilize the natural resources that exist, and applying technical help in making a better place in which to live, to work and to play.

One of the reasons for the shortage right now is the fact that there was no "fall" weather last year, the officials said. The company usually stores gas during the slower transition period between summer air conditioning demands and winter heating demand, but when it turned from hot to cold and pretty well stayed that way, the company wasn't able to stock-pile enough reserves.

## Sewer Line To Begin Monday

Construction on a sewer line to serve the new 72-unit Ramada Inn now under construction on Interstate 20 east of Eastland will begin Monday.

The line will consist of 3,162

feet of 8-inch pipe and 3,600 feet of 6-inch pipe on the south side of U.S. 80. In addition to serving the new Ramada Inn, the line will also serve new business firms that have recently built east of the city.

In addition to the sewer line the city will also lay 1,600 feet of 8-inch water line to the Ramada Inn. The line will tie onto a 14-inch line on the north side of U.S. 80 near the Eastland Auction Co. and go under I-20 through an opening provided when the highway was built.

Businesses on the south side of Highway 80 are now served with an old 2-inch line. Sneed Construction Co. of Eastland will do the ditching work and Smith Plumbing Co. of Eastland will lay the sewer line.
